MINE STRIKE IS UNION'S THREAT

Failure of Coal Magnates to Attend Meeting Causes Cancellation Today.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—A new threat of a strike of bituminous coal miners of America was seen here today when a preliminary wage conference between operators and miners, was cancelled by the union.

John L. Lewis, president of the United Miners, declared that certain mine operators in Pennsylvania and Ohio who had forced calling off the conference by refusing to attend, would be compelled to meet the miners "in due time by circumstances."

The meeting was scheduled to be held in Pittsburgh this week.

Mine operators in Indiana and Illinois had conditionally accepted the proposal to attend the conference.

Lewis would not say what the next step of the miners would be but his statement was interpreted in mine union headquarters here to mean that if the operators would not consent to a conference by April, when the present contract expires, a walk-out would result.

"Bandit" Son Not Guilty, Mother Says

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—"My boy never has been in trouble before. It was terrible. He says the other young man coaxed him into helping rob the Waverly bank of \$1,500 and called him yellow when he at first refused."

Mrs. Edith Shonfield, of Wabash, refined and cultured, sobbed out this story of the Waverly bank robbery, following which her son, Rudolph, 28, was shot through the abdomen. The boy was lying on a hospital cot here with a fair chance for recovery.

"I'm going to stay here until he's out of danger," she said.

The other boy she referred to was Elzo Clevenger, 23, of Muncie, who was taken by Sheriff Lafe Scott of Morgan county, after a half-mile chase. Clevenger is being held at Martinsville.

HOLD UP OFFICE, GET \$6,700 FROM SAFES

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 4.—Two armed men held up the office of Gaetano Viviani, commission merchant, this afternoon, rifled the safe and escaped with \$4,800 in cash and \$1,900 in checks, some of them negotiable.

The robbers bound Viviani and J. A. Pierce, his bookkeeper to chairs while they went through the safe.

PUT PHONE RATE INCREASE UP TO JUDGE ANDERSON

Fort Wayne Case Will Set Precedent in Cases of Its Kind.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—The Home Telephone and Telegraph Co. of Fort Wayne would be permitted to increase its rates to the schedule rejected by the Public Service Commission under recommendations filed with Federal Judge A. B. Anderson Wednesday by Charles Martindale, Master in Chancery.

Martindale held the order of the Public Service Commission, refusing the company the increases for which it petitioned was confiscatory. He recommended, however, that the company be required to give a bond of \$250,000 conditional to return to the subscribers of the excess recommended by the company above any schedule of rates which the commission may hereafter establish and found to allow a reasonable return on the investment.

Judge Anderson will have to rule.

on the recommendations, but there has been no indication when his ruling will come.

Under Martindale's recommendations, the company would charge \$4 for a single party business telephone in Fort Wayne; \$5 for two party business phones; \$4 for four party residence phones; \$2.25 for individual residence lines and \$1.75 for four party residence lines.

The report is the outcome of a suit brought by the telephone company to enjoin the commission from putting its orders into effect on the ground they were confiscatory. It was the first case of the kind ever filed in federal court and Judge Anderson's decision will have far reaching effect on similar litigation in the future.
