

## TO ASK COUNCIL TO AID SUPPORT OF U. S. CLINIC

Health Board Behind Measure Asking Funds for Venereal Disease.

Special efforts will be made by members of the health department at the meeting of the common council committee of the whole next Monday night to have favorable action taken on an ordinance providing that the health department provide funds for the support of the U. S. Public Health service venereal clinic. During the past 11 months the clinic has been provided with funds furnished by the War Chest committee, but since that fund is depleted it is necessary to secure a lasting supply.

During the past 11 months 1,025 applications have been made to the clinic and approximately 900 cases treated. On an average of 100 cases per month are treated.

Many Take Treatment. According to the report of the United States bureau of public health, just issued, the local clinic is the best in Indiana and the second best in the United States.

The treatments here are not confined to prostitutes alone and a great many of the patients are women. In many cases whole families, including babies in the arms of their mothers, are treated for diseases that remained dormant in the parents until after marriage.

U. S. Furnishes \$4,000.

The government is furnishing approximately \$4,000 for the maintenance of the clinic including the services of the doctor and medicine used in treating the venereals. The city will be asked to pay the rent and upkeep of the building and the services of nurse, clerk and investigator.

According to members of the council that body is in favor of turning the building over to the board of health.

Leaves on Fifth. The Mauretania leaves for Cherbourg and Southampton on the fifth, the Jekri clearing on the same day for Bathurst. On the sixth, La Savoie puts forth for Havre, the Stravangerford for Christiania, the Philadelphia, American liner, leaves on the seventh for Cherbourg, and on the 10th the Montevideo puts out for Hamburg; the New Amsterdam sailing on the same day for Rotterdam.

The Cunarder, Imperator, leaves for Southampton on the 12th, the Duca Abruzzi for Naples, the Helig Olav for Christiania, the Kaiserin Victoria, Cunarder for Queenstown and Liverpool. On the 14th the Kroonland sails for Antwerp, La-Touraine for Havre, Rosyth Castle for Cape Town, the White Star liner, Adriatic, on the 14th leaves for Cherbourg, while the Mongolia, American liner, clears for Hamburg.

## CORONER SERVES PAPERS ON DUCK

Sheriff is Defendant in Replevin Suit Over Attached Motor Truck.

County Coroner Frank J. Powers exercised a new duty Tuesday morning when he served court papers on Sheriff Lew B. Duck. The sheriff is made defendant in a replevin suit brought by the South Bend Spring Wagon and Carriage Co., for recovery of a one ton motor truck attached by the sheriff under court order some weeks ago, and in cases where the sheriff is defendant, the coroner must serve the necessary papers. Ten dollars damage for "unlawful retention" of the truck is asked by the plaintiff.

The truck was purchased by James Mitchell from the plaintiff concern, and later Philip Rubin brought suit on account, asking that the truck be attached to guarantee payment. The court order was so issued, and the truck was duly taken.

Now the South Bend Spring Wagon and Carriage Co. charge that the truck belongs to them, since Mitchell has defaulted in the payment contract he had signed. Unless the sheriff places a bond within 24 hours, the bond already filed by the wagon company will entitle them to possession of the truck until the hearing, which will take place in the September term of superior court.

The reasons given for the increased enlistments are the increased pay, the free vocational training offered, the chance to travel, the choice of posts in the country, and the additional bonus of \$90.

## AUTHORITIES PLAN TO PROSECUTE ALL ZONE VIOLATORS

Board of Health Decides to Hail Offenders Into Court.

Plans are being made by the health department for the arrest and prosecution of violators of the ordinance for the removal of such buildings in the third zone specified in the ordinance. In many cases the board has been lenient with the enforcement of the law because of the failure of plumbers to take care of all their clients, but where a plumber has not been notified arrests will be made.

The law provides a fine of \$100 and imprisonment of 30 days for failure to pay the fine. Each day since July first is considered as a separate offense and will be punishable by the same penalty as provided in the ordinance.

## Zone Boundaries

The third zone is bounded by Sample, St. Peter, Napoleon, Toutia Tecumseh sts., Vassar, Blaine, LaPorte avs., to center of Washington st., east to Chapin st., and south to Sample.

Dr. E. G. Freyermuth, secretary of the board of health, said Tuesday that no formal notice will be sent to the property owners and arrests may be expected within the next week if some attempt is not made to remove the houses.

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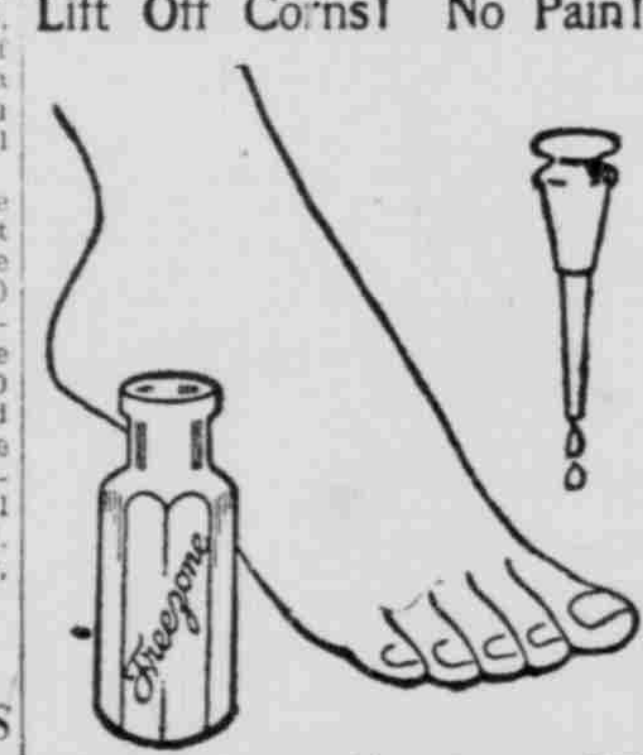
