Gentlemen: Today something

happened on Syracuse lake that

we think worthy of front page

news. It's to do with a Syracuse

gentleman's idea of Sportsman-

ship. You can use it or not, but it

is being related exactly as it hap-

pened to five Nappanee ladies

this afternoon during their first

experience at ice fishing. Inciden-

tally, they've never been informed

to any great extent on the ethics

of ice fishing as to who cuts who's

holes or who uses who's holes in

the absence of who. We'll sign

our names and back up this story

should you care to know more

about it. It will be news this

week and thought it would be best

to send it now in the event you

get as much fun out of it as we

have and care to use it.

We drove to the lake at 11:00

a. m., and saw two men coming off

the lake. To be friendly (or

was it unfriendly?) we asked how

the fish were biting. They an-

swered that they hadn't started

fishing yet. These are the same

two men that returned later in

the day. One seemed like a gentle-

man and we didn't learn his name.

The other acted like a spoilt boy
