CHICAGO MARKETS

(Reported by John Clay & Co.)

The hog-price "floor" lagged dangerously at the week's outset under pressure of the largest supply over the country in two decades. All offerings outside the government bracket weights lost ground. Hog growers are under necessity of marketing the largest number ever grown and, to date, are encountering a lot of grief in getting stock cleared, owing to manpower shortage in packingtown.

Killers were called upon to process over 7 1/2 million hogs in December, an all-time high, the tonnage of which was 10 percent in excess of the previous month and 13 percent greater than December, 1942. In order to prevent complete congestion of storage facilities extra pork will be made available to civilians on their ration stamps until Jan. 18.

Federal control of cattle prices officially became operative Monday of this week which resulted in decidedly erratic bidding at lower prices on rank and file offerings. Naturally, buyers are desirous of sharing in subsidy payments and in order to do so had to purchase cattle within prescribed limits.

Sheep and lambs, not under government control so far as live offerings are concerned, are selling on a fairly even set of markets at highest prices in over a month. Finished lambs scaling up to 105 lbs. are cashing at the market top, but weights from 90 to 96 lbs. are preferred.
