

Careful Driving Over Labor Day Urged By Sheriff

Sheriff Kenneth Knauer today urged all residents of Putnam County to join in support of the state-wide "Lights On For Safety" campaign.

Motorists are requested to use their headlights while driving, day or night, during the official Labor Day holiday beginning at 6 p. m. Friday, and continuing until 8 a. m. Tuesday, September 8.

Sheriff Knauer stated the "Lights On For Safety" program is sponsored by the Indiana Traffic Safety Foundation, in cooperation with state, county and city traffic officials. The objectives of the program are to encourage safe driving and, thus, reduce traffic losses during the four-day Labor Day holiday.

In addition to the use of headlights for all holiday driving, the Sheriff urged drivers to do the following:

1. Reduce speed in congested areas.
2. Use the proper highway lanes and hold passing to a minimum.
3. Signal intention to turn, change lanes or reduce speed well in advance.
4. Be especially alert and use particular care in approaching all rural intersections.



Readers Are Asking . . .

CAN DIET pills be responsible for being jittery and irritable?

They certainly can, and often are. Most diet pills are also "pep up" pills, and create a nervous, restless, energetic feeling. They not only control the appetite, but also speed up the whole body system to burn off excess calories more quickly.

Since overeating is often a release for emotional tension, dieting may produce general irritability even when pills are not used.

The combination of food denial and "high octane" pills can cause the "jitters" you refer to.





Color T.V. Sales To Hit Billion

NEW YORK UPI — It was bound to happen sooner or later, but trade sources think that 1964 will be the year when the color television hits the billion dollar annual sales mark.





For most students the tests with their multiple choice questions are "B. Necessary." Many students will spend hours cramming and will seek intensive coaching to get a high score.

Neither coaching nor cramming will make much difference, however, according to studies of the test results by the College Entrance Examination Board, which is constantly revising and improving the exams.

What may help the student is taking the test a second or third time and that is what many of them do in an effort to get a score that will favorably influence the admission officer at the college of their choice.

Scores from the tests are used in varying ways by colleges, depending on the emphasis each feels the tests deserve in relation to their knowledge of the student.

But while the emphasis varies, the use of the test scores has grown by leaps and bounds until more than 800 colleges now require them of
