## "Car Of The Year" On Display Now At S&M

It's here in Syracuse, "the car  
of the year," at Ed Kleinknight's  
S&M Motor Sales showroom.  
The 1958 Chevrolet was given  
this label by newsmen and tech-  
nical writers for its dramatic  
new styling and outstanding  
engineering advances.

Completely restyled, the car is  
longer, lower and wider, and  
emphasizes flowing sculptured  
lines from dual headlamps to  
softly flared rear fenders.  
Important in the broad gains  
along the mechanical front is  
the adoption of coil springs at  
the rear wheels as a standard  
fixture. Long a front-end feature  
on Chevrolets, the coils cushion  
shocks far better than previous  
suspension system.

Another distinct contribution  
to comfort is an X-shaped, wasp-  
waist frame. The frame is 30%  
more rigid. Frame brackets per-  
mit the mounting of shock ab-  
sorbers to the frame rather than  
the underbody. It makes possible  
added leg room without sacrifice  
in road clearance. As a fourth  
advantage, the design lends it-  
self to greater integration with  
the body design.
