Mast suffered a bump on his head and his son received a cut on his nose and knee bruises. Mrs. Mast lost her pocketbook in the water.

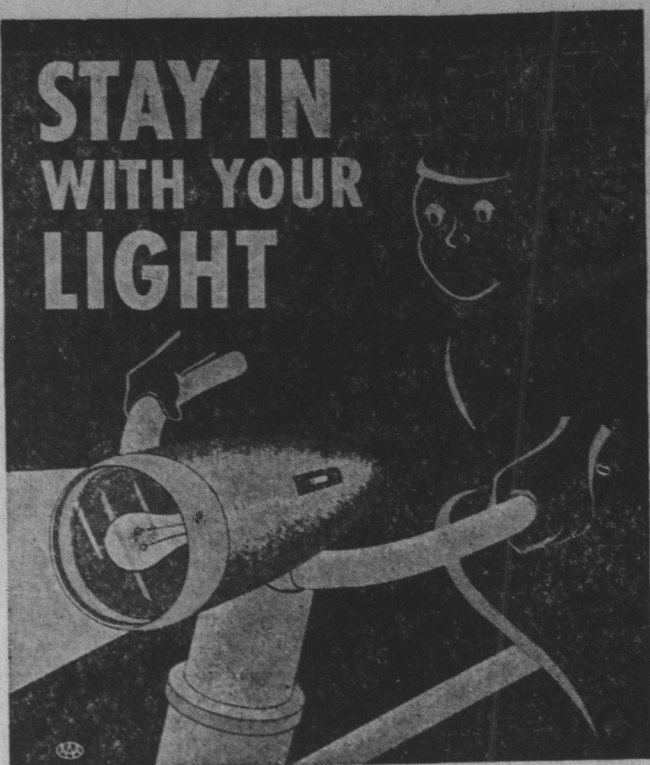
