The funds were collected after
the distribution in June.
The 17 towns received
\$284,527.43, and the 12 towns
\$42,154.97, and the four libra-
ries \$9,304.76. The city of War-
saw received \$47,841.13 and the
Warsaw schools, \$47,939.73.

The county general fund re-
ceived \$65,417.06, the county
welfare fund \$36,092.17 and the
state of Indiana \$36,497.05.

Collections on which the dis-
tributions was based were \$567,-
969.85 on general property and
polls; \$14,049.59 on banks and
\$79.68 on building and loan as-
sociations.

During the period of 6 months,
a total of \$27,050.70 was collected
on ditch assessments.

The checks to the taxing units
were to be mailed out or distributed
before the close of business Friday.

Feed about the usual number
of beef cattle and plan your opera-
tions to sell good and choice
cattle in late summer or early
fall. Build up breeding herd op-
erations to make best use of pas-
ture and forage.

Demand for dairy products will
be strong, so hold good cows and
heifers even if they fall in value.
Avoid buying high-priced cows
unless you can pay cash for them.

As for hogs, push spring litters
fast to 225 pounds for the early
market. Feed a good balanced ra-
tion. It's a good idea to breed
more gilts for late spring farrow-
ing.

Order chicks early to have pul-
lets in production for the peak
egg price season in the fall. Feed
well, cut production costs, and
improve egg quality.

In the grain picture, cut wheat
acreage, keep up soybean acreage
if possible, and hold your corn
under loan or purchase contract.
If you will need corn for
summer and early fall feeding,
buy it this winter.

WOULD FORECLOSE LIEN

Cleo and Carlyle G. Weaver, of
Syracuse, doing business as C. W.
Weaver & Son, have filed an ac-
tion in circuit court to foreclose
a mechanic's lien against the
Spink-Wawasee hotel property
on the north shore of Lake Wawasee.

The action names John F.
Noll, bishop of the Catholic di-
ocese of Fort Wayne, as the de-
fendant, the property having
been acquired by the church for
school purposes. The Weavers
ask judgment of \$2,800 for com-
