tax.

War Message to Congress April 2,
1917." This was very impressive.

Call," which was well given.

dresses to Congress. The audience
was enthused by Moseilpe Strie-

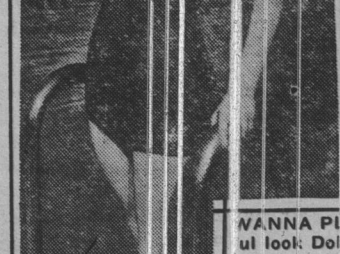

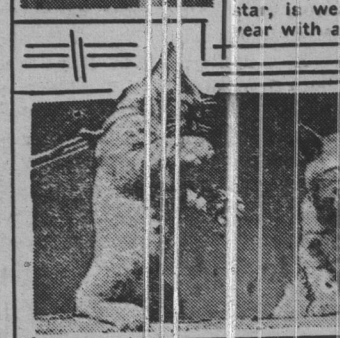

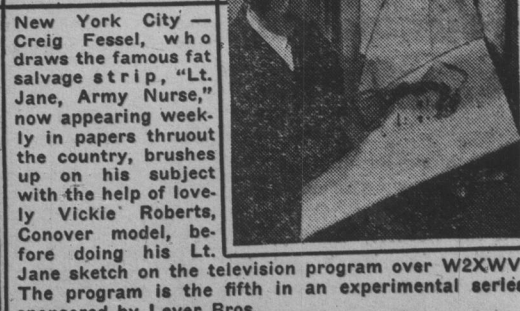
BACK TO THE HORSE! — It's news — Man bites dog! —

Note the superior smirk on that equine countenance!



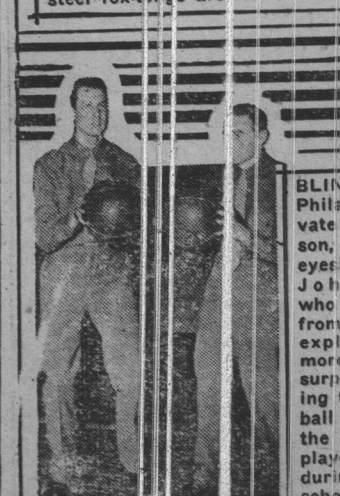
WANNA PLAY? — At least that's a play-

year with a "Coke."



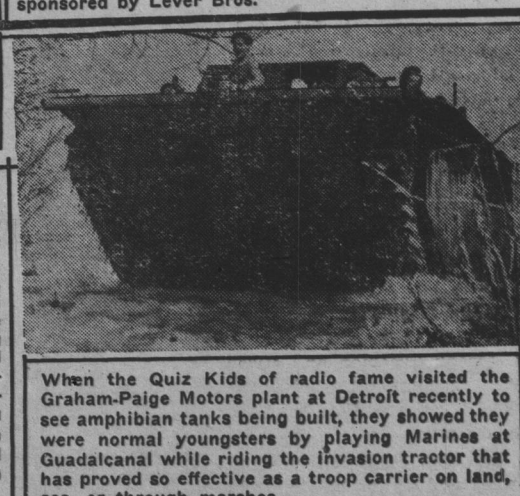
WILDCAT CAPTURE—Livingston, Mont.—

sponsored by Lever Bros.

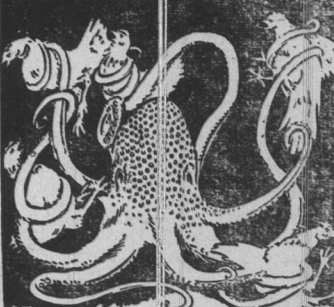


BLIND SIGHT —
