

BOY SCOUTS ARE GOOD ANTIDOTE FOR BOLSHEVISM

Leader of Movement in City
Tells Members of Com-
merce Today.

"The greatest antidote for bolshevism in the world is the Boy Scout movement," Joe Taylor, Boy Scout executive, told the members of the Chamber of Commerce at their weekly noonday luncheon Monday.

Mr. Taylor spoke in the interest of the Boy Scout movement in South Bend. He declared that the organization's purpose is to make useful citizens of its members, and to keep boys under good influence at all times.

"No boy who voluntarily assists in regulating traffic at a time of need as many Boy Scouts did recently at Dayton, O., will ever violate the traffic laws when he grows up, and no boy who reverently salutes the Stars and Stripes every day will ever wave the 'red' flag," Mr. Taylor declared.

The Boy Scout executive declared that it is the purpose of every Boy Scout to do one good turn each day. He said that the Boy Scout movement gives to the youth the practical education that the school is unable to give him.

Gives Demonstrations.
Mr. Taylor gave some interesting demonstrations of the practical things taught Boy Scouts, such as life saving, aid of fire departments in preventing spread of fire, and many other things.

No appeal was made for funds in support of the movement at the noonday luncheon, although Chairman Fred L. Dennis of the meeting said that any contributions to the needed \$12,500 fund would be appreciated if these contributions were sent after Mr. Taylor's remarks reached their homes after the meeting.

E. T. Bonds, manager of the telephone company, promised better service in the automatic department of the South Bend exchange by the latter part of the present week. He said that by the acquiring of automatic equipment from Indianapolis, it will be possible to better the service.

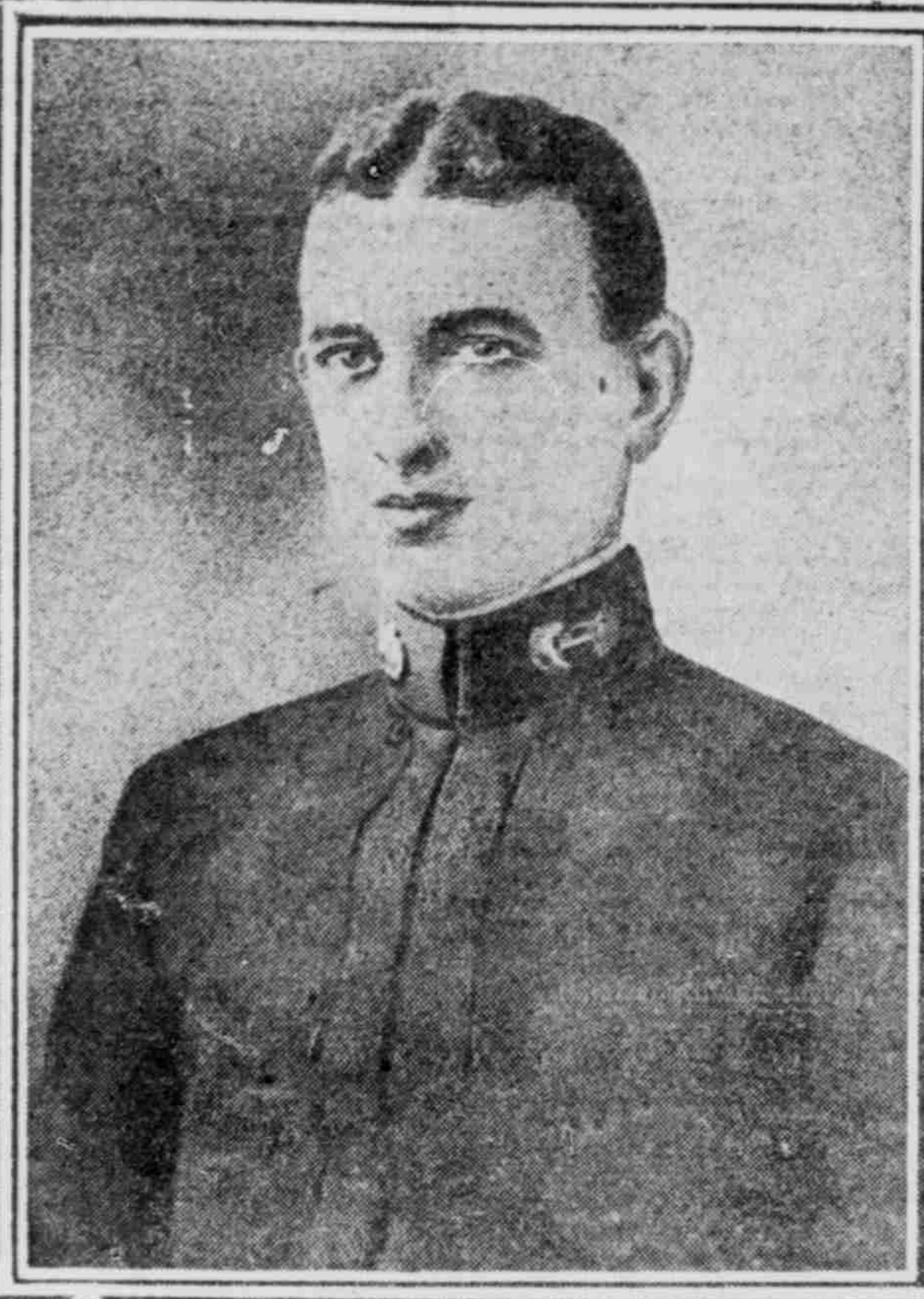

CROWDS RUSH TO PAY THEIR TAXES

Court House is Thronged
With Taxpayers During
Final Week.

The scene in the county treasurer's office in the court house Monday was likened to a 98 cent department store bazaar with crowds pushing and shoving as individuals attempted to reach their respective windows to pay their tax assessments. With the entry of the final week for the tax payments, attaches of the treasurer's office are preparing for the grand rush that traditionally occurs during the closing days of the payment period. The rush started Saturday when the corridors to the office were thronged until noon, when the office closed. Early risers began straggling into the court house almost as soon as the doors were open and long before the "ready for business" signs were posted lines leading to the several windows were formed. Next Monday is the last day of the open period.

Attention has also been called to the fact that Monday, May 3, is the last day for the filing of mortgage exemptions in the auditor's office. Under the existing laws a property owner is entitled to an exemption of \$1,000 or less on the assessment of his property valuation if the property is mortgaged. At the present tax rate a considerable saving is effected if the owner files an exemption claim.

Soldiers and widows of soldiers of the Civil war are entitled to an additional exemption of \$1,000 on their tax assessments and these claims must be filed by May 3, also. All persons affected by these rulings are urged to file immediately and to avoid appearing during the last minutes.

WOMAN GOES TO JAIL FOR CHILD'S ALLEGED TRUANCY

Neither argument nor persuasion has any apparent effect upon Mrs. Elizabeth Lichkay, 115 Dundee st., so now she will spend 10 days at the county jail.

Mrs. Lichkay refuses to keep her seven-year-old daughter, Elizabeth, in school. She was arrested by Truant Officer Calvert Feb. 7, and taken to city court where it was explained to her that the child must be kept in school.

Although the mother would not make any promises, she was given until Monday morning to comply with the state law. Up to Monday she had not done that, and the child was not in school.

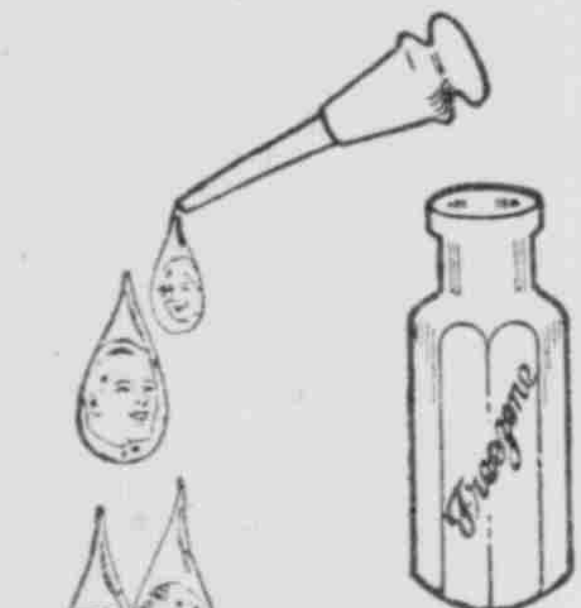
Mrs. Lichkay told Judge Gilmer that she would not send Elizabeth to school. Then the judge decided that he would send the mother to jail for 10 days in an effort to impress her with the necessity of complying with the law.

Efforts of the school authorities to impress Mrs. Lichkay with the need of the child for an education have been without success. During the next 10 days the control of the family affairs will be in the hands of the father who promises that Elizabeth will be in school every day except Saturday and Sunday.

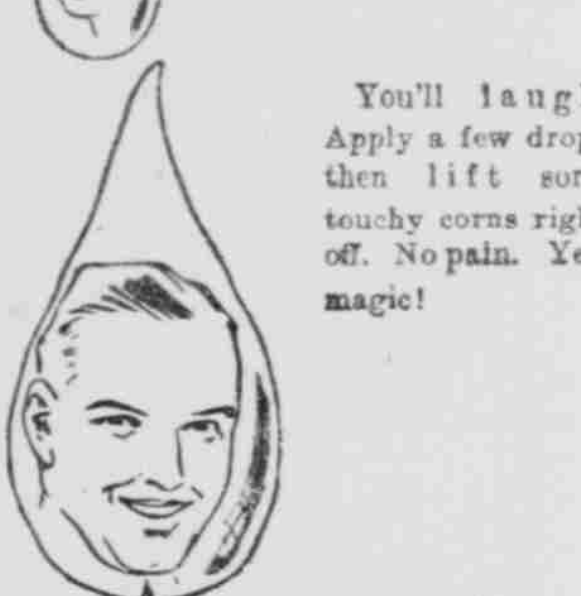
