## Negro Cop Hiring Remains Problem For Birmingham

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. UPI—There was apparent disagreement among city councilmen today over whether to hire Negro policemen as a step toward solving racial problems.

A councilman, who declined to be identified, said Wednesday if Negroes "will just hold off a bit, they'll get some Negro policemen."

But George Seibels, chairman of the council's Public Safety Committee, which is studying the issue, said "no definite plans have been made to hire any Negro police."

Mayor Albert Boutwell called the unidentified councilman's statement "irresponsible," but would add only "we are considering" adding Negroes to the police force.

The city council, on recommendation of Seibels' committee, Tuesday rejected a demand by integration leader Martin Luther King Jr. that 25 Negro policemen be hired by a deadline of Tuesday or Negroes would resume massive racial demonstrations.

King withdrew his deadline after the council meeting, stating there were "strong indications" the city was planning to integrate its police force and he would give them a "face saving" out by relieving the pressure.

## McElroy To Be Co-op Manager

William McElroy will be the new manager of the Putnam County Farm Bureau Co-op it was announced today by Francis Lane, chairman of the board.

Mr. McElroy, who has been associated with the Central National Bank for several years will resume his new duties on November 1.

He succeeds Gardner Eggers, who resigned recently to enter the insurance business.

## Pilot Injured

TERRE HAUTE UPI—Robert Dickson, 63, Terre Haute, was injured Wednesday when his small plane crashed in underbrush near Paris, Ill.

Dickson was hospitalized at Paris with rib fractures and lacerations. Authorities said his engine apparently failed and the plane barely missed a house before it crashed.

## Closing Angola Post

INDIANAPOLIS UPI—The Indiana State Police Post at Angola will be closed Nov. 15.

Supt. George Everett announced Wednesday that the State Police Board had decided it was not economically and operationally feasible to maintain the post which is located on U.S. 27 two miles north of Kokomo State Park.

## Dies From Burns

MARTINSVILLE UPI—Lyle Boyer, 70, R. R. 2, Mooresville, was found dead of burns near a brush fire at his home late Wednesday.

Authorities said Boyer's clothing apparently ignited as he tried to put out the blaze with a fire extinguisher, and he tried to get over a fence but fell, suffering a leg fracture.

## Set Tests In 3 Putnam Townships

The Indiana State Livestock Sanitary Board cooperating with the U.S.D.A. announce that Russell, Franklin and Greencastle Townships are to be tested for tuberculosis and brucellosis for TB accreditation and Brucellosis recertification of Putnam County.

All cattle must be tested for tuberculosis except the following:

1. Calves under 6 months of age.
2. Feeder cattle held under permit apart from other cattle.
3. Steers

All cattle must be tested for brucellosis except the following:

1. Calves under 6 months of age.
2. Dairy herds negative to the ring test.
3. Steers
4. Officially vaccinated cattle under 30 months of age.
5. Feeder cattle held under permit which are maintained separate and apart from other cattle.

Dr. W. W. Carr of Roachdale will be doing the testing in Franklin Township. Dr. D. B. Brattain of Greencastle will be testing Greencastle Township and Dr. Donald Bear Zionsville will test Russell Township. These veterinarians will be working under the direction of the State Livestock Sanitary Board and will start testing by approximately November 1.

## 16,000 Yanks In South Viet Nam

WASHINGTON UPI—Authoritative sources said today that 16,500 U.S. air and ground troops are now in South Viet Nam to aid the struggle against the Communist Viet Cong.

The estimate was 1,500 men higher than the highest previous assessment to come from informed government sources. It also was above the highest unofficial estimate which had placed the force at possibly 16,000 men.

Sources cautioned, however, against any conclusion that additional troops have been committed since Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, toured South Viet Nam last month.

Joining the faculty at the seminary in 1950, Dr. Osborn assumed the deanship in September 1959. He is also editor of Encounter, a leading religious journal. Receiving his Ph. D. degree from University of Oregon, Dr. Osborn also holds three degrees from Phillips University, Enid, Oklahoma.

Miss Blankenship is a graduate of Phillips University. She has done migrant ministry in California and for two years was Director of Christian Education in the Christian Church, Raytown, Missouri. At First Christian Church she will work with the minister in all phases of responsibilities, with major emphasis in youth work and Christian Education.

Miss Blankenship lives in Greencastle and commutes to Christian Theological Seminary for her class schedule.

## Offers All-Out Aid To Castro

MOSCOW UPI—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has offered massive no-strings-attached aid to Cuba to alleviate hardships caused by recent flood and hurricane damage, the official Tass news agency reported today.

The offer, in a letter from Khrushchev to Premier Fidel Castro, said some of the aid will come from Soviet supplies already stockpiled in Cuba.

The letter said Soviet experts also will be dispatched to Cuba to assist in reconstruction work—fully at the expense of Russia.

## Jury Will Probe Steel Production

NEW YORK UPI—A special federal grand jury was sworn in today to begin an investigation into the steel production industry.

Federal Judge John F. N. McGohey pleaded with the 23-member panel to maintain "secrecy" and not to divulge any of the information they would obtain from witnesses.

Investors and speculators who drove steel stocks down sharply in Tuesday's trading apparently recovered from their jitters overnight. Steel shares opened irregularly higher on the New York Stock Exchange today.

Neither the White House, the Justice Department nor leaders in the steel industry want to talk about the pending grand jury inquiry. Subpoenas were issued to steel companies following a series of selected price increases. But there was no official word that they dealt with price in the industry.

League of Women  
Voters Study U. N.

During October, the month  
containing United Nations Day,  
League of Women Voter groups  
throughout the nation are re-examining  
their interest in the U.N.

The League of Women  
Voters supports the U.N. system  
and has been evaluating  
means to strengthen the system.  
Currently Leagues are being  
asked to report to the National  
Board a consensus of opinion  
on (1) the one-nation-one-vote  
issue in the General Assembly  
of the U.N. and (2) negotiations  
for measures to reduce the risk of war.

The League focus for U.N.  
Day 1963 (today) is the Development  
Decade. The concept of the  
development decade was first  
expressed by President Kennedy in 1961:

"Political sovereignty is but a mockery without  
the means of meeting poverty and illiteracy and disease.  
Self-determination is but a slogan if the future holds no hope.  
That is why my nation, which  
has freely shared its capital and  
its technology to help others  
help themselves, now proposes  
officially designating this decade  
of the 1960's as the United  
Nations Decade of Development."

The General Assembly  
responded by adopting resolutions  
so designating the decade and  
setting as a goal a minimum  
five per cent annual growth  
rate in the developing countries'  
national income. The resolutions  
also called on member states to  
follow liberal trade policies and  
work toward an increased flow  
of resources, both public and  
private, to developing countries.

The Seferiades family

Prize for literature.

\$51,158.

## CENTENNIAL SCRAPBOOK

The War for the Union 1861-65 in Pictures

**No. 358** The determined, uncompromising pressure that Charles Francis Adams exerted upon the British government, through all the media of public opinion, gained another victory for the Union the autumn of 1863. A victory against the Confederate navy without a shot being fired.

Queen Victoria's ministers were finally moved to subvert the scheme of the Confederacy to secure, through Laird's shipyards at Liverpool, two armored warships capable of inflicting disaster and panic at Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Boston with raiding bombardments. Purpose of the hulls of Nos. 294 and 295 had been concealed at first; then, when they took the unmistakable shape of naval vessels, and Adams'


protests rose, they were represented as having been contracted for by French agents of the pasha of Egypt.

Adams refused to believe this. Upon his receiving word from an observer at Liverpool that one of the ironclads was about to depart, President Lincoln's man in London went to the prime minister to declare, "It would be superfluous of me to point to your lordship that this is war!"

The Emancipation Proclamation had had too electrical effect for the government to disregard British anti-slavery sentiment at the risk of war against the emancipators. The two ironclads were ordered detained. As a face-saver, the government bought the pair and thereby presented the British navy with its two most advanced warships.

A young man by the name of McCarthy was the big gun in the Crawfordsville offensive as he personally accounted for four of his team's touchdowns.


In the third period, the Athenians ran the kick-off back to the GHS 15. A pass over center was good for a t.d.

## Sheinwold On Bridge

Annual Contest

The annual bridge contest for the State Department and the United States Information Agency presented an interesting choice between optimism and caution in the hand shown to-day:

**South dealer**  
Neither side vulnerable

East wins the first trick with the ace of spades and must make an important decision on how to continue the defense.

It is barely possible that West has led from six spades headed by K-J-10. If so, the defenders can get six spades and two diamonds. An optimistic East would return a spade at once to get on with good work.

A cautious East would reflect that West may not have the king of spades. In this case, a spade

return would permit South to make the contract.

### CAUTIOUS DEFENSE

The cautious line of defense requires East to kill dummy's long diamond suit. East must take the ace of spades and return a club to remove one of dummy's side entries to the diamonds.

Declarer takes dummy's king of club and returns a diamond. East takes the first or second diamond and returns another club to remove dummy's other entry.

Then East makes sure to refuse one diamond trick. When East finally takes his second diamond trick, South is out of diamonds, as dummy has no side entries.

Deprived of the diamonds, South cannot make enough tricks to score game. Declarer gets two spades, two hearts, one diamond, and three clubs.

Jerry Machlin and Richard Freeman, who constructed the hands for the contest, calculate that once every 163 years South will have S-Q x x H-A K Q x D-Q x C-Q J x x. In this case, the recommended defense will allow South to take nine tricks instead of going down four. The rest of the time it pays to kill dummy's long suit.

### DAILY QUESTION

Partner opens with 1 NT (16 to 18 points), and the next player passes. You hold: S-J 10 9 8 6 H-Q 9 5 2 D-3 C-8 7 4. What do you say?

Answer: Bid two spades. Partner will pass unless he has 18 points and a good fit for spades. You expect to be safer at two spades than partner would be at one notrump.

## Tigers To Meet St. Joe Eleven

A series in which success has been conspicuously absent for one of its combatants will be renewed Saturday in Rensselaer where DePauw University tackles St. Joseph's.

Game time for the Indiana College Conference tilt is 2 p.m.

Winless in the nine-game rivalry until last year's 14-0 verdict in Greencastle, DePauw has yet to beat the Pumas on the road.

In 1961 the upstate crew fired a shotgun offense at the Tigers and upset Tom Mont's eleven, 8-7. The year before that DePauw achieved a 7-7 tie in Greencastle.

Mont's not so sure that Coach Ed Dwyer won't reload his shotgun this time. It would be a change of pace for the Pumas, but at this stage they are 1-4 so Coach Dwyer might try anything, or so Mont believes.

For a while it looked as if the battle might better be played in the sick bay. St. Joseph's, which figured to be a title contender as did DePauw in the early going, has lost irreparable like halfback Phil Zera, quarterback John Zolecki and tackle Dave Eckerle. Zera had been the Pumas' Mr. Everything and was all-ICC second team last year.

The Pumas do have, though, the ICC's second leading rusher in halfback Larry Lennon and a pair of quarterbacks, Denny Anderson and Larry Yost, who have provided their team the league's third best pass offense.

In anticipation of the throwing duo Mont has stressed pass defense with the Tigers this week. DePauw's rushing defense should take care of itself. Statistically it's second best in the loop.

## Weather Retards Winter Wheat

LAFAYETTE UPI — Crop experts reported today that only about one-third as much of the

## Food Sense □ Not Nonsense



### All the Blocks a Child Can Use

Building blocks are more than playthings for Baby Jamie and fast-growing John-John. They can be the nutrients in food called amino acids. Readily at hand is a way to develop for infants and toddlers a new and economical food, custom-made from wheat, which contains all the building blocks a child needs to grow and develop—and nearly all the other nutrients to boot. The schematic for this food has been drawn up by research, at the American Institute of Baking in Chicago, on the amino acids in wheat's proteins.

Dr. William Bradley, scientific director of the Institute, has suggested that nutritionists can put into action this schematic for feeding infants and children. At a recent nutrition conference in California on the Role of Wheat in the World's Food Supply, he reported that the milling process sifts out certain wheat flours with an especially high nutritional value. Being concentrated, these flours contain a substantially higher amount of the building block, lysine—apt to be short in cereal grains than does the wheat berry itself. With cooked cereals made from these flours, infants and toddlers would satisfy their higher protein and lysine requirements, he proposed.

That traditional wheat foods materially meet the nutrient requirements of older children and adults is history. As the major food of large population groups, grains made civilization possible. Wheat had all the building blocks man needed. In light of America's food export program to underdeveloped and hungry nations, the value of wheat takes on added significance. The contribution that bread and other cereal foods can make here and abroad is being studied, recognized, and appreciated.

International Business Machines Corporation today announced that it will apply for the listing of its capital stock on stock exchanges in Canada,

France, Switzerland and West Germany.

IBM will request listing on the Bourse in Paris, the Frankfurt exchange in West Germany, the Zurich, Basle and Geneva exchanges in Switzerland, and the Toronto exchange in Canada. It is expected that these listings will become effective before the end of the year.

No new shares will be offered and no increase in the number of outstanding shares will result from these listings. As of September 30, 1963 IBM had 27,763,507 shares of stock outstanding.

IBM operates outside the United States through its wholly owned subsidiary, IBM World Trade Corporation, which conducts business through subsidiaries and branches in 96 countries.

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
