Harlingen Army Air Field, Tex.—Another class of aerial triggermen to guard Army Air Forces' bombers who graduated this week from the aerial gunnery school of the AAF training command, and among the qualified "Sharpshooters of the Sky" was Cpl. Daniel C. Levernier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin W. Levernier, of Syracuse, Ind. Along with his diploma he received a pair of Aerial Gunner's wings and a promotion in grade. Besides learning to fire every type weapon from camera guns to the deadly caliber .50 Brownings, he studied turret manipulation, aircraft identification and learned to tear down and assemble machine guns while blindfolded. He climaxed the course by firing on towed targets

from Texan training planes, medium bombers and Liberators.
