### HOOSIERS TO ENJOY SIX-DAY PHEASANT SEASON: NOV. 10-16

A six-day open season on cock pheasants in Indiana this fall, Nov. 10 to 15 inclusive, adding a day to the open season this year, was announced today by a spokesman for the Department of Conservation, following a statewide investigation into the number of pheasants and results of the 1938 hunting season.

Under the terms of the order issued by the Division of Fish and Game under provisions of a 1937 act of the General Assembly, a daily bag limit of two cock birds and a possession limit of four cock birds has been established. There is no open season on hen pheasants.

During the last fiscal year, the Division of Fish and Game with the cooperation of the local conservation clubs, propagated and liberated more than 42,000 pheasants in Indiana.


