Besides his several pastorates in Wisconsin and Indiana, he has had considerable experience in the evangelistic field extending into the Canadian Northwest. The Raricks moved here from four years of superintending the Mexico Welfare Home, near Peru, Indiana.

In addition to the splendid pastoral service rendered the local Church of the Brethren, Rev. Mr. Rarick has been very active in good cooperation with the other ministers of the town, in promotion of community projects for moral and spiritual welfare. He is this year's president of the Syracuse Ministerial Association.

The District Ministerial and Mission Boards of the denomination have oversight of the church at Syracuse and will assist the church in plans to carry on, with preaching appointments filled, until next March. There are indications that another pastor may be located then in the person of Rev. J. S. Zigler, who is at present located at Rock Run.
