Lesson for September 26: Matthew 5: 13-16; Acts 8: 4-6; 11 Corinthians 5: 14-21.
Golden Text: Matthew 5: 16.

Salt has been employed from the remote past as a preservative of food and it is significant that Jesus told his disciples that they were the salt of the earth. A devoted husband once told the writer how he dreaded to take his wife to live at a sawmill where conditions were rough and many of the men were wicked. But she insisted on going with him and with pride he told what a fine effect her presence and her influence had over the place.

But if the salt has lost its saltiness through adulteration, what good is it?

Jesus also likened Christians to a city set on a hill and to a light lifted on high. If the light borne by a man who is respected and trusted is allowed to grow dim and die out for lack of fuel and timely care, how great may the injury to those who have followed him as their example!

The love of Christ supports those who, witness for him and makes them to bear a bright and shining light amid the darkness of sin. They must lay aside all personal considerations and even the thought of Jesus as a man to think of him as the ever-living God who was in the world to reconcile men unto himself. This is our highest witness—to tell the world of a Savior who can cleanse and save unto the uttermost.
