

Careful Driving Over Labor Day Urged By Sheriff

Sheriff Kenneth Knauer today urged all residents of Putnam County to join in support of the state-wide "Lights On For Safety" campaign.

Motorists are requested to use their headlights while driving, day or night, during the official Labor Day holiday beginning at 6 p. m. Friday, and continuing until 8 a. m. Tuesday, September 8.

Sheriff Knauer stated the "Lights On For Safety" program is sponsored by the Indiana Traffic Safety Foundation, in cooperation with state, county and city traffic officials. The objectives of the program are to encourage safe driving and, thus, reduce traffic losses during the four-day Labor Day holiday.

In addition to the use of headlights for all holiday driving, the Sheriff urged drivers to do the following:

1. Reduce speed in congested areas.
2. Use the proper highway lanes and hold passing to a minimum.
3. Signal intention to turn, change lanes or reduce speed well in advance.
4. Be especially alert and use particular care in approaching all rural intersections.

World War I Hero Is Dead

NASHVILLE, Tenn. UPI — Sgt. Alvin Cullum York, a conscientious objector who became one of America's great World War I heroes died today after 15 years of battling the ravages of old age.

York, 76, was admitted to the hospital Saturday and lapsed into a coma Sunday. He never regained consciousness in his final battle against death which appeared near on many occasions during the past decade.

The hero of the Battle of Argonne Forest had been completely paralyzed since 1954. His frequent trips to hospitals here were augmented by the home care supplied by his wife, Gracie.

A team of doctors, using antibiotics and life supporting medical machinery, attended the Medal of Honor winner constantly since he was placed on the hospital's "gravely ill" list as a result of infections in his urinary tract.

Bands Compete At State Fair

INDIANAPOLIS UPI — High school bands-89 of them from all sections of the state-competed for honors today in the Indiana State Fair band contest, one of the most colorful events of the 12-day show.

Madison Heights High of Anderson was back to defend the title it won last year but had plenty of competition from such previous winners as Lincoln High of Vincennes, two time winner Ben Davis of Marion County and three-time winner Anderson.

Judging continued in various 4-H competition with today's emphasis on dairy cattle.

The 4-H Grand Champion steer, an Angus owned by Pamela Jo English, 10, Clayton, sold Tuesday for \$1,000 about \$1.04 per pound, one of the lowest prices ever paid for the top animal at the fair.

Ben Beem, Burroughs, a Hereford breeder, opened the bidding at \$1 when Lt. Gov. Richard O. Ristine got the auction under way. Beem then offered a flat price of \$1,000 for the 946-pound animal.

The previous low price for the champion steer in recent years was \$2 per pound and last year's top animal brought \$3.05 per pound.

Democrats Pin Hopes On Liberals

WASHINGTON UPI — Senate Democratic leaders pinned their hopes today on freshman liberals to swing the tide in favor of the administration's health care for the aged program.

A crucial vote was set on a compromise proposal to provide hospitalization and nursing care benefits for 18 million elderly persons financed through higher Social Security taxes.

The vote was scheduled for 2 p. m. EDT. Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, the Republican presidential nominee, was flying back from the West Coast to cast his vote against the proposal.

Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., chief sponsor of the compromise plan which carries the backing of President Johnson, predicted it would be approved by "anywhere from a four to six-vote margin."

Gore based his optimism partly on the historic 1962 vote when the Senate defeated, 52 to 48, a similar Medicare plan. Since then, at least four liberal pro-Medicare Democrats have taken their Senate seats.

The test vote was on the first part of Gore's package proposal, which is the so-called King-Anderson schedule of health benefits or the administration's Medicare plan.

A second amendment would provide the financing for these benefits. It also would provide a \$7-a-month increase in cash benefits for Social Security.

Riots Organized By Small Group

PHILADELPHIA UPI — The violent, three-day riot by more than 2,000 Negroes in the "Jungle" section of North Philadelphia was instigated by a small group of conspirators who waited several days for an appropriate incident and fled immediately, police said today.

The rampaging mobs, who vandalized and plundered about 200 stores last weekend, caused damages estimated at several million dollars. About 350 persons, more than 100 of them police, were injured and more than 600 men, women and children were arrested.

Mayor James H.J. Tate said Police Commissioner Howard R. Leary informed him that the identities of the principal instigators were known and police were gathering "admissible evidence" against them.

Organized Labor Gives President Full Endorsement

Barry Will Vote Against Medicare

WASHINGTON UPI — Republican presidential candidate Barry M. Goldwater flew to Washington today to vote against President Johnson's Medicare program in what shaped up as a closely contested Senate showdown.

The Arizona senator altered his pre-campaign schedule after conferring by telephone yesterday with Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill.

Goldwater hurried to the capital in his new Boeing 727 jet campaign plane rather than wait at his Phoenix, Ariz., home for the formal beginning of his campaign Thursday at Prescott, Ariz.

He supports the Senate's pending Social Security bill, which would increase benefits under the program by about \$7-a-month. But he opposes including the administration's Medicare program as an amendment.

Stopping at Phoenix last night to accept delivery of his elaborately equipped campaign plane, Goldwater spoke to a crowd of about 1,000 persons at Sky Harbor airport.

"President Johnson is worried about Viet Nam and would like to sweep it under the rug, but he can't because Bobby Baker and the hi fi set are already there," Goldwater said.

Bank Is Robbed By Lone Bandit

INDIANAPOLIS UPI — A bandit threatened three employees and three customers at the Nora Plaza branch of the First Federal Savings & Loan Association today.

The gunman, his eyes shielded with dark sunglasses, escape in a car with an undetermined amount of money.

Dan Lively, manager of the branch, said the bandit forced him to sit down while he raided the cash drawer.

Actor Is Dead

HOLLYWOOD UPI — Funeral arrangements were pending today for Henry Lascoe, 52, a veteran New York character actor, who died Tuesday while working on a television show.

WASHINGTON UPI — President Johnson pointed toward the election campaign today with unprecedented backing from organized labor and a peace - progress - prosperity theme to woo votes.

The Chief Executive held out hope of record-breaking economic advances during the next four years if the nation holds to its present course and rejects "fear-filled slogans."

He also pledged not to neglect the "poor, the sick, the aged."

Johnson made the statements late Tuesday in accepting the unanimous endorsement of the AFL-CIO General Board, top policy-making body of the 13-million-member labor federation.

Addressing the labor leaders in the East Room of the White House, Johnson said the United States had never wavered in the defense of freedom or the pursuit of peace since the end of World War II.

"As a result, we are closer than ever to making the Second World War the last world war," the president said.

At home, he said, the American people had enjoyed uninterrupted prosperity since the late President John F. Kennedy took office in 1961.

He said the average American family of four earns \$12,000 more in a year than it did three years ago while unemployment has dropped to 4.9 per cent.

"We are on the edge of an abundance which can tower over all the gains of the past," Johnson said. "I predict, if we continue on our course, the growth of the next four years will be the greatest in all our history."

Anti-Yankee

ANKARA, Turkey UPI — More than 8,000 Turkish students led by an Army general marched through the streets of Ankara Tuesday to demonstrate their displeasure with the role of the United States in the Cyprus crisis.

The carried banners reading, "Yankee go home" and "You can't buy freedom with dollars."

The march was led by Gen. Cemal Tural, the new commander of Turkey's land forces.



Readers Are Asking . . .

CAN DIET pills be responsible for being jittery and irritable?

They certainly can, and often are. Most diet pills are also "pep up" pills, and create a nervous, restless, energetic feeling. They not only control the appetite, but also speed up the whole body system to burn off excess calories more quickly. Since overeating is often a release for emotional tension, dieting may produce general irritability even when pills are not used.

The combination of food denial and "high octane" pills can cause the "jitters" you refer to. Although most diet pills are quite safe, they should be taken only when specifically prescribed by a physician.

Can eating too many sweets and rich foods cause diabetes? No, or at least, not directly. This kind of diet can certainly cause overweight, but not diabetes. However, it is a fact that people who are overweight have a greater tendency to develop diabetes.

Medical science has not yet been able to determine the exact cause of diabetes. But tremendous advancements have been made in effectively controlling this disease. With early diagnosis and proper medical care, diabetics may now live normal, healthy, productive lives.

What is meant by the "mask of pregnancy?"

Pregnant women sometimes develop a temporary brownish discoloration of the cheeks during pregnancy. This is called chloasma uterinum and is probably caused by the hormone changes that occur during pregnancy.

Are anticoagulant drugs al-

ways used after a coronary heart attack? How do they work?

"Heart attacks" vary greatly in cause, nature and severity. Anticoagulants, or blood-thinning drugs, are advocated in very specific instances. There is no general rule about their use in all cases of heart attacks.

The choice of treatment for a heart attack or any other condition depends entirely on the doctor's judgement. His decision to use any special medication is based on a critical evaluation of the individual patient.

Anticoagulants "thin" the blood and inhibit the clotting action. Everyone taking these drugs must be under strict medical supervision. Regular, repeated studies of the blood will ensure their safe and effective use.

What is the cause of brittle fingernails? Can they be hardened?

Fragile, breakable fingernails can be caused by inadequate diet, exposure to detergents, nail polish, nail polish remover, or a wide variety of other chemicals. Some metabolism (thyroid) disorders can also produce brittle nails.

The nails may often be strengthened by supplementing the diet with additional proteins, gelatin and vitamins. Try to avoid exposing the nails to strong detergents or other chemicals.

Never apply nail hardening preparations containing formaldehyde, unless specifically prescribed by a doctor. They are beneficial to certain specialized conditions, but can be dangerous if used incorrectly.

Beware Greeks Bearing Gifts

The defenders can often gain an advantage by forcing declarer to accept a trick before he can make full use of it. If declarer refuses this Greek gift, the play may take the odd form of each side trying to thrust a trick on the other side.

West opened the three of hearts, and East won with the king. Since West had clearly led his fourth-highest heart, East knew that South had another heart and could eventually ruff it in the dummy.

East could see that South held all of the missing high cards and that he would easily make the contract if he were allowed to ruff the heart at a time of his own choosing. The best chance of the defense was to make South ruff the heart prematurely.

When East returned the ace of hearts at the second trick declarer had his chance to ruff the trick in dummy. If he did so, however, he would go down. He would have no way to reach the dummy for the clubs and he would therefore lose two spades in addition to the first heart trick.

HANDS IT BACK

South worked this out in his mind and came to the correct conclusion: he didn't want to ruff that second trick. He discarded a spade from dummy, handling the proffered trick right back to East.

East couldn't gain by leading another heart, so he shifted to a club. There was still the chance that South had A-K-Q-8-7 of diamonds, in which case he would not be able to get to dummy with a trump.

As it happened, South had the five of diamonds a card of great value precisely because it was so low. South won the club return, drew three rounds of trumps, got the other high club out of the way, and then led the five of diamonds to dummy's six. This enabled him to run the rest of the clubs, discarding his three low spades.

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



Color T.V. Sales To Hit Billion

NEW YORK UPI —It was bound to happen sooner or later, but trade sources think that 1964 will be the year when the color television hits the billion dollar annual sales mark.

Electronic Age, quarterly publication of the Radio Corporation of America, says that about three fourths of the amount probably will be spent by consumers for new color television sets. The other quarter billion will be in the area of service, studio equipment, color program and commercial production.

Helping the consumer portion of the market, in which all major set manufacturers now compete, were the price cuts announced earlier this year.

About one set in seven in the present market is color, but set-makers are confident that the ratio is changing rapidly.

Raymond W. Saxon, president of RCA sales corporation, has said that the ratio may reach one in four in 1965. Earlier this year, Joseph S. Wright, president of Zenith, forecast that eventually most family television sets will be color models, with a market running from 5 to 7 million sets a year in contrast to the 1 million to 1.3 mil-

lion which has been estimated as the figure which 1964 set sales will show.

About 750,000 sets were sold last year, industry sources said. In 1963, the industry was run-

ning at an annual rate of about \$600 million; it was only \$100 million in 1960.

David Sarnoff, board chairman of the Radio Corporation of America, predicted at the end

of last year that this would be a billion-dollar year. He said that in consumer markets, "the most vigorous single growth product in 1964 will be color television."





Real Cool

Light foods are the right foods for summer, so today's recipes offer two tempting suggestions to consider for including in warm weather menus.

Chicken and Pineapple Gel-Ring is a gelatine mold that blends the flavors of chicken with celery and fruit.

Serving Suggestions
A delightful luncheon or dinner main dish, it can be served with tomato halves topped with mashed avocado and a mixed vegetable dish of green beans with sauteed mushrooms.

The dessert for today is a chilled Bavarian. You can choose your version, for it can be served in three ways.

CHICKEN AND PINEAPPLE GEL-RING
2 envelopes unflavored gelatine
2 1/2 c. chicken stock



UNFLAVORED GELATINE and chicken broth make an excellent base for a jellied main dish loaf. Cooked chicken and canned crushed pineapple were combined for the loaf shown.

- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 c. lemon juice
- 1 (14 oz.) can crushed pineapple
- 3 c. diced cooked chicken
- 1/2 c. diced celery

Sprinkle gelatine on 1 cup chicken stock in saucepan to

soften. Place over low heat, stirring constantly until gelatine is dissolved. Remove from heat.

Stir in remaining stock, salt, lemon juice and pineapple. Chill until the consistency of unbeaten egg white. Mix in chicken and celery. Turn into 5-cup mold; chill until firm.

Unmold. If desired, garnish with tomato halves topped with mashed avocado or mayonnaise. Serves 8.

BASIC BAVARIAN DESSERT

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 c. milk
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1/4 tsp. almond flavoring
- 1 c. heavy cream, whipped
- Whipped cream
- Sliced Peaches

Mix together in saucepan, gelatine, 1/4 c. sugar and salt. Add enough milk to moisten

ingredients, then blend in egg yolks, one at a time.

Stir in remaining milk and place over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatine is dissolved, about 6 minutes.

Remove from heat; add almond flavoring.

Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon.

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually add remaining 1/4 c. sugar and beat until very stiff. Fold in gelatine mixture. Fold in 1 c. whipped cream.


Turn into 1 1/2-qt. serving bowl. Chill until firm.

To serve, garnish with additional whipped cream and sliced peaches.

To make Raspberry Parfait: Layer Bavarian mixture with fresh raspberries in parfait glasses.

To make Fruited Bavarian: Fold into Bavarian mixture, 1 sliced banana, 1 sliced peach, 1/2 c. pitted cherries.

Spoon into dessert dishes. Serves 6 to 8.

Those College Entrance Tests—'Multiple Choice'

The College Entrance Board Examinations taken by high school juniors and seniors to help get admitted to college are... Fill in the blank with either: A. Useless, B. Necessary, C. Nerve-racking, D. Misused, E. Over-emphasized.

That is a multiple choice question high school juniors and seniors may never get to answer, but it is one that is prominent in the minds of both students and educators as some 1.5 million college applicants prepare for the tests this year.

For most students the tests with their multiple choice questions are "B. Necessary." Many students will spend hours cramming and will seek intensive coaching to get a high score.

Neither coaching nor cramming will make much difference, however, according to studies of the test results by the College Entrance Examination Board, which is constantly revising and improving the exams.

What may help the student is taking the test a second or third time and that is what many of them do in an effort to get a score that will favorably influence the admission officer at the college of their choice.

Scores from the tests are used in varying ways by colleges, depending on the emphasis each feels the tests deserve in relation to their knowledge of the student.

But while the emphasis varies, the use of the test scores has grown by leaps and bounds until more than 800 colleges now require them of





A spokesman for the U. S. Military Assistance Group in Bangkok announced Tuesday that Klusmann, shot down over Laos and captured June 6, had escaped and was safe and sound in Thailand.

Today, the U. S. Embassy said that Klusmann "is no longer in Thailand." Secrecy shrouded his departure, but he was believed enroute back to the United States.

During his imprisonment, Klusmann, 30, had written his wife, Sara, in San Diego, Calif., to think of his absence as an extended duty tour.


