

WOMEN IN POLITICS MAKE MEN "DECENT NOT EFFEMINATE"

New U. S. Civil Service Commissioner Defends Influence of Her Sex.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—It tries the patience of Mrs. Helen H. Gardener, the first woman to be appointed to the United States civil service commission, when some one bursts out with a warning that men are being feminized by woman's new activities in business and politics.

"Rubbish, all this talk about the men becoming soft and feminine," she said. "They're becoming more decent, that's all."

"And all that's happening to woman is that her brain is functioning normally. In the days when she was regarded merely as a ballroom ornament or a kitchen essential it was baby from disease."

Brain Grows With Waist.
"Woman's brain has grown with her waist. Today she is infinitely more capable of rearing children than her 18-inch-waisted sister of the past."

The new "lady" civil service commissioner is a vice president of the National Women's Suffrage association movement to have sex discriminations of every kind removed. The thousands of women who apply each year for positions in government departments may be assured that she will be "on the job" to guard their interests. She is a writer by profession.

There's nothing aggressive about this little, white-haired person whom the president has honored with the highest office awarded a woman during his administration. She is thoroughly feminine, dresses charmingly and she looks at least 20 years younger than her 62 years, despite the whiteness of her hair.

Famous For Fact.
She is famous for her fact. In the days when the women were fighting for the passage of the suffrage amendment, she was known as the "diplomatic corps" of the National Women's Suffrage association, acting as the suffragists' "ambassador" to the white house. And according to the suffragists, her influence more than any other factor brought the president round to their cause. She is now active in the League of Women Voters serving in the office of counselor.

Discussing politics, Mrs. Gardener advised presidential candidates who are consulting the outboard for information about the woman vote to get platforms that will appeal to the women.

"The women are going to vote for issues rather than the man," she said.

"Politicians are the only ones who need fear their entrance into politics. They will not be content merely to vote. They're going to aspire to political office. And why shouldn't they? They are capable as men to run the government. There's no sex in brain."

PHYSICIANS DENY INSANITY GERMS

Ohio Specialists Disagree With Theory Advanced by New Jersey Man.

CINCINNATI, O., April 29.—Local specialists are not ready to accept the theory, recently proclaimed by Dr. Henry A. Cotton, New Jersey scientist, that insanity is due to a very poisonous germ at the base of the teeth or in diseased tonsils than to disease of the brain.

"The theory is too new to be practical," said Dr. Sidney Rauh of the public school dental clinic. "There are some cases of insanity arising from infected teeth, usually the 'wisdom' teeth, but these cases are of mechanical origin rather than due to a germ."

"I am sure if Dr. Cotton has found insanity originating in bacteria of teeth, or tonsils, these examples are only a small percentage," declared Dr. Emerson A. North, superintendent of Lonesome hospital. "Degeneration of the cells of the brain is the usual theory of insanity's origin, but degeneracy of some other part of the body may cause insanity," commented Dr. Louis Stricker, in charge of the Hamilton Country pension fund for the blind. "I am not prepared to say the teeth, or tonsils, are often responsible," said Dr. Stricker. He believed the new theory is a phase of a current fad for ascribing most of the body's ills to diseased teeth.

MAJ. SMITH, JR., DIES.
