PURDUE AGRICULTURE ALUMNI TO GIVE 5 RADIO PROGRAMS, DEC. 6 TO 10

Lafayette, Ind., Dec. 2.—Plans have been completed for Hoosier agriculture to go on the air with a series of five radio programs, all scheduled during the noon hour of the week of Dec. 5 to 10, Ed. Menefee chairman of the Purdue University agricultural alumni radio committee, has announced.

Forty-five-minute programs of "fun and fundamentals" will be presented over the following stations: December 5, WIND at Gary, 12:15 to 1 o'clock; December 6, WOWO at Ft. Wayne, 11 to 11:45 o'clock; December 7, WFBM at Indianapolis, 11:30 to 12:15 o'clock; December 8, WGBF at Evansville, 10:15 to 11 o'clock. Climaxing the week's farm radio broadcasting will be a 30-minute program Saturday morning, December 10, 7:30 to 8 o'clock over WLW at Cincinnati. All time is C. S. T.

County agricultural agents, Purdue specialists, Purdue alumni, Indiana's outstanding farmers who are cooperating with the University's many farm projects, and others will appear on each of these programs, Menefee said. Each program will be distinctly different and will present information of vital importance to all farmers.

Providing entertainment on these programs, Menefee has arranged with A. P. Stewart, Purdue choral director, for many of the state's outstanding county home economics choruses to sing songs popular with Hoosier rural folks. On the WLW program, music will be furnished by the famous Purdue Military Band and the Purdue Choral Societies.

NEW HISTORICAL SITES DEVELOPED FOR TOURISTS

Three more historical sites have been developed and opened for tourists during the past fiscal year, bringing the total of national parks to 144 which cover more than 19,000,000 acres in the United States, Alaska, and Hawaii, according to Bert Vanderwarf, head of the Chicago Motor club touring bureau.

The new parks include Olympic park in Olympic Peninsula, Washington; Saratoga National Historical park, New York; and the Salem National Historical site, Massachusetts.

"Tourists to national parks number more than fifteen million at the close of the 1937 travel year. September 30, 1937, but as ten national parks have been added since that time the parks' attendance record should be shattered by nearly a million this year," Mr. Vanderwarf predicted.
