ELKHART CO. FAIR TO BE OF INTEREST TO EVERYONE

Less than two weeks remain until the opening of the 66th annual Elkhart County Fair to be held from Tuesday, Aug. 29, thru Saturday, Sept. 2.

One farmer who attends the fair regularly, asked to give his opinion, said, "It honestly pays to buy a season ticket for the Elkhart County Fair for you can't see the displays or take in the entertainment in one day—I spend most of the week there."

"Above all to me, is the work of the 4-H club boys and girls and the livestock exhibits. Since I like horses, the harness races occupy my attention, so I spend the evenings taking in all the the exhibits. I suppose there are many different types of people who attend the fair, and they sure offer other means of entertainment, too, which may interest them, not me."

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In addition to the features mentioned by Mr. Farmer is Ward Beam's Congress of Daredevils on Tuesday night only. A musical "Golden Gate Revue" is offered on the other four nights. Fireworks climax the evening show. On the midway will be the Blue ribbon unit of 16 shows and rides. Novel acts will be presented daily between race heats and there's the horse pulling contest on Saturday afternoon.

Exhibit buildings, barns and stalls are open night and day for fair patrons to see the hundreds of articles on display for premiums.

Season tickets are still on sale for one dollar, admitting two persons, four days and four nights, at Wayne's Grill and Thornburg's Drug Store, here.

BARBERRY ERADICATION METHODS TO BE SHOWN

The Barberry Eradication demonstration to be staged in the Purdue Building at the 1939 Indiana State Fair will show three main points; where to look for, how to recognize, and what to do about common barberry.

A large map will be on display in the building on which will be shown the location of each barberry bush located and killed in Indiana. By looking at this map, fair visitors will be able to determine whether or not any of the outlaw barberry bushes have been located and killed in their own neighborhoods. Visitors from neighborhoods where barberry bushes have been found will be impressed with the necessity of looking closely around their own premises for additional barberry.

Large colored drawing will give spectators a clear picture of the weed. The four distinguishing characteristics of the barberry will be shown—the leaves with spiny edges, the thorns with three prongs, the berries in clusters, and the inner bark bright yellow.

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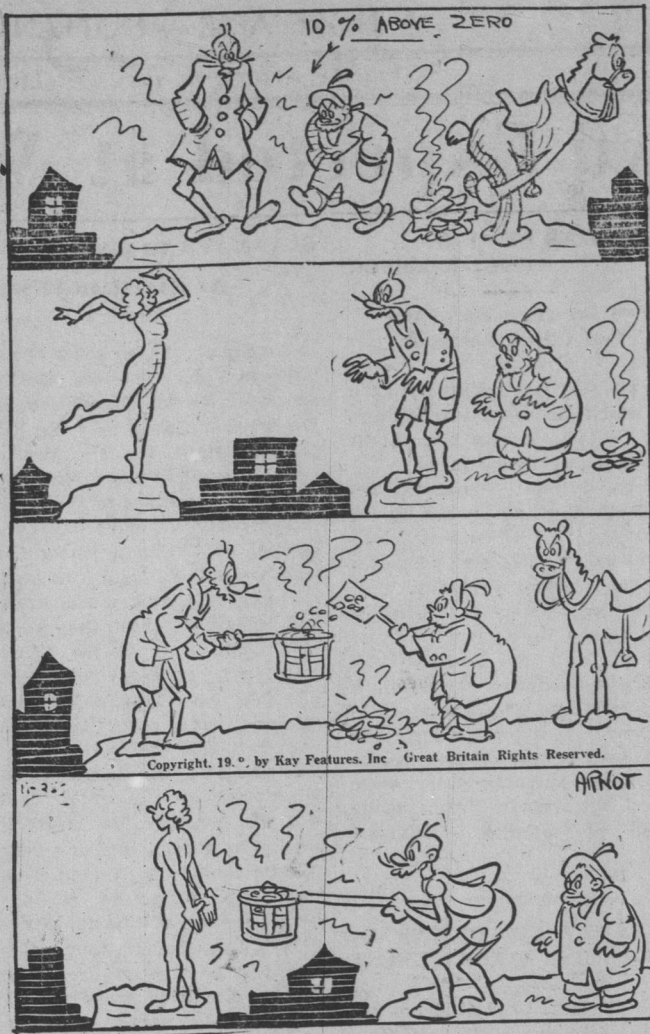
