Spiritual Life Mission Starts Next Week

A spiritual Life Mission during which Methodists will turn their attention toward deepening their own spiritual lives will be conducted at the Syracuse Methodist Church here next week.

Church members will be urged to practice the Holy habits at services which will begin with the regular worship hour Sunday morning, 17 Oct. Services will be conducted each evening Sunday through Friday at 7:30 p.m.

The Rev. Clair D. Siple of Crawfordsville, Ind., will be the guest minister and will preach at each of the services. The Rev. W. Noble Greene will return to his pulpit here Sunday morning, 24 Oct. for a climactic "Service of Victory." At this time covenants which have been made during the week to practice the Holy habits will be dedicated.

The Holy habits which church members will be urged to practice are regular church attendance, family devotions, prayer, daily Bible reading, tithing and witnessing their faith.

The Rev. Mr. Siple will preach on a different habit each evening. His topic Sunday morning is, "Deepening the Spiritual Life."

The Mission is being conducted in 1200 Methodist churches in the state in two different phases. The North Phase, which is being conducted next week, has as guest ministers men coming from the southern part of the state.

The South Phase will be conducted November 7-12 and will have ministers from the northern part of the state. The Rev. W. Noble Greene will be going to preach in the Bethel Methodist Church, Indianapolis, Indiana, at that time.

During the Sunday while he is away—7 November — laymen of the church will conduct the service.

In commenting the Mission to Methodists of Indiana Bishop Richard C. Raines, episcopal leader of the Methodist Church in the state, stated, "There is a growing awareness of our need for power, which God is ready to give, but which is not at present ours."

"The hope of peace in our world depends today on the spiritual insight and moral character of the American people. American life needs purification, a sounder sense of values, confidence born of faith in God, and dedication to a great cause."

"We need a revival — first in the hearts and homes of our own church people," he said. Next week Methodists will be aiming at a revival of their own hearts and homes through practice of the great principles of the Christian faith."
