that as He fed the multitude on five
loaves and two fishes He can satisfy
the spiritual hunger of the world's
multitude of sinners if they put
their faith in Him."Speakers from four
South Bend fraternal orders, the
Red Men, Woodmen of the World,
Modern Woodmen, and Court of
Honor, with members of their
ladies' auxiliaries, were honored guests
of the evening, occupying the re-
served section nearest the platform.
The delegations were led in by
the Red Men's band, which also
rendered several selections at the
tabernacle previous to the song service.Feature Solos.
Songs by a group of Y. W. C. A.
girls and by a quartet of four little
misses were given by Loren Jones
during the song service.Although he announced the entire
story of the miracle of the
loaves and fishes as his text the
speaker put special stress on the
words of Jesus, "They need not de-
part," spoken to the disciples when
they wanted to lead the multitude
back to the city for food.The speaker did send away any
man who was in need, "he said. "If
you need something tonight you
can get it by giving your faith to
Jesus. There is a hunger of the
soul that is more terrible than the
hunger of the body, even when you
have physical food or you
survive. You must have spiritual food
or you die in spirit. Jesus is the
bread of spiritual life sent down
from heaven.""Our there in this crowd tonight
there are hundreds of people, men
and women who have inside them a
longing for something that they
are not getting. They are not
happy, are not at peace with
themselves. They are not because
refusing to open their hearts to God
they are starving spiritually."Physical food is necessary, men-
tal food is a good thing, but you
can't solve the problem of by
education alone. It takes something
more than that, it takes food for
the spirit. Education never solved
the problems of the human soul.

of South Bend by Pres. Wilson.
In Franklin, Ind., Mr. Hunter's post
office is republican. The appointment
came as the result of a competitive

Landis fixed his penalty.REPUBLICANS WILL
OPPOSE SALES TAX
IN SOLDIER BILLAction of G. O. P. Members
Causes Break at Final
Meeting of Committee.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Opposition
among house republicans to a
sales tax for raising part of the \$1,
000,000,000 needed for soldier re-
lief legislation led, Thursday, to an
open break at the final meeting of
the republican members of the ways
and means committee called to com-
pense the tax measure.

To Lay Plan.

Rep. Young, North Dakota, and

Frear, Wisconsin, bolted and joined
in conference with republican in-
surgents to lay plans for the oppo-
sition fight at their party caucus
Thursday night. Their withdrawal
from the ways and means committee
caucus, with a majority of bat-
tled in the final committee, if the bolting
members vote with the democrats.Republican committee finally
completed the committee draft of
the relief bill Thursday, making few
changes in the general scheme. In
adopting the sales tax of one per-
cent on gross merchandise, the
committee decided this would not
apply unless the aggregate sales
exceeded \$1,000,000, instead of the pre-
viously adopted limit of \$500,000. Other
forms of taxation approved by the
republicans include a tax on all
stock exchange transaction, and in-
creased taxation on incomes, tobacco
and real estate.

Taxes, which would be effective next Jan. 1, with
cash bonus payments to be made in
installments, beginning April 1, 1921. For
the other forms of relief, including
land settlement, home purchases,
vocational training and paid-up
insurance, the committee voted
to appropriate \$1,000,000 to be available for
carrying out these plans, when the bill
is approved by the president.The republicans decided to call a
meeting of the full committee, Friday,
to discuss the provisions.A final favorable report on the
measure will be formally sought on
Saturday, but the democrats and
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
