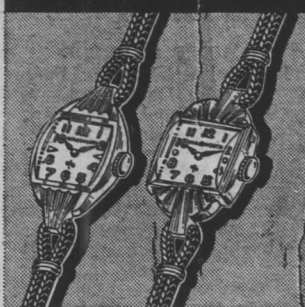
shown was a lovely formal made and modelled by Irene Culp of the ninth grade.

The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad recently sent a check for \$21,059.75 to the treasurer of Kosciusko County at Warsaw, Indiana. This check is in payment of the railroad's property taxes in the county for the first half of 1956. For the entire year of 1956, the B&O's taxes in Kosciusko County exceeded \$42,110.00.

The B&O system total tax bill for 1956 was \$31,000,000.00 or over \$1,000,000.00 above its net income.
