assistant secretary of the navy, it was through the efforts of Asst. Sec. Roosevelt that the navy was ready for more than two months in advance of the call received from the president. This particular move won the highest commendation from Mr. Roosevelt from the republicans throughout the country.

Compares Attitude.
"Now let us stop for a moment and review the stand of Gov. Cox and Sen. Harding on the League of Nations. The issue of this political campaign is very clear cut, there are no two ways about it. The republicans do not state that they want a League with reservations but their candidates for president recently asserted that the republicans are against the League of Nations. On the other hand Gov. Cox stands for the League of Nations with reservations as the League of Nations is the only way to secure the republicans of the republic party we at last have a clear cut issue.

"It was always the idea of ex-President Roosevelt to have a contract between the nations of the world. What efforts were made by British diplomats to form a League of Nations but this Germany refused to agree, her military program had been completed and she must not be allowed to work. When America entered into the world war our own went in side by side regardless of creed of political belief, but with that strong moral belief.

"It was the hope in every mothers heart that at the end of this brutal struggle a contract would be made between the nations of the world to prevent the further slaughter of human life. It was for this one great ideal that the world fought. Let us review that wonderful reception accorded President Wilson in Boston upon his return from Europe by Gov. Coolidge, running mate of Sen. Harding on the republican ticket.

"To use the words of Gov. Coolidge no such reception was ever accorded Washington or Lincoln. And at this time that man who is now candidate for vice president on the republican ticket spoke only words of the highest praise of President Wilson who had just returned from Europe where he had been in the drafting of the League of Nations and it was first called. Why then was the adoption of the league stopped? It was because certain republicans met in Washington and decided after a lengthy conference that the League of Nations should not be passed under a democratic administration. Let me state right here that the attitude assumed by the republican party on article 10 is the greatest violation of the League of Nations. There is nothing in article 10 that is injurious to this country or its constitution and if you will take the trouble to read it, you will see that it is the last resort. There are 45 nations in the League.

Reads Article 10.
At this point speaker read article 10 to the audience and then explained its various phases. Mrs. Wilson explained the difference between the league and the assembly and the fact that even though the council of the league should decide upon war the league to be taken by this country would still remain with the United States congress. In speaking on the question of Ireland in connection with the league Mrs. Wilson clearly explained that the league was for the purpose of dealing with external aggression and not internal aggression which is clearly defined in the article itself.

The speaker briefly explained where the large campaign fund which put Sen. Newberry of Michigan in office came from. According to Mrs. Wilson this money was contributed by the various factory owners as it was to their advantage to prevent the adoption of the League of Nations. In concluding her remarks Mrs. Wilson pointed out the fact that the league is in actual operation and has already been the means of preventing two wars.

Sweet Talks.
Edwin F. Sweet, former member of congress and ex-mayor of Grand Rapids, Mich., cited several instances where meeting bodies at Washington by the republicans and held up because they might injure the large manufacturing interests. The same measure, however, was passed by the democrats. Mr. Sweet brought out many important phases of the league issue. He explained how many prominent republicans endorsed the League of Nations and how it was with the consent of many republicans that President Wilson went to Paris to aid in drawing up the league.

"When President Wilson went to Paris," declared Mr. Sweet, "he had the right to believe that the republicans who were not hide-bound would support the League of Nations. And among those republicans supporting the league at this time were Taft, Strauss and Lowell, all prominent men. It was later asserted by ex-President Taft, who is known as a capable constitution lawyer, that the League of Nations would in no way conflict with the constitution of this country. In concluding his remarks this statement, if it had not been for President Wilson there would be no League of Nations in operation today."

Mr. Sweet told Sen. Harding's statement on his stand on the league issue and his belief in an association of nations. The speaker then brought out the fact that all the leading nations of the world have now members of the original league and the only nations left for the United States to form into Sen. Harding's association are Mexico, Turkey and Russia.

The speakers were introduced by Mrs. L. S. Fickenscher, democratic chairwoman.

ARRANGE DEBATE ON LEAGUE ISSUE BETWEEN NOMINEES

Speakers' Bureau Challenges
Senator to Meet Cox
on Stump.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—That Gov. Cox challenges Sen. Harding to one or more joint debates on the League of Nations issue is the context of a statement given out here Wednesday night by Sen. Patrick Harrison, chairman of the speakers' bureau of the democratic national committee.

The challenge was addressed to Sen. Harry S. New, chairman of the speakers' bureau of the republican national committee. Gov. Cox has backed up by force. What attempts were made at the outbreak of the world war to organize a League of Nations? In answer to this I will say that efforts were made by British diplomats to form a League of Nations but this Germany refused to agree, her military program had been completed and she must not be allowed to work.

If the suggestion is accepted by the managers of Sen. Harding's campaign, the debate will be set for the debate and Gov. Cox will cancel all previous engagements made in order to participate in the debate.

Sen. Harrison also stated that the democratic national committee from this time till election will be glad to grant a division of time for any advocate of Harding who wishes to debate his attitude on the League of Nations.

KLEIN PREPARING TO ANSWER CHARGE

Admits That He Accused Democrats of Blocking Women's Votes.

Machinist J. D. Harris, in charge of South Bend's voting machines, seems in line to be the "goat" of the quoted assertion by G. O. P. County Chairman Fred C. Klein that Democratic Election Commissioner J. W. McInerney had been responsible for the inability of the republican county committee to get possession of the voting machines, up to election, for use in voting schools.

McInerney and Klein came together in the audience's office at the county building today and Klein's interview of yesterday, published in a local paper, and McInerney's of this morning, in which McInerney had called Klein a "deliberate falsifier" of course came up.

"I wonder that you did not call him an 'unmitigated falsifier'!" queried G. O. P. Secy. L. Wilbur Hammond.

"I did have it in mind to use that term," said McInerney, "but then it dawned upon me that the falsehood was told for political deception, (in the case of the G. O. P. campaign), and I thought perhaps that did 'mitigate' to some extent, and 'deliberate' would be better."

Klein Admitted Statement.

Klein admitted that he had said McInerney was responsible for the machines not going out, and if mistaken, then the blame fell on Machinist Harris or the county commissioners. He said he would make a statement answering the reflection upon his veracity. "Very well," said McInerney, "all I ask of you is to tell the truth."

When approached by a News-Times reporter for a statement from him, he declined to have anything to say.

Strong denial that the St. Joseph county democratic committee was not in favor of having the voting machines placed in the various precincts for instruction purposes was made Wednesday by Harry Grube, chairman.

Grube Makes Statement.
"I personally appeared before the county commissioners a week or so ago," declared Mr. Grube, "in an attempt to have voting machines placed in the various school buildings where political meetings were being held. The commissioners informed me at this time that the matter rested solely with J. D. Harris, a republican, who is in charge of the machines, and that it was his opinion that the machines were too delicate to be transferred about the city at this late date. This assertion that Walter McInerney, the only democratic member of the board of three election commissioners, acted in behalf of the democratic committee in securing the machines is false. Any action taken by Mr. McInerney was in his capacity as a member of the election commissioners and not as a representative of the democratic committee."

POLICE FORCED TO RELEASE THIEVES

Assistant Chief Laments Fact
That People Do Not
Prosecute.

We can accomplish nothing toward cleaning up the ring of automobile thieves working in and around South Bend if car owners continue to refuse to file charges against the culprits when they are finally landed by the police," stated Chief of Detectives William Cassidy, Tuesday night when he was forced to release two alleged automobile thieves whom he had been holding for a week waiting for the owner of the car which was stolen and the insurance company to file charges against them.

The two alleged thieves, Chester Luz K and Stanley Walters of Bay City, Mich., were arrested at Valparaiso Oct. 7, charged with having stolen a Buick automobile belonging to E. A. Graff of 612 Lindsey st., on Sept. 24 and in which they were traveling at the time of their arrest.

Fail to Prosecute.
The car was turned over to Mr. Graff and the two men locked up in the local jail where they have been until their release Tuesday night. Both Mr. Graff and the automobile insurance company stated at the time of the arrest that they intended preferring charges against the men, but failed to follow with any action.

Chief Cassidy stated that he believed the men to be guilty and did not want to release them until they were ordered to. He said, "the police are doing their best to clean up this business of automobile thieves but it is finding the hands of the law. The last time I saw the thieves in the court room as the owners seem to be satisfied when they get their cars back and will not protest their neighbors car being having the men sentenced and cleaning up the city in general."

document asked Mr. Patton if he did not tell an examiner for the commission that he operated in 1920 for \$1.95 a ton. He denied this saying that the examiner told him the figure was \$3.31 and that that was only approximate as he did not take the figure from his books. A. L. Donaldson, chief accountant of the board of coal counts, who visited Mr. Patton's firm testified that he made no examination of the books but that as he remembered it Mr. Patton had told him the price per ton was \$3.31 but had added that his books were not in shape and he could not give an accurate statement.

Lafayette Man on Stand.
Elbert Schmeibel of the Schmeibel Coal company of Lafayette, said the cost per ton of his firm from April 1 to October 1, was \$3.51 a ton. He said the hills in Lafayette made the cost of hauling heavier than it otherwise would be. He said he had found it impossible to get any Indiana coal during the last week. Mark Brown of J. M. Leach Mfg. Co. charged again that there was a "conspiracy of silence" against the democratic cause in the republican camp and the republican officials' campaign book in failing to print the league covenant.

M'ADOO CAMPAIGNS IN COAL REGIONS

CONNELLSVILLE, Pa., Oct. 13.—William G. McAdoo, campaigning for the democratic party, entered the coal regions of western Pennsylvania Wednesday and made a number of addresses in which he urged ratification of the League of Nations covenant. Mr. McAdoo in his address here described the league as one of the greatest ever conceived by human minds and declared that "if James M. Cox were to leave the league and Warren Harding were to be elected, I would support Harding because I know that the future rests more on a settlement of this basic question than on any other. I would have every party tie on earth and stand for the principle of this league."

Views on League.
Gov. Cox gave his views upon the League of Nations and a variety of other subjects Wednesday at a number of rallies in many Indiana counties. Cox's house was the scene of the candidate's forums, and Hoosier democrats, with flags, badges, brass bands and automobiles, were out in force for what the governor termed his "town meetings."

Besides national issue, Gov. Cox urged election of Thomas Taggart, democratic candidate for United States senator from Indiana, who shared audiences with the governor.

Gov. Cox emphasized democratic league arguments and again charged Sen. Harding, his republican opponent, with "selling out." He also repeated that Sen. Harding was the candidate of the "senatorial oligarchy."

"Conspiracy of Silence."
"How can you expect a government responsive to the people," the governor asked, "if you elect the candidate of the senatorial oligarchy?" Gov. Cox asked his audience to act without parties, splits and as Americans, reiterating that he had no quarrel with the rank and file of republicans, but only with the "senatorial oligarchy." He charged again that there was a "conspiracy of silence" against the democratic cause in the republican camp and the republican officials' campaign book in failing to print the league covenant.

SOFT COAL BARONS HOLD ANNUAL MEET

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—There will be no serious bituminous coal shortage in any part of the country this winter, provided ordinary care is exercised by consumers, it was predicted here Wednesday at a conference of the National Coal Association, which comprises about two thirds of the bituminous coal producers of the United States.

The coal operators however, declared that in various parts of the markets supplied, steady work in the and a sufficient supply of railroad cars also would be required.

At this time it was stated, bituminous operators were getting on about 25 to 30 percent of the open top cars needed.

A special committee which has been working on the problem of cooperative agencies to prevent a winter fuel shortage reported that the Interstate Commerce commission, railroads, big coal dealers and others were cooperating to increase production and improve transportation and distribution facilities.

LABOR LEADER MAKES SPEECH AT BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 13.—In an address delivered here Wednesday before a crowd of many thousands, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, denied reports that he could "deliver the goods" to the democratic party, and said no person ever heard such an utterance coming from him.

Mr. Gompers said he owed allegiance to no political party, that he was a partisan to principles and labor. "We are not bolsheviks," continued Mr. Gompers, "nor have we any hands on the throat of the government. We purpose to exercise our rights solely as American citizens."

"I control only one vote, and that vote is my own. I can only align myself against the man who has lined himself with the reactionary interests and against the interests of the working people. I am going to vote all I can to elect the man for Harding and that police-bait Coolidge, but for Cox and Roosevelt."

CUMMINGS DELIVERS SPEECH AT BRAZIL

BRAZIL, Ind., Oct. 13.—In his annual report to the democratic party here Wednesday night, Homer S. Cummings, former national chairman of the democratic committee, pointed to the record made by the administration during the past eight years, which is credited with the passage of revision of the tariff laws, the postal savings law, farm loan law and other progressive measures which have been enacted in that time.

He attacked the republican party and its influence as driving President Wilson to an early grave by its persistence in the fight against the League of Nations. Mr. Cummings reviewed the accomplishments of the administration since March 4, 1913, giving special stress to legislation favoring the farmer and laborer.
