**Deadline Dec. 31
For Auto Plates**

NO EXTENSION WILL BE GRANTED, FRANK FINNEY ANNOUNCES

Indiana motorists will have to purchase 1941 automobile license plates before Jan. 1 for the first time in three years.

Drivers' licenses also must be obtained by then.

Frank Finney, state motor vehicle commissioner, announced today there would be no extension of the Dec. 31 deadline and said the 1941 plates would go on sale next Thursday.

Since 1937—his first year in office—Governor Townsend has extended the deadline 60 days each year and at the 1939 session of the general assembly recommended that March 1 be fixed by law as the final purchase date.

State law sets Dec. 31 as the deadline for plate purchases, but Governor Townsend has granted the period of grace through an executive order.

More than one million sets of blue and white plates will be put on sale in the 156 branch offices throughout the state.

Mark Rodenbeck, Finney's assistant, said 1940 plate sales up to Oct. 1 had broken the record of 1,047,026 established last year. Sales for the first 10 months of 1940 aggregated 1,055,834.

Finney's announcement followed the observation by Governor-elect Henry F. Schricker that he looked with disfavor on extension of the deadline. Schricker pointed out that the time for purchase was fixed by statute and expressed belief that perhaps any chief executive lacked authority to extend the deadline.

LABOR CONVENTION ENDS

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 29.—(UP)—The American Federation of Labor concludes its convention today.

One of the convention's last acts will be to approve the principles of the 30-hour work week. Officials said privately that no attempt would be made to obtain one during the present emergency.

STATE LATIN CONTEST WILL BE HELD FEB. 22

The principals and Latin teachers of the Putnam county schools have received letters recently, inviting them to enroll their schools for the state Latin Contest.

Francis McClure of Bainbridge High School has been appointed chairman for this county by the Extension Division of Indiana University. He will have charge of the county contest to be held on February 22.

This contest was started about sixteen years ago and now attracts large numbers of Indiana schools and Latin students. Each school may send two representatives from each Latin class to the county contest, from here the two highest ranking pupils go to the district and in like manner the two highest there go to the state contest at Bloomington.

State Dentist To Visit Schools

SEVERAL PARENT-TEACHER ORGANIZATIONS TO SEE FILM AND HEAR TALK

Beginning Monday, Dr. Robert L. Peden, senior dentist with the State Board of Health, assisted by Miss Irene M. Gerke, county nurse, will visit the county schools, showing a film and giving a talk on dental care and health.

Because of the lack of facilities needed for that particular purpose in some of the smaller schools, it will be impossible to visit all of them, as had been planned originally. Arrangements are being made to bring some of these schools together so that these children may also be benefited.

In the Greencastle schools, Dr. Peden will be assisted by Miss Pauline Smith, city school nurse.

Several Parent-Teacher organizations have made arrangements to have Dr. Peden speak before their group and also show a film.

Those persons in the county who are especially interested in this movement hope to stimulate further interest, throughout the county, so that in the future a plan may be worked out to secure dental care for school children.

The schedule of the schools to be visited is as follows:

Monday—In the forenoon, Russellville and Roachdale; in the afternoon, Barnard and New Maysville.

Tuesday—Greencastle schools and Putnamville.

Wednesday—In the forenoon, No. 10 and No. 2, in Madison township, and Clinton Center; in the afternoon, Morton and Bainbridge.

Thursday—In the forenoon, Grove-land and Floyd Center; in the afternoon, Fillmore and Belle Union.

Friday—In the forenoon, Manhattan, Reelsville and No. 10 in Washington township; in the afternoon, Cloverdale.

Miss Gerke stated this morning that the No. 10 and Brunerstown school children, of Madison township, will join with the pupils of the No. 10 school at the latter's school house, Wednesday morning.

She also announced that the Greencastle Third Ward P. T. A. will have Dr. Peden as their guest lecturer Monday evening at the Third Ward school building; that the Bainbridge P. T. A. Study Club will have him with them in their meeting in the school auditorium.

FOUL PLAY IS SUSPECTED IN HARRIS DEATH

LOCAL YOUNG MAN HAD BEEN PAID SHORTLY BEFORE HIS DEATH

POLICE SEEK TAXI DRIVER

Last Rites For Greencastle Young Man Will Be Held Saturday Afternoon

The cause of the death of Mr. Harris was officially attributed to heart disease in a report made today by Dr. Hugh K. Thatcher, deputy coroner of Marion county, regardless of any other report attributing the death to some other cause.

James Harris, 23-year-old local young man, who died suddenly in Indianapolis Wednesday night may have met with foul play according to latest reports from the state capital.

The young Greencastle man had received his salary from the packing company where he was employed only a few hours prior to his death, but when found he had only a dollar in his person.

Leaving work, shortly after 4 p.m., after getting his pay, young Harris was not seen again by friends until he was found unconscious in a taxicab about 8:15 o'clock. At that time he was rushed to the Indianapolis city hospital where he was pronounced dead upon admittance.

Indianapolis police today were attempting to establish his whereabouts from the time he left the packing plant until he was put into the taxi. Officers were also seeking the cab driver in an effort to learn who placed Mr. Harris in the taxi. It was said that when the taxi reached the local man's rooming house, the driver found him unconscious and took him to the hospital.

BERLIN, Nov. 29.—(UP)—Nazi informants said today that two British destroyers had been torpedoed in a clash with German destroyers at the western exit of the English channel yesterday.

TO TRY BLOCKADE DASH
TAMPICO, Mex., Nov. 29.—(UP)—Two German freighters make another attempt today to elude the British blockade and reach the open sea.

There was an air of urgency in their preparations and in their persistence which seemed to strengthen reports that they were destined to refuel and revictual German raiders at some secret rendezvous. A Mexican gunboat was waiting to escort them nine miles out into the Gulf of Mexico, the end of Mexican territorial waters. They had steamed up, they had been re-provisioned and refueled, their crews were aboard.

ROME, Nov. 29.—(UP)—A new engagement between the Italian air force and British warships, this one of the British Mediterranean island fortress of Malta, was described in today's official war communiqué which said that another British battleship had been struck by a heavy caliber bomb.

LIVERPOOL, England, Nov. 29.—(UP)—Shrapnel fell in the streets like rain for more than eight hours last night while a seemingly endless curtain of anti-aircraft shells rose into the sky at an almost continuous wave of German bombing planes.

Severe damage was done to some commercial property and many homes in the working class district were wrecked as bombs showered down on this, Britain's second largest port to which come ships of the world with food, munitions and war equipment. Officials asserted that the damage reported in a preliminary survey was not extensive and casualties were "generally believed not heavy."

The raiders first showered the city with incendiary bombs, starting fires in widely scattered areas. The fires were quickly extinguished, however, by fire fighters and air raid precautions workers who battled the flames despite bombs and shrapnel.

STRUGA, Yugoslavia, Nov. 29.—(UP)—Frontier reports said today that 11 Italian transports loaded with fresh troops arrived at Durazzo, Albania, and were rushed immediately toward the front where further Greek successes were reported.

At the same time new rebel activity inside Albania was reported.

Greek columns were reported swinging west from Pogradec, into the Shkumbi River valley in an apparent attempt to cut off Italian retreating over the main road to Elbasan.

The school officials adopted a resolution advocating enactment of legislation permitting superintendents to purchase liability insurance with school board funds to protect teachers, other employees and volunteer student workers.

British Warships Engage Italians

LONDON REPORTS NEW SUCCESS BY MEDITERRANEAN BATTLE FLEET

LONDON, Nov. 29.—(UP)—Demands for a concentrated campaign to knock Italy out of the war were whetted today by the admiralty's report that he Mediterranean fleet had struck another heavy blow at the Italian navy, reducing its capital ships to two.

The admiralty said that in a surface-aerial encounter west of Sardinia Wednesday, an Italian battleship of the new, 35,000-ton Littorio class, three cruisers and two destroyers were severely damaged. The only British casualty was the 10,000-ton cruiser Berwick, which suffered two hits and lost six men, but is already ready for service again, the admiralty said.

FARM MANAGEMENT MEETING ON THURSDAY

Farmers of Putnam county were highly complimented in the farm management school and outlook meeting held Thursday in the court house. The one who said the complimentary things was R. H. Bauman, farm management specialist of Purdue university, one of the two visiting speakers, the other one being Miss Elsie Glasgow, home demonstration agent leader of Purdue.

Mr. Bauman, who meets with farmers over the state in similar gatherings, said the reports made at the meeting here by Putnam county farm men were the best he had heard anywhere in the state.

He referred to the report of Henry M. Heavin on the feed situation; that of W. M. Goldsberry on the poultry outlook; that of Eugene Akers on the hog outlook; the report of Noel Nicholson on the dairy outlook; and that of Howard Hostetter on the beef cattle outlook. These men presented some especially interesting information on their respective themes.

There were 65 farm men and women in the gathering in the assembly room for the forenoon meeting, and, in the afternoon, 17 men attended the men's meeting, of which Lowell Dicks was chairman. In the assembly room, and 22 women were present in the group which gathered in the court room, headed by Miss Mary Lou Schott, county home demonstration agent.
