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DR. JUDD'S QUESTIONS
No one in Congress is better in-
formed on the problems of Asia,
in our opinion, than Rep. Walter
H. Judd. The Minnesotan spent
many years of his life in China as
a medical missionary. He is a man
of deep religious convictions. His
attitude on Asia is not that of a
mere partisan; he speaks as an
authority. We believe his col-
leagues would agree that his
alignment with the party of his
choice has never stood in the way
of his devotion to what is best for

America and the peace of the
world.
It is, therefore, with more than
ordinary concern that we repro-
duce here a series of 14 questions
which Dr. Judd poses. We do not
have the answers but the Ameri-
can people, in lieu of an honest
response from members of the ad-
ministration responsible, can ask
themselves the same question Dr.
Judd has asked. What hope can
there be for peace under this ad-
ministration?
The questions follow:
1. What went with the \$95-
000,000,000 spent on national de-
fense since World War II?
2. Why did only \$1 out of
every seven defense dollars go for
combat equipment between 1946
and 1950?
3. Why did President Truman
limit the Air Force to 48 groups
when the Republican 80th Con-
gress ordered the Air Force ex-
panded to 70 groups?

4. Why, if Communism was a
menace in Asia, were there only
six General Pershing tanks, only
30 propellant (tactical) combat
planes, only one aircraft carrier,
and not a single combat marine in
the Japanese area when we enter-
ed the Korean conflict?
5. Why did President Truman
on Dec. 15, 1945, officially an-
nounce that unless our ally,
China, admitted Communists to
its Government China would get
no more American aid?
6. Who was best serving
America—the administrations
which for 50 years defended the
open door in China, or the Tru-
man Administration, which aban-
doned China to Soviet exploita-
tion?
7. Why, when Congress had
voted \$10,500,000 military aid
for South Korea eight months
earlier, had South Korea received
only \$200 worth of Signal Corps
wire when the Communists struck
June 25?
8. Whose advice was the Ad-
ministration following when it
asked last year for \$150,000,000
in economic aid for South Korea
—that if its long-time advisor,
Owen Lattimore, who said in July,
1949, that "The thing to do is let
South Korea fall but not to let it
look as though we pushed it—
hence the recommendation of a
partial grant of \$150,000,000"?
9. Why did Secretary of State
Acheson, virtually invite the Com-
munists to take Korea, Formosa,
and the balance of China by an-
nouncing Jan. 12, 1950, that they
were beyond "defense perimeter"?
10. On what basis did Presi-

dent Truman declare—only 27
days before "ordering American
troops into Korea—that we were
closer to a permanent peace
"than anytime in the last five
years?"
11. Which was wiser—the Ad-
ministration's appeasement policy
that enabled Russia, in five years
after World War II, to extend its
domination from 170,000,000 peo-
ple to 800,000,000 people, or Re-
publican insistence on a firm anti-
Communist policy?
12. After the Korean Commu-
nists are pushed beyond the 38th
Parallel, then what?
13. What will the Administra-
tion do in Asia in the future—re-
turn to appeasement?
14. What hope can there be for
peace under this Administration?

JOBLESS CLAIMS INCREASE LAST WEEK

As a result of a temporary lay-
off at the Studebaker plant in
South Bend, new job insurance
claims increased 3,700 during the
week ending October 14 to a total
of 9,006, according to John W.
Crise, director of the Indiana Em-
ployment Security Division.
All other areas in the state re-
ported a continued decline in
claims. Mr. Crise said, and claims
which last week totaled 17,731
are expected to drop below the
10,000 mark as soon as Stude-
baker resumes production.
Division offices in 25 Indiana
cities registered fewer job seekers
during the past week. Sixteen of-
fices also reported fewer job op-
enings although 13 had increases.
Twelve offices placed more work-
ers last week but there was some
tapering off in hiring evident with
many employers primarily making
only replacements.

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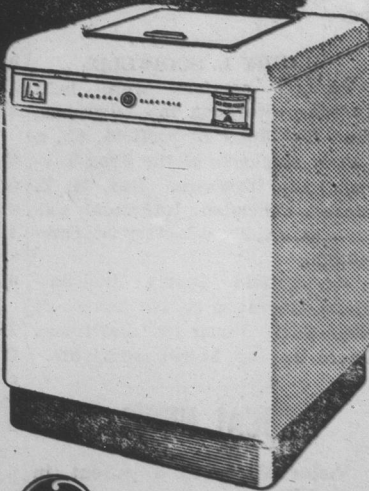
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
