

SAYS SOLDIERS ARE NOT EXEMPT FROM PUNISHMENT

Judge Funk Fails to Grant Request For Leniency on That Ground.

"We had millions of soldiers and it would be monstrous if all courts suspended sentences because boys were soldiers. We would have no protection for society if sentences in criminal cases were suspended merely because youths were in the army."

This was Judge Funk's answer to the 10th plea for leniency made this week in the circuit court on behalf of youthful automobile thieves who, because of having served during the war, thought the court would lessen their punishment.

"I would rather have the word going out that this court was strict instead of lenient in dealing with automobile thieves because fewer machines would be stolen," continued the judge after sentencing Harry Carlson, 19, and Joseph Burns, 26, to spend from one to 14 years at the state reform school for stealing County Board Engineer Dalton Moomaw's car last May.

Short of Funds.

Burns and Carlson came to South Bend to a prize fight last May and told the court that because they were short of funds they had taken Moomaw's car from in back of the court house in order to get back to their home in Chicago. They insisted that they had intended to return the machine the following day when they would have money and claimed that they had no intention of selling or really keeping the auto.

Because of the financial difficulties that the parents of the two boys were in, Moomaw did not object to a suspended sentence and asked through Deputy Pro's George Schrock that the boys be granted a parole as they have already spent 10 months in the county jail. Atty. Omacht, who defended Carlson and Burns, told of their service records and the dependency of their parents but the judge insisted on his policy of strictness in grand larceny cases.

FARMERS WILL HOLD COLUMBUS MEETING TO DISCUSS PRICES

A circular letter sent to farmers in this community by the American Farm Bureau Federation announces a national meeting of that organization at Columbus, O., Oct. 22 and 23. Northern Indiana will be represented and the purpose of the meeting is to consider prices received for farm products and relative yields and production costs in different parts of the country.

Lewis Taylor, general secretary for the Indiana Farmer's Association is outlining the meeting says: "No special organization among the farmers is the reason so few counties of this state are receiving \$14 a ton for tomatoes while others are getting as high as \$20 a ton. Recently New York farmers asked for \$12 a ton for tomatoes and the received \$12.50 a ton because they were told that tomatoes could be bought in Indiana for \$14 a ton. Thus the Indiana grower by accepting prices that yield little or no profit supplied the canner with a club to beat down prices in New York state."

The funeral will be held at the Shafer residence at Lakeview, Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. R. L. McQuary will officiate.

The cousins were farmers and were hurrying home after a busy day of threshing at a neighbor's

farm to do their own chores. It is thought that the men did not see the coming train, and there were no witnesses of the tragedy.

The train crew picked up the bodies and carried them back to Wyat, and the A. M. Russell ambulance called for them and took them to South Bend.

Shafer was 32 years old and had lived in Union township all of his life. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Shafer, a wife, Mrs. Rose Shafer, a son Kenneth and a daughter, Grace.

Bailey was 51 years old and is survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary C. Bailey, his wife, Mary, Ruthie Bailey, three daughters, Helen, Mary and Louise. His sisters are Mrs. N. H. Sheppard of Valparaiso, and Mrs. F. M. Barkley of Lakeview. His brothers are Charles and Durward.
