

LOCAL EDUCATOR DENOUNCES NEW EDUCATIONAL BILL

Rev. Charles Miltner Says
Smith-Towner Act Will
Make Conditions Worse.


Illiteracy and the shortage of
teachers are ailments in our educational
system which can never be
overcome by the Smith-Towner bill
now before Congress, according to
Rev. Charles Miltner, who lectured on
"Our Problems of Education" before the Notre Dame Knights of
Columbus in the council chambers
Tuesday. The Smith-Towner bill,
Father Miltner maintained, is a
panacea suggested for present evils
of American education which promises
to make for even worse conditions
than now exist. In an analysis
he told that the bill would estab-
lish a distinct and automatic
department of education with a
cabinet secretary who could and
perhaps would set up a Prussianized
educational system that would drive
all private institutions out of existence.
Public and private schools
would suffer untold setbacks and
education would be in a worse fix
than ever before. The bill would
give rise to sectional favoritism and
seriously interfere with the rights of
the family in educational matters.

Before the lecture Grand Knight
Thomas J. Tobin presided at a short
business session and announced that
the first degree would be conferred
on a class of 75 candidates at the
usual meeting of the second and
third class W. O. W. Hall, South
Bend, May 22. The council plans
to hold a dance during the com-
mencement exercises in June in
celebration of the tenth anniversary
of the establishment of the council.
Members of the council were
urged to support the Players' Club
entertainment for the benefit of the
K. of C. Building Fund, in Wash-
ington hall, Friday night.

UNION DIARY TO INCREASE STOCK

Lakeville Concern Will Raise
Capitalization From \$10,-
000 to \$80,000.

The Producers' Union Dairy Co.
of Lakeville, Ind., has filed a petition
asking that the capital stock be
increased from \$10,000 to \$80,-
000, an increase of \$70,000. The de-
cision to raise the capital stock was
reached at a meeting of the stock-
holders held in Lakeville last week.
The stockholders also empowered
and authorized the board of directors
to issue preferred stock to the
extent of \$20,000—the stock to be
divided into 200 shares at \$100 each.
