This Story Has A Beard

"ALL THE LADIES like whiskers and they would tease their husbands to vote for you, and then you would be president."
This might sound rather lame advice to most presidential candidates today, especially coming from an 11-year-old girl, but one candidate took the suggestion to heart, and sure enough, he became president. He was Abraham Lincoln.

Abc, whose bearded portrait schoolchildren of today salute throughout the nation, would have remained clean-shaven and might have been characterized by his sunken cheeks had not little Grace Bedell, Chautauque, N. Y., schoolgirl written him that he certainly would let his whiskers grow. Lincoln received her letter shortly before the 1860 election.

On his way to inauguration four months later, Lincoln looked up the little girl at Westfield, N. Y., and before an assembled crowd, shook her hand, kissed her, and said:

"You see, Grace, I let these whiskers grow for you."
That Lincoln had a troublesome debate with himself over growing a beard is evidenced in the letter Grace received from him:
"As to whiskers, having never worn any, do you not think people would call it a piece of silly affectation if I were to begin it now?"
But history, and Grace herself, saw the triumph of her suggestion, and Lincoln is characterized as a man with a beard—although he wore it less than five years.

Little Grace, later Mrs. Grace Bedell, died on election night, 1896, at Delphos, Kans., at the age of 86.
