THE GOOD OLD DAYS

From the Files of The Banner, 1894

Policeman Ashley had an exciting experience Monday evening in south Greencastle. He was standing near the Vandalla tracks near where Marshal Starr had his freight train with Everett Bourne. A freight train was pulling out for the east and in the caboose was Dick Hampton, for whom the Greencastle officers have a warrant. Hampton yelled at Ashley and after passing the compliments of the day drew a revolver and, as Policeman Ashley states, let drive, the bullet whizzing uncomfortably close to the officer. The train rapidly carried Hampton out of reach and sight. It seems these young Coatesville toughs are bent on killing a Greencastle policeman. They should be called down.

KOKOMO, IND. June 25 — John Bacon of Russellville, while attempting to mount his bicycle, shot himself seriously. The revolver was in his hip pocket and caught against the seat spring, causing its discharge. The ball entered the hip and ran down as far as the knee. He will recover.

EL RENO, Indian Territory, July 5th—"Lit" Dalton, the surviving brother of the notorious Bill Dalton, with a Mexican rodeo into the city, tied their horses and entered a saloon. The Mexican emerged from the saloon when an officer approached him and commanded to turn over his six-shooter, which order he resented by shooting at the officer. A fierce running fight ensued in which the Mexican was shot four times in the head and through the body and his horse was killed. He soon died. He was a frontier outlaw and desperate character. Dalton took no part in the affair.

It was rumored in South Greencastle yesterday that night policeman Frank Riley had committed suicide on Tuesday evening but a call at his father's residence this morning proved the report to be false. It is true, however, that he shot at his image in a mirror while suffering from a loss of sleep and nervous trouble ever since he began night work. He will give up his position as merchant police and seek some more suitable employment.

South Depot street was the scene of a pitched battle between Minnie Morgan and Mrs. Adams on Thursday evening. It is claimed that the Morgan girl cut a clothes-line belonging to Mrs. Adams, and which brought about a quarrel, and ended in a regular old-time fist fight. Minnie, it is said, was armed with a corn-knife, while Mrs. Adams chose a club as her defense. Officer Ashley appeared on the scene of the conflict before any serious damage was done, and put an end to the disturbance.

Neighbors in the vicinity are making numerous complaints about the disorderly conduct of a certain set who are continuous in creating a disturbance.

Schricker and has served as a trustee of both Purdue University and Franklin College. He was chief counsel for the Federal Land Bank of Louisville and Farm Credit Administration of Louisville from 1930 to 1938.

Close Station At Bainbridge

INDIANAPOLIS UPI — The Monon Railroad gained authority to close its station at Bainbridge and handle the business from Greencastle — except for two periods totaling four months each year.

The unusual arrangement was worked out when the Bainbridge Feed and Grain Co. protested at an Indiana Public Service Commission hearing against the joint petition of Monon and Railway Express Agency to remove the agent from Bainbridge.

The compromise worked out was to have the agent return to Bainbridge and man the station between July 1 and 31 and again between Sept. 16 and Dec. 15 for grain shipments.

County Included In Land Project

Four Indiana counties are to participate in a new U. S. Department of Agriculture program which will promote "conservation and better economic use of land."

The counties are Crawford, Harrison, Parke and Putnam.

This "1964-65 Cropland Conversion Program" will cost \$983,000 in Indiana, according to Lenard C. Pound, chairman of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation State Committee.

The program, which is open to any group or individual operating a farm under the same ownership for the past two years, will enable farmers to convert cropland to some other use such as pasture, farm forests, water storage or for recreational facilities.

Commercial Art Show Scheduled

An advertising art show composed of commercial art illustrations produced by four Midwestern concerns will go up in DePauw University's Art Center Sunday for a month-long show.

The educational exhibition is designed to show the intricate development of an advertisement as it blossoms from the idea stage to the finished piece.

Contributors to the show include the major advertising agencies of Leo Burnett, Foote, Cone and Belding, and Louis and Bromby, all of Chicago, plus the advertising art studios of Grant Jacoby, Chicago, and Stewart & Tassian of Cincinnati.

The world's largest advertiser, Procter and Gamble, also has a number of advertising illustrations in the show. Representatives of each of the agencies, art studios and Procter and Gamble are tentatively scheduled to lecture on the campus in conjunction with the exhibition.

The show offers a broad representation of layout techniques as well as several highly designed and super-realistic illustrations.

Professor William Meehan will kick off the show Sunday at 2:30 p. m. (CDT) with an introductory gallery talk and tour. The gallery hours Sunday are 1-5 p. m. and 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. on weekdays.

INDIANAPOLIS UPI — The Indiana State Highway Commission has taken the first step toward fulfilling an agreement with the Indiana Toll Bridge Commission to provide approach road to two new structures crossing the Ohio River.

The commission added to a 1964-66 program 11.7 miles of Indiana 135 leading to a Mauck toll bridge and 24.2 miles leading to the Champaign bridge. Together the added highway is expected to cost \$6.5 million.

At the same time the commission removed two other projects from its advance program as required by state law. It removed a section of relocated Indiana 19 near Tell City. But it left in preliminary planning for a bridge over Anderson River near Tell City.

The Commission also authorized installation of traffic control signals in Greensburg on Indiana 3 at the intersection with E. First St.

The commission took the action although traffic chief Clinton Venable reported the volume of traffic did not quite meet minimum standards for signalization.

Venable said, however, "when an intersection lies within an isolated community having a population of less than 10,000 the minimum vehicular volume" can be 70 per cent of the normal minimum requirements. He said this was done because of the difference in the nature of traffic in urban and smaller municipalities.

QUEBEC CITY UPI — Queen Elizabeth comes to this ancient capital of French Canada today with the most massive security net in the nation's history deployed to protect her from possible separatist violence.

The Royal Yacht Britannia was due to dock at 9 a. m. EDT and the queen planned to come ashore an hour later for the start of what may be one of the most trying weekends of her dozen-year reign.

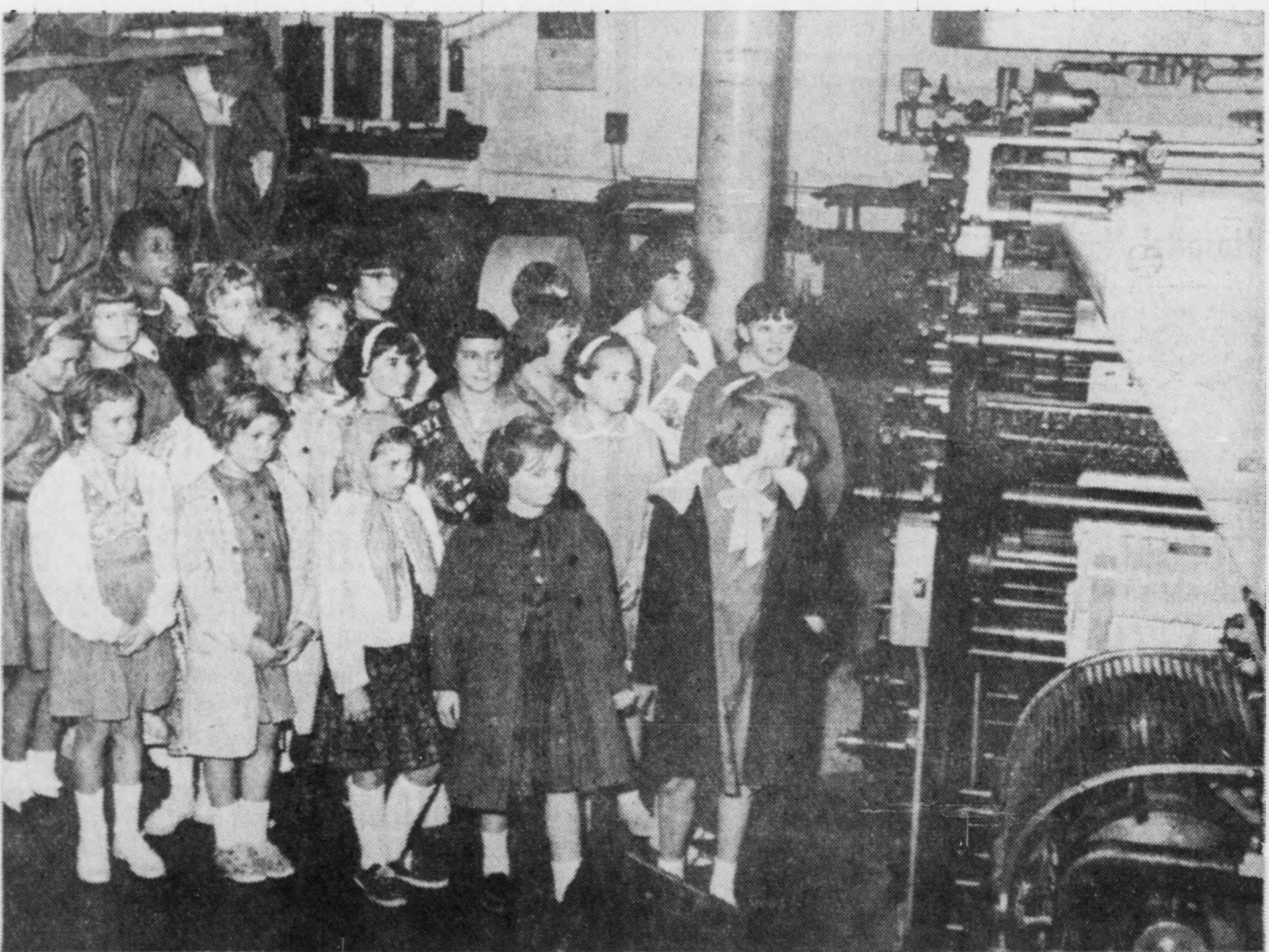

Chris Slipped A Bit On Friday

WASHINGTON UPI—Christopher Columbus slipped a bit Friday.
The United States officially got around to recognizing Viking Leif Erikson as the discoverer of America in the year 1,000, a good 500 years before Columbus.
Secretary of State Dean Rusk presided over a ceremony at the State Department commemorating this country's first "National Leif Erikson Day," so proclaimed by President Johnson.
Present were two Leif Eriksons, one a 16-year-old high school boy from Sarpsborg, Norway; the other a 17-year-old high school student from Moorhead, Minn. He was selected from that state's Norwegian-American community by Gov. Karl Rolvagg with the help of

newspapers and broadcasters. Norway's Leif, who spells his name Eriksen, presented Rusk with a menacing looking, authentic Viking battle axe from the Norwegian National Historical Museum. The youngster answered back that it had "not been used in anger for many hundreds of years."

Sheinwold On Bridge

Take Any Reasonable Risk Rather Than Accept Defeat

"Is it necessary for a bridge player to be a mathematician?" asks a regular reader? "We had a big argument about a hand last night, but the conversation got too mathematical for us."

"East took the first two spade tricks and returned a low diamond. South took the ace of diamonds and led out six rounds of trumps, but nobody made a helpful discard. Declarer finally had to give up two diamonds for down one.
"Dummy said that South should set up the clubs. After winning with the ace of diamonds, he should take the ace of clubs, ruff a club, and lead a low trump to finesse with dummy's eight. When this works, South can ruff a club, get back with a trump to ruff another club, and get back with a trump to cash the club.
"South said he would gain only if West had the ten of hearts and if the clubs broke 4-3. If anything slipped, he would go down two instead of just one. In the long run, he said, it was better to settle for the smaller loss.
"Who is right?"
FINESSE IS EVEN SHOT
If South plays the hand ten times he will lose the finesse five times and thus go down two. Three times out of ten he will make his contract. The other two times the finesse will work but the clubs will break badly, so that South will go down one.
Averaging out the ten hands, South scores plus 86 points per hand if he plays to make the contract. He scores minus 100 points per hand if he settles for down one. Who wants to give up 186 points per hand?
You don't have to work out your chances this way. When you're not doubled whether vulnerable or not, make any reasonable play that gives you a chance for your contract even if failure will cost you an extra hundred points.
DAILY QUESTION
Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: Spade K 8, Heart J 9 8, Diamond J 6 2, Club A 8 6 3 2. What do you say?
Answer: Bid - NT. You cannot raise with only two trumps, and the hand is not quite strong enough for a response of two clubs.



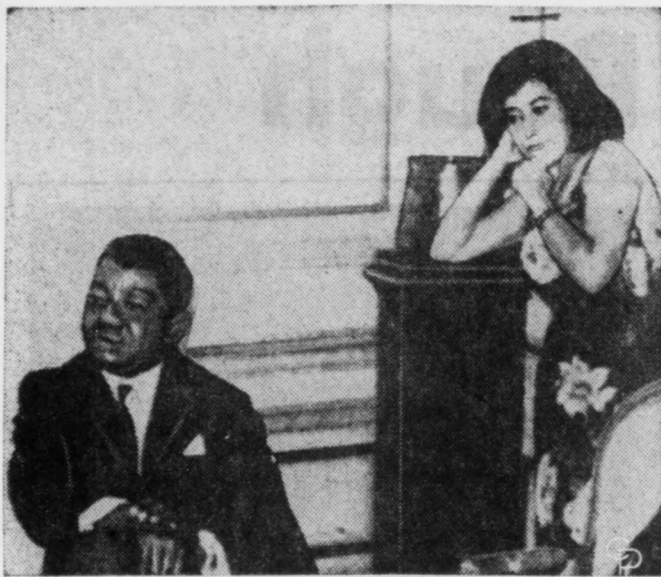

East Chicago Roosevelt, tied for fourth place with Indianapolis Ripple in the rankings, registered its fourth victory in a row, edging Northwest Conference foe, Valparaiso, 12-6, on touchdowns by Jack Sukup and Cliff Hardy.

Seventh-ranked Evansville Reitz, unbeaten but once tied, rolled over Evansville Rex Mundi, 46-6. Fullback Steve Vessels scored four touchdowns and Terry Babb passed to Bill Robertson for two others.

Tenth-ranked Bloomington made it six in a row with a 45-12 victory over Lafayette. Bloomington scored three times in the second period to break open what had been a close game.

Olympic Games Open Today In Tokyo To Sound Of Gongs

TOKYO UPI — The Olympic games opened today to the sound of oriental gongs and the spectacle of 5,500 athletes marching in rainbow-hued costume to the delight of a proud but rather reserved stadium packed with 72,000 Japanese and their overseas visitors.

It was a perfect, sunny day for the start of the 18th Olympic, first ever held in Asia. Jet planes painted the five ring Olympic insignia in delicate colors in the sky. Doves in the thousands whirled and circled above the vast crowd. Cannon boomed. A slender Hiroshima College boy in white ran gracefully around the track and up more than 100 green carpeted steps to light the flame that will burn the next two weeks.

Sunday the athletes get down to the business they came here for—competition in rowing, basketball, boxing, football soccer, weightlifting, field hockey, wrestling, swimming and diving, ridding volleyball and water polo. They are the first sports on the Olympic calendar for

1964. But today it was pomp and ceremony, music and speeches. Emperor Hirohito formally inaugurated the games in a one-sentence speech in Japanese: "I declare open the Olympic games of Tokyo at the XVIII Olympiad of the modern era."

The biggest cheers for the teams went, naturally, to the Japanese hosts contented and then almost equally to the United States, the Soviet Union and to Mexico — whose men and women in brilliant red jackets stood out vividly on the green field.

The applause in the vast arena was warm but certainly not thunderous and few spectators got to their feet. The Japanese are noted for their reserve. Until a few years ago, although wild about baseball, they would watch a game in utter silence except to applaud mildly for a fine play or home run.

There were 94 nations in today's opening ceremony. North Korea, Indonesia, Ecuador and

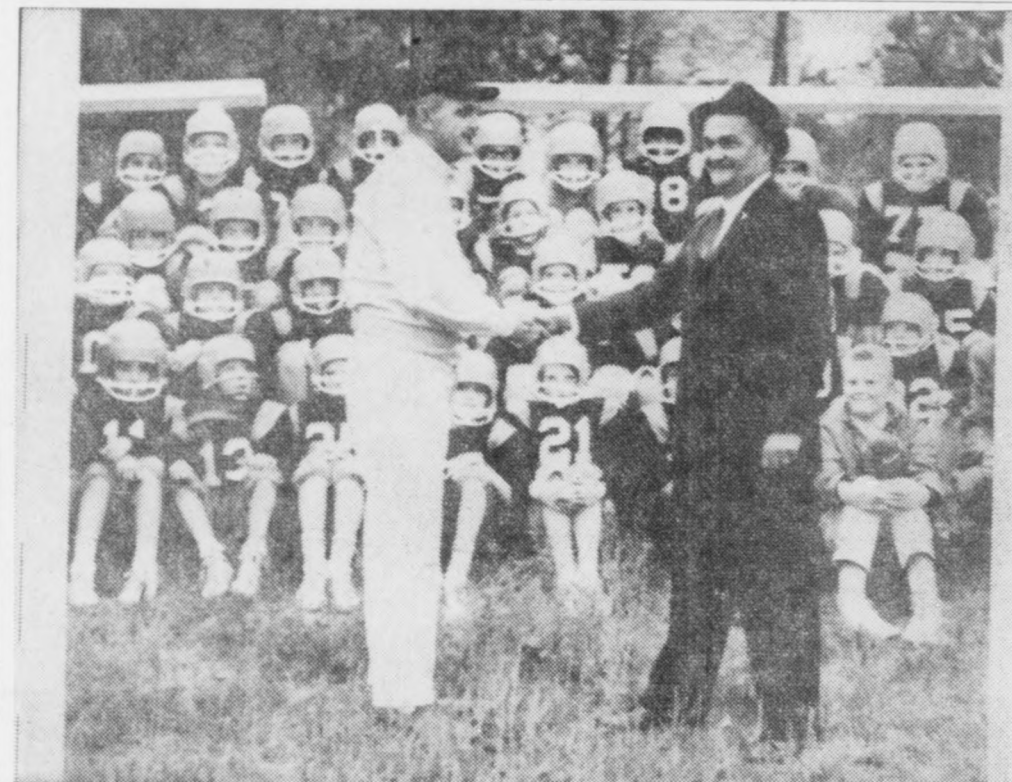

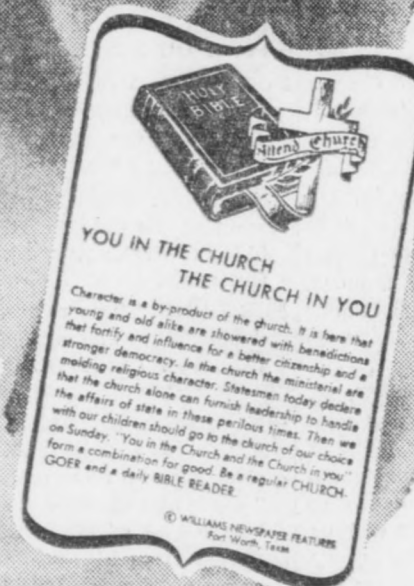
