## 8-Cent Tax Increase Proposed By County Officers

As approved this week for publication by the Board of County Commissioners, Kosciusko County's proposed 1956 tax rate is 8 cents higher than the 1955 rate. This fact was revealed Tuesday by County Auditor Earl Himes.

An increase in estimated expenses of \$53,178.50 over last year shows a new grand total of \$369,600.95. To raise this amount the commissioners have estimated a levy of 54 cents per \$100 valuation.

Kosciusko County's general fund levy is up from 28 cents to 34 cents, the welfare department levy from 13 to 15 cents, and both the cumulative bridge fund are static from last year at two and three cents, respectively.

Final tax rates to be paid by taxpayers in Syracuse and Turkey Creek Township will be available next month, with the review of local and county rates by state and county tax authorities.

**May Decrease Rate Here**  
Syracuse taxpayers and those living in Turkey Creek Township will probably find a decrease in the rate over last year since the township rate is 29 cents lower than last year. This lowering should compensate in the total rate for any increases made by the town or township bodies.

Specific increases in the salaries of county officers and in amounts appropriated for expenses are included in the proposed county budget. They include \$1,800 more for Judge Walker, \$400 for the circuit court, raises of \$340 and \$140 per year for two court house custodians, respectively; \$500 for the county agent's department; \$348 for the highway superintendent; \$480 for the highway clerk; \$900 for the first deputy sheriff; \$600 for the second deputy sheriff plus \$2,400 salary for a third deputy; \$300 for Mrs. Raymond Munson, county home matron; \$200 for Mrs. Carl Latta jail matron and an equal amount for additional help; \$100 for Dr. C. C. Dubois as county home physician; a \$600 raise for the county sanitarian and \$4,000 salary for an assistant sanitarian to be added to the county health department staff.

**List New Items**  
New items listed in the 1956 budget are \$500 for the county humane association and dog pound; \$2,000 for tuition for wards of court and transfers from the welfare department. Another increase is due to the fact that county employees are now eligible for the social security program, retroactive to Jan. 1 of this year.

Except for the sheriff's department the commissioners turned down requests by county officials for salary raises for their first and second deputies and approved only a \$27 annual increase for the third deputies.

The only decreases shown by departmental budgets are the estimates for maintaining the court house listed at \$22,500 for 1956 in comparison to \$26,110 this year, and the prosecuting attorney's budget for \$1,880 or \$65 less than the 1955 amount.

Other budgets were larger for next year. Himes pointed out that most of the increases were for personal services, larger per diem allowances approved by new legislature and higher costs of supplies.

**Proposed Budgets**  
The proposed budgets, showing the increases requested, are listed below: circuit clerk, \$14,134, up \$1,956.50; auditor, \$21,730, up \$2,441; treasurer, \$19,809, up \$2,989; recorder, \$13,640, up \$3,745; and sheriff, \$23,348, up \$7,738.

Also county agricultural agent's department, \$15,650, up \$2,950; board of education, \$20,355, up \$3,385; coroner's office, \$2,500, up \$970; assessor, \$6,512, up \$1,572; Wayne township assessor, \$6,860, up \$1,740; circuit court, \$19,390, up \$5,515; county election board, \$20,788, no allotment for 1955, a non-election year for the county as a whole; registration of voters, \$3,132.45 on a county-wide basis in contrast to \$1,572.45, cost of registering only Warsaw voters this year.

Also county jail, \$6,550, up \$800; county home, \$38,735, up \$235; service officer, \$3,900, up \$400; county commissioners, \$103,669.50, up \$4,630; highway department, \$437,610, up \$51,191.31; welfare, \$398,625, up \$47,715.
