Mrs. Leonard Barhart won the door prize, a beautiful white summer bag.


Guests at the meeting were Mrs. Mabel Mock, Mrs. Jerry R. Smith of Anderson and little Miss Bonnie Jo Fuller.

John Sudlow is reported to be resting fairly well following surgery Tuesday at Parkview Hospital in Fort Wayne.

Sudlow, local pier man, was assisting with installation work Monday on a barge when a piece of equipment slipped from the hands of his helper. The weight of the equipment struck against his left arm causing the muscle of the upper arm to tear at the elbow. This type of injury is considered very rare, according to the surgeon who performed the repair work Tuesday of pulling the muscle back into place. Wires were used to secure it. A cast was applied to the arm which is to be worn for six weeks.
