WASHINGTON UPI — The General Services Administration (GSA) today denied GOP charges that the cost of a new federal building at Austin, Tex., had been boosted 2 million to provide a lavish suite of offices for President Johnson.

F. Chilton White, national director for Citizens For Goldwater-Miller, said Tuesday that a luxurious suite of offices was being built for Johnson, and had increased its construction costs from \$7,350,000 to \$10,000,000. He challenged "Maharajah Johnson" to let taxpayers inspect the offices before the Nov. 3 election.

Many Areas Feel Touch Of Winter

A touch of winter frosted the eastern half of the nation again today and sent temperatures shivering to record lows. The arctic blast plunged from the Canadian border southward to Texas and Louisiana.

Raw and gusty winds swept the Northern Plains.

The mercury plummeted to 25 degrees at O'Hare International Airport west of Chicago and the temperature in the city itself fell to 34 degrees, only one degree above the record low for the date.

An early morning reading of 30 at Buffalo, N.Y., was two degrees lower than the previous record. The weather bureau said it was the coldest in history for so early in the season along the central shores of Lake Michigan.

The mercury hit a low of 29 degrees in Pittsburgh, Pa., breaking the previous record for the date set in 1938.

Film Records Last Four Days

WASHINGTON UPI — Four days in November numbered an unbelievable world last year. Tuesday night, the premiere of a film of President John F. Kennedy's assassination had almost the same hypnotic effect on 1,600 invited guests.

The first showing of "Four Days in November" was at Keith's Theater here, a short block from the White House which figured so prominently in the two-hour documentary.

Producer David L. Wolper combined a skillful blend of newsfilm, still photographs, amateur movies and recreated scenes into a searing record of those four days.

The United States and much of the world lived those days as they unfolded on television and in print. Wolper's production, in cooperation with United Press International, brought those tragic events back in a chronological, cohesive account for the first time.

The assumption came near the midway point. For an hour, the drama built up until the presidential car turned a Dallas street corner and a shot rang out.

The screen went black for several seconds, symbolizing the inability of the mind to grasp what had happened. Then the camera recaptured the frenzy in the Dallas streets — Mrs. Kennedy pulling the Secret Service agent onto the rear of the car, the dash to Parkland Hospital, the blind-man's buff search for a culprit. And then the grief.

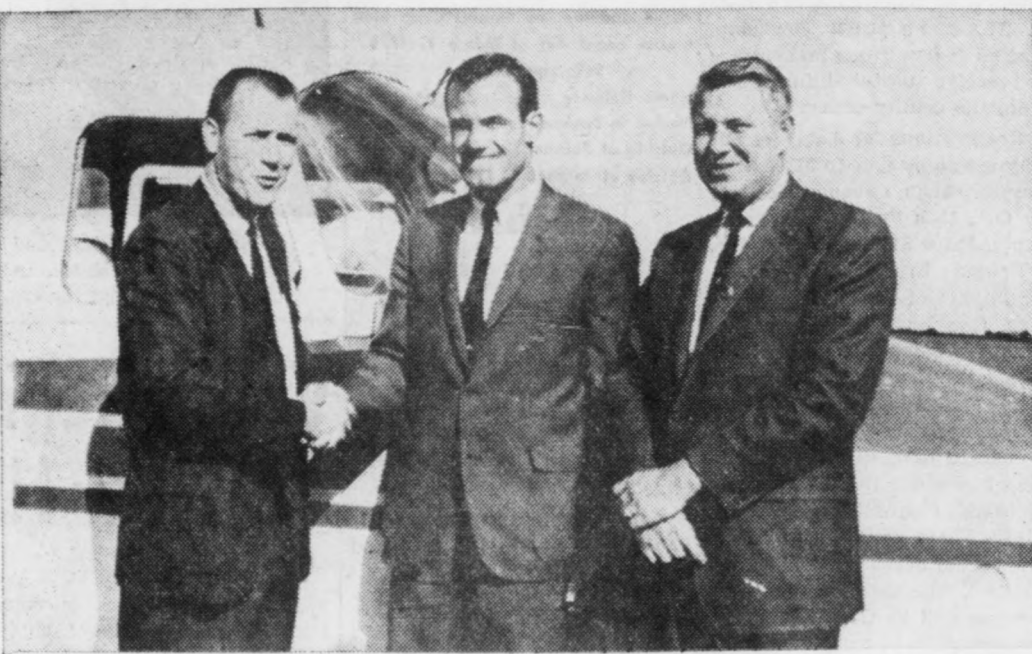
The following days of national sorrow in Washington were interrupted by sudden switches to the confusion in the halls of the Dallas police station and the incredible murder of Lee Harvey Oswald.

The film made no attempt to interpret Oswald's motives. It assumed his guilt on the evidence available just as the Warren Commission did 10 days ago in concluding that Oswald acted for reasons known to him and without help.

Movie Star To Leave Hospital

"There's nothing wrong with me that getting out of the hospital won't cure," said husky actor John Wayne on the eve of his discharge. "I haven't had a heart attack and I don't have cancer. I just want to go home."

The rugged 56-year-old star was scheduled to be released today from Good Samaritan Hospital, where he has been recuperating for two weeks after undergoing surgery for torn leg tendons and removal of a chest abscess.

"I'm feeling great," the actor said Tuesday.

His son, Michael, said the abscess resulted from a minor respiratory ailment, following the leg operation Sept. 22.

The veteran western star injured his ankle in 1957 while making a movie and reinjured it twice. He described the chest surgery as "minor."

Sen. Goldwater In New Jersey

ALANTIC CITY UPI — Sen. Barry M. Goldwater proclaimed today as "Bobby Baker Day."

The Republican presidential nominee chose that theme as he set upon a one-day tour of New Jersey precincts stretching from Atlantic City to Newark.

This was the Arizona senator's second consecutive day of campaigning in the Middle Atlantic area. Tuesday, he swung through a tri-county area of Philadelphia suburbs.

He returned to Washington from Pennsylvania to address the annual conference of United Press International Editors and Publishers. In that address, he charged that:

—President Johnson deliberately misstated facts on control of nuclear weapons.

—The Johnson administration is "dominated by special interests" while the Republican party "here and now, as of today, is free of such pressures."

In remarks prepared for an Atlantic City rally starting his New Jersey foray today, Goldwater said:

"This is Bobby Baker day. Just one year ago today, Mr. Baker resigned his post as secretary to the Democratic majority in the senate and as one time principal assistant to the Democratic majority leader, Lyndon B. Johnson.

"Since then, there have been repeated disclosures of Bobby Baker's involvement in improper activities. There is prima facie evidence of wrongdoing in the use of his office to obtain and grant favors and riches, and in the 'kickback' of money from government contracts.

"At any rate, after being put into his influential job and working for Lyndon Johnson, Bobby Baker, whose Senate salary never exceeded \$20,000 a year, accumulated a personal fortune that has been estimated at \$2,100,000.

A Huntington County man was killed today in a collision of two pickup trucks, raising the Indiana 1964 traffic death toll to at least 1,014 compared with 970 a year ago.

Mac Richardson, 69, R. R. 5, Huntington, was killed when his truck collided with one driven by Edward Carriger, 35, Peru, at a county road intersection a mile southeast of Majenica.

Police said the victim's truck rolled over after Richardson was thrown out and crushed him.

Barry Goldwater, Jr., scion of the Republican presidential candidate, arrived at DePauw University Tuesday amid the frenzied welcome of University students and local Republican leaders.

Mr. Goldwater arrived at the Municipal Airport at 3 p.m. His first stop at the University was the Sigma Chi fraternity house where he greeted DePauw students. Goldwater, Sr., is a member of that fraternity. Barry, Jr., is a member of the Phi Delta.

Immediately after leaving the fraternity house he proceeded to the Memorial Student Union Building where he addressed an audience of students and townspeople.

"The young people of today want a leader in the White House whom they can look up to. They want someone they can look to for spiritual guidance. A leader seeped in Billy Sol Estes and Bobby Baker scandal can't give them this leadership. Barry Goldwater is needed in that position," stated the young campaigner.

He defended his father from the attacks made by various Democratic aspirants on military preparedness. "Military preparation should be maintained for future strength. My father believes the people of the United States want peace through strength and not war through weakness."

He stated that the campaign was a tough campaign and that his "father's supporters were working hard to get him elected." "We are working harder than the Johnson people," Barry added. "We want to win." "We are working to win." "And, we will win in '64."

Speaking to a packed house, Barry junior, with his personable manner of presentation detecting a western drawl, kept his audience in complete attention as he proceeded to hit some of the sharper campaign issues.

Barry junior, referring to his father's stand on crucial issues, had this to say:

"We must be tough against the Communists—the most prominent threat to the peace of the world to date. We should stand up to their threats and aggressive moves like we stood up in Lebanon with troops, or in Turkey and Greece. We should not back down like we did in Cuba, in Laos, or Vietnam. This present administration had repeatedly "backed down" and "softened" up their policy with the Communist world. We need to put some backbone into our foreign policy that the Communists will respect, and that we as a nation will respect.

Barry junior then emphasized how his father had talked about the rising crime rate. The Senator's son said: "The crime rate in the United States is going up—it is not going down, it is going up." The ruthless terror in our streets, the

Voter Registration To Set New High In State

INDIANAPOLIS UPI — An apparent record high in voter registration was being tabulated in Indiana today, following the Monday midnight deadline.

Neither Republican nor Democratic state headquarters had any exact totals by mid-day. But Republican state Committee Secretary James T. Neal estimated the total would be "just a little under three million."

He said the registration in 1960 was about 2,650,000 and normal population growth plus additional efforts by both political parties to get voters registered would move the total near the three million mark.

Neal said a federal suit to be filed by the Democrats seeking to allow door-to-door voter registration in the 11 most populous counties would lead to numerous voting irregularities.

"If the Democrats would work to get the voters registered on a year round basis as the Republicans do, there would be no problems," he said.

"The Democrats have the same opportunity we have to work at voter registration the year round," he said. "But they

Blood Pressure Tells A Lot

Q: Why is the blood pressure reading so important in a general physical examination?

A: To the physician, the blood pressure reading indicates important information about the patient's heart, kidneys, blood vessels and circulation.

Q: What is the meaning of the two numbers in the blood pressure reading?

A: The first, or higher number, is called the systolic blood pressure. The second, or lower number, is called the diastolic blood pressure.

The higher number indicates the pressure under which the heart is pumping blood into the vessels.

The lower number indicates the blood pressure in the blood vessels in the intervals between heart beats.

Q: Which of the two numbers is considered more important?

A: Contrary to the common impression, the diastolic, or lower number is the more important figure because it is a more reliable and accurate index of the pressure in the circulatory system.

The systolic, or higher number is, of course, important, too. It has a tendency to fluctuate during periods of emotional stress, and with change of position.

Even an examination for insurance, performed by a strange doctor, can sometimes produce a temporary elevation of the systolic blood pressure. Therefore, it would not represent the true condition of the patient's blood pressure.

It is for this reason that the

usually repeated readings are taken after a period of rest and reassurance.

Q: What is considered normal blood pressure readings?

A: There is no validity to the impression that normal blood pressure should be "100 plus the age of the patient."

The age, the body structure, the weight and height, and even the ethnic background and geographic area all influence the "normal" blood pressure for each individual.

Q: What are the causes of high blood pressure?

A: High blood pressure, or hypertension, is not a disease in itself. It is a symptom of an abnormal body condition.

Diseases of the heart, arteriosclerotic changes in the blood vessels, disturbances of the hormone secretions of the thyroid and adrenal glands, and chronic infections of the kidneys are some of the possible causes of high blood pressure.

Q: Why do doctors so often hesitate to tell the patient the exact readings?

A: Because these numbers often induce unnecessary fears in patients. The reassurance that the physician offers is far more important than the knowledge of the exact numbers.

With modern drugs and a rigid dietary regime, under a doctor's regular guidance and treatment of the underlying cause, patients with high blood pressure can now look forward to a longer, happier, more productive life.

Poisons In Home Are A Menace

ACCIDENTAL poisoning, especially of children, still presents a staggering menace to health.

Despite the most arduous pleas by public health educators, almost 2,000 deaths happen each year in the United States from chemical poisonings alone. The number of non-fatal cases is estimated at more than one million yearly.

Yet such overwhelming statistics never seem to be as impressive as the single unnecessary death that occurs to someone close to us.

A few statistics will serve to draw attention to the reality of this problem. Poisoning is always accidental and almost always the result of carelessness.

Children Chief Victims

Children are the chief victims. More than 50% of all poisonings occur in children below the age of 5 years, and the greatest number in children of 2 years.

The fact that stands out most compellingly in the report from the New York City Department of Health, from which the above statistics were drawn, is that infants and children, who are least equipped to protect themselves, are the very ones most often exposed to the dangers of the carelessness and inadequate inspection of hazard areas within the home.

Toddlers Are Basters

Toddlers and babies in the crawling stage are most likely to taste and swallow anything that lies in their reach. Unfortunately, bleaches, insecticides and cleaning solvents are usually kept on the floor.

It is at the age of three and four years that children become

curious climbers and begin to explore the medicine cabinets, closets, and hidden areas. About the age of five, youngsters pass through this tasting, exploration period and become more cautious about bad-tasting and dangerous substances.

The number of fatalities due to the consumption of aspirin is most surprising. This effective drug is normally considered one of the safest of all common household drugs. The tendency to make aspirin more palatable has disadvantages as well as advantages, because to many children it is nothing more than candy.

Many Deaths Preventable
Other serious poisoners are lye, bleaches, insecticides, sleeping pills, and cleaning fluids. In New York City alone, the deaths of 162 persons under the age of 20, in a six-year period, were considered preventable.

If a poison is swallowed, the most important immediate first-aid measure is to try to dilute it. Milk, water, milk of magnesia, fruit juice or diluted vinegar are almost always readily available. Call for a physician or aid from your local hospital immediately. Keep the container; valuable time can be saved if the exact nature of the poison is known.

Lock Up Medicine

Keep medicine closets locked. Do not transfer poisonous substances into soda bottles, coffee cans or milk bottles.

Handbags, the constant objects of a child's scrutiny, too often contain enticing pill boxes. Secure the health of your family by checking and double checking all danger spots.

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Cardinals Intend To Upset Favored Yankees

ST. LOUIS UPI—Hot-shot Ray Sadock and old pro Whitey Ford match left-handed pitching strength today when the St. Louis Cardinals set out to prove that upsetting the New York Yankees in the World Series could be easier than winning the National League pennant.

With scalpers getting \$50 for tickets priced at \$8, a capacity crowd of 31,000 will turn out at tiny, antiquated Busch Stadium to see the teams with the best World Series records of all major league teams face each other for the fifth time. The Yankees are 20-8 in overall series competition, the Cardinals are 63—and they stand 2-2 against each other.

"The pressure has been heavy and we've gone through it," said Sadock, referring to the tense ordeal of the final days of the National League race. "It did us a world of good. I'm sure it prepared the players. I know it prepared me."

"I thought there was pressure hurting us last week," he continued. "And we felt it mount until the middle of the last game. Then, when the big Philadelphia Phillies began to go up on the scoreboard against Cincinnati, we relaxed right away. We're pretty loose and we're going into this in real good shape."

Cleveland Gets 10-Day Reprieve

CLEVELAND, Ohio UPI—The city of Cleveland has received a 10-day reprieve on the decision whether the Indiana baseball franchise will remain here.

Gabe Paul, president and general manager of the Indians, said after a four-hour closed meeting Tuesday that the board of directors will wait until Oct. 16 to see the results of an advance season ticket sales drive for 1965.

The board recognizes the Indians cannot continue to operate on the same basis as in 1963 and 1964," he said in a statement. "However, they feel that Cleveland officials and civic groups should be given a opportunity to stimulate sufficient support to enable the club to remain here."

"The board, therefore, voted unanimously to postpone action pending further study, investigation and consideration and direct the officers to report

their findings and recommendations to the board."

Paul presented the officers of three other cities, figures on the club's finances and attendance, and promises and commitments for the city of Cleveland.

Still Wants To Move Athletics

CHICAGO UPI — Charles O. Finley apparently is preparing another request to move his Athletics from Kansas City to a more profitable locale.

The A's owner said he has summoned his board of directors for a meeting to discuss the past four years of operations in Kansas City.

Finley's announcement came after the Cleveland Indians' directors ruled to discuss possible transfer of the franchise and was obviously intended to pave the way for the Athletics' third request to move this year.

Finley said major stockholders and board members would gather in his Chicago insurance office at noon Friday.

Sophomores Jay Walker and Kent Ober finished one-two in lifting DePauw University's cross country runners to a 22-23 victory over visiting Hanover College here yesterday.

Walker sped over the four-mile Blackstock Stadium course in 23:05, finishing barely two seconds ahead of Ober and five seconds ahead of Hanover's first runner.

As a matter of fact, nine runners poured across the finish line in less than 55 seconds. DePauw senior Terry Chappel clinched the Tiger victory coming in tenth to complete DePauw's scoring.

Scoring besides Walker, Ober and Chappel were Dan Blaney, fourth, and Steve Norris, fifth. Hanover, DePauw's third victim in six outings, claimed 3-6-7-8 and 9.

DePauw will run Butler Saturday in Indianapolis.



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KOKOMO, UPI—Dr. Milton Boyer is going to forget about dentistry the rest of this week—and perhaps part of next—to cheer for his two brothers in the World Series.

The Boyers—all seven brothers—will hold a family reunion at the Series. Six of them have been in organized baseball including "Doc" Boyer, who with his wife, Lois, will catch a plane from Indianapolis to St. Louis in time for the opener.

Boyer, a dentist here five years, said he made his reservations to attend the New York portion of the series two weeks ago.

"I wasn't so sure about the Cardinals," he said. "I've seen all five World Series that Clete's been in and I was in Cincinnati two weeks ago to see the Cards play and I really didn't think they could win it then."

But when they did—on the last day of the regular season Sunday—"Doc" prepared to close shop and head for St. Louis.

Pressed to predict outcome of the Series, Boyer allowed, "Well, I'd like to see Kenny win a World Series ring."

"I guess 'I'm pulling for the Cardinals to win in seven games. Clete said he hoped it would only go four and I imagine Kenny feels the same way."

Boyer and his brothers got

into baseball back home in Alba, Mo., because there wasn't much else to do there, "and we lived right across the street from the ball diamond."

Boyer played three years in the Cardinal organization before he quit at the age of 19 to pursue a career in dentistry.

Cloyd, the oldest of the Boyer brothers, is a pitching coach in the Yankee organization. An injury to his pitching arm cut short his promising career. Ronnie also plays in the

Yankee chain. Len, at 18 the youngest and a recent high school graduate, has signed with the Cardinals and another brother, Lynn, is a high school basketball coach at Walker, Mo.

The dentist's wife is a "new" baseball fan, Boyer said. "She's a Hoosier, you know," he id, "and she likes basketball, but we brought her up the 'Boyer method'."

And that means she is getting a steady diet of baseball talk these days.

Evansville, Ball State Take Early Lead In ICC Offensive

There seems to be no place for the slow foot or the weak arm in this year's Indiana Collegiate Conference football derby.

Experiencing its wildest scoring binge in recent years, the loop in two weeks has produced 258 points in six games, a spread of 21.5 points per team per game.

Over the same stretch last year the same number of games went into the books at a very normal, unspectacular rate of 10.5 points per club.

Ball State, Evansville and Indiana State, all undefeated, are, of course, the big contributors to the burgeoning averages.

Evansville, dormant and at the bottom for two years, has hammered DePauw and St. Joseph's, 35-6 and 42-0; Ball State has swelled the average with 28-14 and 23-20 verdicts over Butler and DePauw; and

Indiana State has cooled off Valparaiso, 35-6.

A pair of teams with but one loop game on the books is leading this week's team statistics. Indiana State in its sole date with Valparaiso propelled itself to the top in Total Offense (354.0 yards); Rushing Offense (283.0); and Total Defense (151.0).

Butler, though losing to Ball State, came up with 173 passing yards to claim this department, 25 yards ahead of Valparaiso. Two-game winner Evansville is second in Total Offense (329.0) and Total Defense (166.0), and Ball State is just behind Indiana State in Rushing Offense (278.9).

Ball State's all-conference back Merv Rettenmund and Valpo's ICC MV Back, Dave Lass, resumed leadership in individual departments they won last fall.

Rettenmund is tops in rushing with 214 yards in 23 carries, and Lass paces total offense with 315 yards and passing offense with 297 yards.

Evansville's bombardier, Kim DeVault, rides second behind Lass in total offense and passing and actually carries a per day average that outdistances Lass, 10.2 yards to 4.5 yards.

DeVault's teammates, Bob Glaser, is literally out running the field in the pass receiving department with six catches for a total of 177 yards. Valparaiso's Jim Konard and Fred Miller have seven catches apiece, but for less yardage—102 and 91.

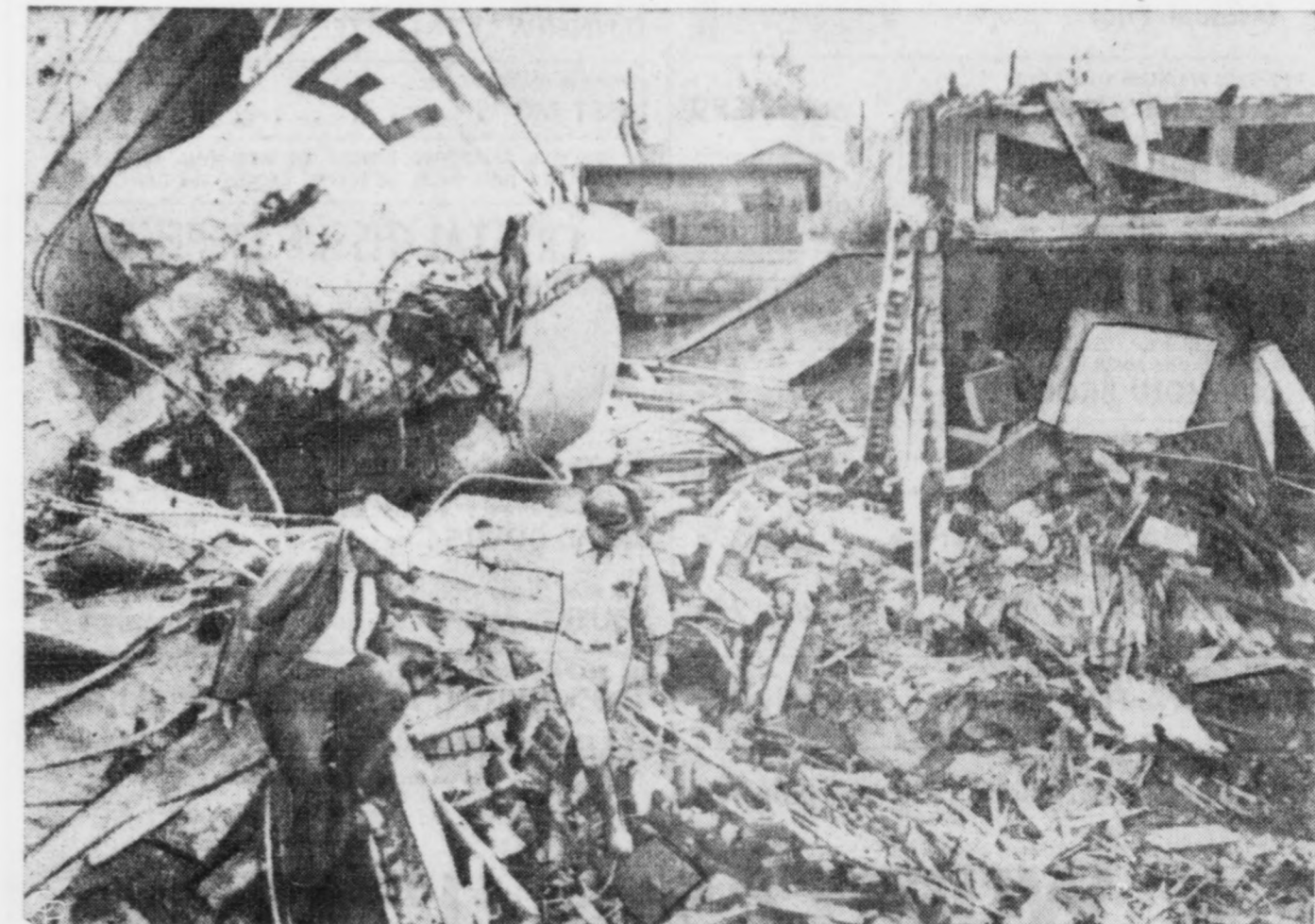
A real race is developing in the kicking category where three punters are knocking at the 40-yard club. Butler's Van Baker and Ball State's Nickey Baker are tied with a 39.2 average, and Dick Raddatz of Valparaiso is only a bounce back at 39.1.

Twenty-eight points in two games have pushed fullback Dave Reeves of Ball State to the top spot in scoring. His closest competition comes from Evansville's Glaser with 24 and Glaser's backfield teammate, Mike Madriaga, who has 21.

Ball State this week had a chance to fatten its lead in the standings, entertaining St. Joseph's in a homecoming tilt at Muncie.

Down south, meanwhile, high-flying Indiana State and Evansville collide in a suspenseful Dad's night game, not only pitting the perfect ICC slate, but also unblemished season records.

Butler (0-1) and DePauw (0-2) will mix up in Indianapolis in a "must" game for both clubs, and Valparaiso takes the weekend off, facing Washington of Missouri in St. Louis.

Speaking of YOUR HEALTH... By LESTER L. COLEMAN, M.D.

On Controlling An Epidemic

DESPITE the most relentless health controls, epidemic outbreaks of diseases still occur.

The city of Houston, Tex., has been the unfortunate victim of an epidemic of encephalitis

(or sleeping sickness), even though its health controls are of the highest order.

This epidemic serves to emphasize that there can be no letup in the vigilance against the causes of disease.

Viral encephalitis was concentrated in Houston, but also was reported in isolated cases in Florida, Illinois and Arizona.

Spread By Insects

This particular type of sleeping sickness or brain fever, one of the many varieties of encephalitis, is spread from animals to man by insects. The Culex, or common mosquito, was the offender in this epidemic.

Human beings are not ordinarily prone to insect-borne encephalitis as are birds and small animals. The disease, therefore, can be considered a so-called "accident" from the point of view of public health.

Traced To Virus

The outbreak in Texas has been traced to a specific virus referred to as the "St. Louis" type. The name derives from the fact that it had produced a severe outbreak of sleeping sickness in that city in 1933.

At the present time, there is no known vaccine for immunization against all types of en-

cephalitis. It is important, therefore, that the disease be prevented by scrupulous cleanliness and eradication of those places where insects can pick up the virus.

Force Of Experts

A bulwark of defense against communicable disease exists in Atlanta, Ga. Here, the United States Public Health Service houses a concentrated force of experts on epidemics.

When the call came out from Houston, this center in Atlanta sent out an army of health experts to battle and destroy every stagnant ditch and breeding place where the Culex mosquito might be flourishing.

Thousands of gallons of Diesel oil blanketed the stagnant areas to destroy the potential carriers of this dread disease.

Emphasizes Control Measures

The unfortunate victims have highlighted the importance of never-ending watchfulness of every area where the virus of this type of encephalitis may breed.

Concentrated control measures are being established so that even occasional mild epidemics can be prevented. At the same time, vaccines against sleeping sickness are being prepared, with more and more success.

Third Rule Requires Breaking First Two

Most bridge players follow two rules for the play of a trump contract. First you draw trumps, and then you take your finesses. Add a third rule: Break the first two rules on difficult hands.

South ruffed the second club,

led a trump to dummy's ace and returned a trump. Fortunately,

ately, the jack showed up, and South's queen forced out the king. West returned the ten of clubs, and South ruffed again. Declarer had to use up his last trump to draw West's nine, but this didn't scare him. After all, he was just following his rules.

Naturally, South went ahead with a diamond to the jack and the jack of hearts for a finesse. Alas for the rules! West won with the king of hearts and took the setting trick with the nine of clubs.

South can make the contract after drawing trumps if he

doesn't take the heart finesse. He must take the ace and jack of diamonds and then lead the eight of clubs, discarding a heart or a club return gives declarer his tenth trick.

BREAK BOTH

It's foolish to rely on West to have only two diamonds. South can surely make his contract if he breaks both rules. He must not draw trumps, and he must not take the heart finesse.

After ruffing the ten of clubs, South runs his diamonds to discard hearts from dummy. If West fails to ruff, South discards two hearts from dummy,

cashes the ace of hearts and ruffs a heart in dummy to produce ten easy tricks.

If West ruffs a diamond with the nine or spades, he must then return a heart or a club. A heart would give South a free finesse. If West, instead returns the nine of clubs, South ruffs. Dummy's eight of clubs is then good and will eventually give declarer his tenth trick.

DAILY QUESTION

Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: Spade K 9 2 Heart K 5 2 Diamond 8 3

Club J 10 9 5 4. What do you say?

Answer: Bid two spades. This shows trump support (at least three to a picture card) with about 6 to 10 points, including distribution.

Editorial Group Hears Humphrey

WASHINGTON UPI—Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey said today that the "vital key to our national security is responsibility in the use of strength."

The Democratic vice presidential nominee made the statement in a speech prepared for delivery at the annual conference of United Press International Editors and Publishers here.

After the speech, Humphrey

was scheduled to head his campaign into Ohio and Pennsylvania. Appearances were planned at Youngstown, Ohio; Sharon - Farrell and Erie, Pa., and Ashtabula, Ohio.

The senator's speech to the UPI editors and publishers dealt with foreign policy. He said for that nearly 20 years the presidential candidates of both parties had agreed on the "fundamental national goal in our relations with other nations."

He said, "the man we elect as president this November must understand the nature of this legacy and be committed

to its continuation. In addition, he must clearly perceive the nature of the world in which he seeks to apply this bipartisan policy."

Humphrey outlined seven principles upon which he said the bipartisan foreign policy was based:

—"... Commitment to maintaining our nation's defenses. —"Partnership with the developed nations of the Atlantic and Pacific communities. —"Communication with the Communist - ruled peoples of Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. . . bridge - building in

behalf of freedom. —"A fourth principle . . . relates to the priority placed on preserving unity and promoting social and economic progress in our own hemisphere. —"A fifth principle . . . relates to the three-fifths of mankind who lives in Asia and Africa: Our commitment to assist them in the difficult and complex tasks of nation-building.
