LIVESTOCK NEWS

(Reported by John Clay

With consumers all "talking turkey," the dressed meat trade continues on a weak basis, while supplies of beef, pork and lamb yielding materials are of generous volume; in fact, receipts of hogs are largest of the year. The cattle run is made up largely of fed stock, rangers having dwindled to insignificant size, as has the run of fat range lambs. Demand continues active for stocker cattle and feeder lambs.

Little cattle—both steers and heifers—are selling to relatively killer demand than stronger weight steers, the latter arriving freely after being held back in anticipation of higher prices which did not materialize. Greater quota of the hog offering is made up of spring-farrowed pigs averaging from 190 to 240 lbs. which are selling within the narrowest spread of the season. Buyers are favoring full wool lambs, a favorable pelt-credit allowance acting against shorn stock.

Meat stocks at the outset of this month showed substantial increases compared with a year earlier, gains being as follows: Beef, 20 per cent; pork, 9 per cent; all meats and edible offal, 10 per cent; lard, 1 per cent. Compared with a month ago, however, beef increased 33 per cent, pork dropped 9 per cent, with all meats off 4 per cent and lard down 10 per cent. All classes show decrease compared with the November 1 fine average.

Handicapping the dressed products, particularly beef and lamb at this time, however, is the large amount of turkey in storage. Holdings on November 1 were 8,028,000 lbs., a supply of more than double the total of a year earlier and also more than 50 per cent in excess of the five-year average for this period. All kinds of poultry also show a much larger total than a month earlier and an excess compared with both a year ago and the November 1 five-year average.

TRAPPING SEASON OPENS WEDNESDAY

Harvesting of Indiana's fur crop—valued at more than \$600,000—was started Wednesday, Nov. 15, in the new Northern Zone, located north of U. S. Road 40, Virgil M. Simmons, commissioner of the Department of Conservation said today. The trapping season in the Southern Zone, located south of U. S. Road 40, does not open until Saturday, Nov. 25.

The fur bearing animals which may be taken during the open season include:

Indiana laws require that all persons have a license; that permission be obtained to trap on the lands of another; that no trap or any part of a trap be set before 12 o'clock noon of the day immediately preceding the opening of the trapping season; make it unlawful to smoke, chop or dig fur-bearing animals from dens; prohibit the setting of a trap within five feet of the opening of

a tile drain eight inches or larger in diameter; bar the use of ferrets or mechanical device to frighten animals from their holes; provide for the confiscation of equipment and appliances used in violation of the trapping, hunting and fishing laws; and make it unlawful to engage in the business of buying untanned furs of fur-bearing animals without a license.
