To Keep the Hands Smooth.—Take glycerine and ammonia equal parts; wash the hands clean, and, with a wet towel, rub in one hand and rub well over and dry.

To Take Out Scorch.—If a shirt bosom or any other article has been scorched in ironing, lay it where bright sunshine will fall directly on it. It will take it entirely out.

A cement that is fire and water proof is made of pulverized litharge five pounds, fine Paris white two pounds, yellow ochre four ounces, hump (cut into shreds) half an ounce; all mixed to the density of thick putty, with boiled linseed oil.

To Remove Stains.—To remove ink-stains from paper use cyanide of potassium and oxalic acid. To remove grease from paper dip a small bit in benzine and draw it gently over both sides of the paper until the grease disappears. Then dip another in highly rectified spirits of wine and draw it, in a like manner over the place, and particularly around the edges, to remove the border that would still present a stain. The paper, before commencing the above described operation, should be gently warmed, and as much grease as possible taken out with a piece of blotting paper.

Offensive breath.—From six to ten drops of the concentrated solution of chloride of soda in a wine glass full of pure spring water, taken immediately after the ablutions of the morning are completed, will sweeten the breath by disinfecting the stomach, which, far from being injured, will be benefited by the medicine. It is necessary that the water be kept in the middle of the day. In some cases the odor from carious teeth is combined with that of the stomach. If the mouth is well rinsed with a tea-spoonful of the chloride in a tumbler of water the bad odor of the teeth will be removed.

To Kill Bedbugs.—The only certain cure for bedbugs is a solution of corrosive sublimate, which may be had at the druggist's. The bedsteads should be taken apart and washed with cold water and hard soap; then, with a small flat brush, the poison should be applied to every crack and crevice where a bug may harbor. The poison should be used once or twice a week, as may be necessary. It is a work of time and patience, but if persevered in this remedy will effectually destroy the bugs. Corrosive sublimate is a deadly poison, and should be kept out of the way of children and servants.

Pretty hanging baskets can be made of oyster or peach cans, by removing one end, and cutting them in strips one-third of an inch wide, leaving one-half of an inch at the bottom. Press it in the shape you desire, and clinch the ends at the top over a strong wire, several inches larger in circumference than the bottom of the can. Paint it green, and when dry line it with green moss from the woods or with cultivated moss from the garden. Fill with good, rich soil and plant therein some pretty trailing vine. Suspend it at the window by a wire or tiny chain. This is indeed a 'thing of beauty,' if kept in a thrifty condition. Hang it over and in a part of rain water occasionally to water the moss.
