WOMEN POLITICIANS ADDRESS STUDENTS

In Interest of Gen. Wood. Audience Proclaims Itself Democratic.

The "school city" of Mishawaka laughed heartily Friday afternoon over a political incident which happened when three ladies invaded high school precincts and talked to the scholars in the interests of Gen. Leonard Wood, republican candidate for president. Mrs. Wood, Mrs. C. A. Carlisle and Miss Harriet Vittum, secretary of the women's committee of the Wood campaign, had during the day requested an audience of school children in the auditorium at 2:30. This was graciously granted. The scholars assembled with the greatest alacrity. Miss Kate Kern, head of the science department and dean of the girls, introduced the ladies. Mrs. Carlisle in turn introduced Miss Vittum, who spoke as a mother to the audience. She told how deeply Gen. Wood sympathized with the teachers in their efforts towards obtaining better salaries. If the general was elected president he would take care of them. He had been a poor boy himself once and had worked his way through school. Addressing the pupils, the speaker said she was sure they would all be in favor of shorter school hours. To this sentiment there was unanimous approval. "Well," said the speaker, "Gen. Wood, when he becomes president, will see that you get them. Go home and ask your parents to vote for the general. Remind them of it night and morning, so they will be sure to cast their votes right. I suppose all you who live in Mishawaka are republicans?" At this question there was a chorus of "No's" which somewhat disconcerted the fair politician, who in retaliation had this parting shot: "The democrats haven't any candidates that are worth a democratic vote!"

DODGE MFG. CO. TO BUILD MORE HOMES

Takes Out Permits For 20 Two-Story Frame Houses.

The Dodge Mfg. Co. has taken out permits for 20 two-story frame houses to be built on Gaylor's third addition to Mishawaka on Eleventh and Twelfth sts., between Union st. and Summit lane. They will cost from \$2,700 to \$3,500 each.

This concern has within the past several months built a large number of dwellings in different parts of the city in order to accommodate new workmen who are being continually brought to the city to work in the various factories under the Dodge Co. control.

The woolen company has also erected a number of homes and at present has several under construction. This is to some extent relieving the situation in Mishawaka, but purchasers or tenants could be found for many more.

REALTY CORPORATION IS CAPITALIZED AT \$75,000

The Colpaert Realty Corporation of Mishawaka has been formed with a capitalization of \$75,000 and articles have been filed with the secretary of state. The corporation will engage in the real estate business. The incorporators are Archie C. Colpaert, Leo P. Van Rie, S. McIntosh, Charles Weidner, Isaac Kane Parks and Ross Eminger.

With a capital stock of \$65,000 the Massey-Pfundstein corporation, a concern dealing in automobile tires and accessories, has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The concern will operate a chain of stores through Illinois and Indiana. The incorporators reside in Joliet and Manhattan, Illinois.
