Race Chairman Grew Up With Boats.

E. J. Stroud, chairman of the Wawasee Yacht Club race committee, has literally been associated with boats throughout his entire life. Mr. Stroud was born on Lake Erie at Sandusky, Ohio. He laughingly relates that whenever the Coast Guard got a report of impending rough weather, their first duty was to telephone his father and urge him to get those Stroud kids off the lake.

Mr. Stroud has built thirty sailboat models; his first when a boy six years of age. In 1890, his model sloop placed first in a model sail boat regatta sponsored by the Interlakes Model Yachting Association at Put-in-Bay.

One of his early attempts at power models was a steam propelled model which he built to compete with the English model "Evil Spirit." This model was disqualified because of two pounds of excessive weight.

His latest model is a 36 inch, one-half horsepower speed boat which he has entered in the regatta sponsored by the International Model Power Boat Association at Detroit on July 3, 4 and 5.

As a youth, he was often employed in the ship yards at Sandusky and has helped to hew by hand timbers used in construction of Great Lake tugs and freighters constructed entirely of wood.

He has been chairman of the club race committee for four years and served as chairman in 1938 when the Wawasee Club was host to the Snipe International Races.

Lombardy Poplars Donated to Club.
