SWAMPS VS. BEAUTY (by R. J. C.)

Way back, some 15 years ago, the Town Dads of Syracuse began taking an active interest in cleaning up the swamps and cattail growths in our city. There are at least three such places that have been transformed into beauty spots over a period of years.

The board began each of these projects by filling in with caps, bricks, etc., then covering with ashes and dirt. These holes were places of stagnation, underbrush, dangerous to health, and a breeding place for mosquitos. The city park on the lake, was formerly a dump. The Crosson Mill Park was another, and the north side of the Race was another. Today, these three places are beautiful. Various civic groups and individuals have helped in this work.

The question that has arisen today by the people vs. the town board is: How about the south side of the Race near the B. and O. tracks. Many people remark of the eye sore there—the discarded Heinz 57 varieties containers and other rubbish. In talking with members of the town board this week, we find that they have been working at the job of filling in this section. The town truck picks up your rubbish and dumps it at this point, with orders to always cover tin cans, etc., with ashes. The tin cans you see as you drive along is very likely the load that "Pa" took down on the side of the car a few days ago and thrown off, drove away and then maybe raised heck on the street corner because of the mess left on this property.

The State Board of Health was consulted, but they offered no better solution.

A little more patience with the town board is suggested. We will have a beautiful lake front there, ideal for picnic supper or just plain relaxation. The B. & O. railroad might contribute a few car loads of cinders to help hurry up this work of filling in.

Another place in town similar to the one on the Race, is the lot owned by Pete Harkless, north of his garage, on road 13. Mr. Harkless has been begging the town to help him fill in that hole, and he has spent money himself in filling and covering the rubbish that other folks dump there. This eye sore, also, is going to be wiped off as quickly as possible.

How about everybody having a "Town Board Day" in your thoughts. Give them some advice personally, suggest ways of helping and always boost! It would not hurt, perhaps, to get behind and give a big shove!

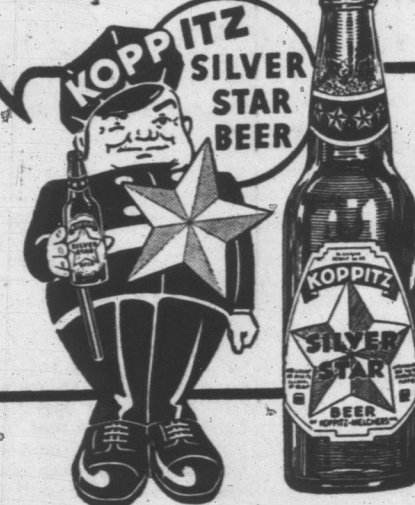
