**GUITEAU'S PRECIOUS BOOK.**  
Bible from Which He Drew His Inspiration to Murder Garfield.

A relic of Charles J. Guiteau, the murderer of President Garfield, is preserved in this city with great care. It is nothing less than the assassin's Bible, one which he used for years, and it passed from his possession only a few days before he started the whole world by penetrating one of the greatest crimes of modern and ancient history. A few days previous to his departure for Washington he was a guest of the Palmer House, Chicago, and after he left a well-thumbed copy of the New Testament, St. James edition, was found in the room he had vacated. It will be remembered that the murderer claimed that his crime was the result of inspiration derived from the Bible, consequently it was the testament in question that is responsible for the lamented President's deplorable death. Manager Frank Brobst of the Hollenden was a clerk in the Palmer House when the volume was found and has kept possession of it since.

The testament is an ordinary Russian-leather-bound volume, twelve inches long and eight inches wide. The text is in large type and its general appearance is that of a book that had been in constant use. On its fly leaf is written in a bold, strong hand:

\* **CHARLES J. GUITEAU** \*  
7 April, 1877.

This is not the only relic which Mr. Brobst possesses. He prizes very highly an autograph letter from Lawrence Barrett, engaging rooms in the big Chicago caravansary. It contains this remark: "I would prefer the other side, for the State street front is too noisy for a weary man." This letter was penned only a month previous to the great actor's death. Tied to the Barrett letter with a piece of ribbon is a letter from Edwin Booth, returning the key to a writing desk in a room Mr. Booth occupied a month before. This letter bears the date of Nov. 20, 1887.

General and Mrs. McClellan, Miss McClellan and George B. McClellan registered at the Chicago hotel Sept. 12, 1885. Mr. Brobst has their signatures cut from the register as well as the familiar handwriting of the late Vice President T. A. Hendricks, who registered Nov. 16, 1885. In addition Mr. Brobst has a collection of 500 badges worn on historic events, some of which are made of gold and others of silver.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

The ordinary pensions are not granted if the officer was twenty-five years older than his wife.


