

DISMISS CASE FOR LACK OF EVIDENCE

Couple Makes Affidavits That Relative Was Never Robbed.

John Magelski and wife swore in a circuit court affidavit a short time ago that Joe's brother, Joe, who caused Steve Reno and Tom Blenc to be sentenced in the state prison for from 5 to 14 years for robbing him, had never been robbed as was alleged. On the strength of the affidavits, Reno and Blenc were granted a new trial by Special Judge Bill Seibert and Wednesday morning Deputy Pro. George Schock dismissed the case against the men for lack of evidence.

At the first trial Reno and Blenc were found guilty of robbing Joe Magelski of his pay envelope and were sentenced by Special Judge Seibert to spend from 5 to 14 years at the state prison. Joe's brother and his wife had not appeared at the trial, but some months later their affidavits, saying that Joe had never been robbed, spoiled the evidence on which the state had convicted the men.

Deputy Pro. Schock investigated the case and he found that instead of Reno and Blenc robbing Joe Magelski, as the latter had alleged, the three men had been bootlegging and a quarrel over splits terminated in Magelski accusing the men of robbing him. These findings were so important that they destroyed the evidence that the state had used in convicting the men at the first hearing and Wednesday morning Deputy Pro. Schock dismissed the case.

Reno and Blenc have been confined to the state prison for nearly a year.

HOLD EXAMINATION FOR CLERKS HERE

A civil service examination will be held Oct. 23 to secure men for clerical positions at salaries from \$1,000 to \$1,500 per annum. After six months satisfactory work appointments may be allowed the increase granted by congress of \$20 a month. All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements may enter this examination.

The examination is permanent during good behavior and automatic retirement on an annuity is provided at 65 years old. All national holidays are given with full pay and a 15 day vacation is given annually. Working conditions are good, being provided by the government.
