

AIRPLANE PLANT MAY BE ERECTED IN SOUTH BEND

Conduct Demonstration of
Planes to be Sold at
Nominal Prices.

That South Bend may be picked as the site for the huge plant to be erected by the Multi-X Aircraft and Motors Co., a new corporation formed for the manufacture of airplanes and aero motors, was the statement made by company officials upon their visit here to supervise the opening of a demonstration office with temporary quarters at 118 N. Main. Bloomington and making an active bid for the location of the plant but company officials declared that they favored South Bend on account of its excellent rail and shipping facilities.

The concern is capitalized at \$3,000,000 and it is planned to manufacture commercial and passenger airplanes at a cost of a reasonable price. The venture is the result of a dream that is nearing reality when passenger travel, express and freight carrying will be by way of the air, say the organizers of the company. The concern will put a one passenger plane on the market to sell at \$1,700 while a two passenger ship will start at \$2,500.

J. M. Stewart of South Bend is in charge of the local demonstration office and is assisted by E. H. McElroy.

FARMERS' FEDERATION HOLDS BIG MEETING

The Olive township association of the Farmers' Federation perfectly organized and managed by elected officers at an enthusiastic meeting held Monday night in New Carlisle. Woman Gives Science Great Rubber Discovery

ST. LOUIS, April 27.—Revelation of a new method for determining the life of rubber products, notably automobile tires, was made to the American Chemical society in a paper by the only woman member of the rubber section of the society, Miss Irene C. Diner, 25 years old, a graduate student in New York university. She refused an offer of \$10,000 a year for her discovery and gave it to science.

Miss Diner's invention is said to make it possible to foretell much more accurately the actual miles any automobile tire may be expected to travel. She is the daughter of the professor of chemistry in Fordham University, New York, and is a graduate of Columbia university.
