

ADDITIONAL FUNDS GRANTED FOR USE OF COUNTY OFFICES

Commissioners Approve Bud-
get of \$44,685.09 for
Rest of Year.

Additional appropriations for the
last year to take care of the ex-
penses of the county office were
made by the board of county com-
missioners at their last meeting of
the year on Tuesday. Additional ex-
penses amounting to \$44,685.09 were
approved by the board, and \$11,089
as estimated expenses of some of
the offices for the year 1921 were
made.

Appropriations to take care of de-
ficits in the following amounts were
made: County Auditor, \$750, county
auditor, \$1,196.61, county assessor,
\$16,45, for assessing Portage town-
ship, \$980.25, law library, \$2,212.92, coun-
ty jail upkeep, \$1,140.24, poor farm,
\$4,490.23, state penal and benevolent
institutions, \$8,490, general and
special elections, and primary elec-
tions, \$19,100, bridge on Irwin road,
\$1,755, bridge on Quaking Asp. road,
\$1,975, circuit court judge salary,
\$1,000, court room expenses, including
library, \$500, superior court reporter
and supplies, \$300, supplies re-
pays on court room, and printing of
bar dockets, \$500.

Appropriations for the next year
were made as follows: county recorder,
\$2,475, county health com-
missioner office, \$300, county com-
missioners' court, \$1,125, primary
election, \$1,200, bridge over Fellows
R., \$5,885.

SOUTH BEND MAN IS POLISH PHONOGRAPH CONCERN DIRECTOR

Ignatius K. Werwinski, 1044 W.
Division st., is one of the directors
of the new Polonia Phonograph Co.,
which is being organized in Mil-
waukee. Werwinski is the president
of manufacturing Polish records,
phonographs and soft players. The
new firm is incorporated for \$500,
000. The firm made experiments
on Polish records at their laborato-
ries in New York and will be
the first company to manufacture
records for Polish people.

According to an announcement of
Mr. Werwinski the greatest Polish
phonograph company in the world is
the Polonia Phonograph Co. The other
organizers of the concern are Prof.
Stanley J. Zwierzchowski of Ann
Arbor University; Sen. Louis Fons,
of Milwaukee, Wis.; C. Dzidulewicz,
manager and treasurer of the Daily
Kurier Polski, Milwaukee; and Artis-
tis W. Czerwinski, manufacturer of
records in New York city.

FLOOD LOTS FOR ICE SKATING RINKS

Provide Places of Recreation
For School Children.

Several lots have been flooded in
various parts of the city by the re-
creational department with a pur-
pose of providing ice skating rinks
for school children. Electric light-
ing systems will be installed at
each rink, according to Col. C. Sey-
mour Bullock, who is head of the
city recreational department.

The J. D. Oliver Athletic field and
the lot at Maple and Jefferson will
be used this week if the
weather is cold enough to insure the
forming of ice. Part of the River
Park school grounds were flooded
some time ago, and that rink is
proving a source of great enjoyment,
according to its sponsors.

Seeks Possession and Damages From Tenant

Levi M. Truex filed suit in the cir-
cuit court Wednesday against Elijah P.
Truex to regain possession of the
farm which the plaintiff had rented to
him, and to recover damages for
non-payment of rental which he
alleged to have due him. Accord-
ing to the complaint, the plaintiff
rented a farm to the defendant for
a term of five years, and one of the
provisions of the contract was that
the farm would revert to the owner
if the rental was not paid promptly
on demand. The owner now alleges
that the rental is due, and that
possession of the land should be
given him by the court.

He also alleged that the land has
not been farmed properly, that the
crops remain unhusked in the field,
that no fertilizer was used on the
land, and that crops were not planted
according to his directions. Com-
plaint is also made that half the
products of the farm have not been
turned over to him, and for that
reason he asks damages in the sum
of \$1,500 and possession of the
farm.
