Heavy Snow Is Predicted During January Period

DUBLIN, N. H. UPI — The snowfall this January will be more than double the average for the month, the Old Farmer's Almanac said Wednesday.

Forty inches will fall during the first month of 1965, 24.1 inches above the average, according to the Almanac's Abe Weatherwise.

The "storm of the winter" — a 20-inch accumulation — will occur between Jan. 18 and 21, the almanac said. "Tanks needed for these snow banks," is the warning for this period.

The average temperature for through April — will be 34.5 degrees, slightly below the average, the prediction said.

Winter precipitation will be 21.23 inches, Weatherwise said, 4.8 inches below the average. However, the snowfall will amount to 75.85 inches, about 11 inches above the average.

Otherwise, weatherwise predicts an unusually early spring and fall that will "linger unusually long."

### Ordered To Cut Gym Capacity

MARION UPI — The Marion School Board is the latest on the list of school officials ordered by the state fire marshal's office to reduce the seating capacity of its gymnasium. The board was told at a meeting Wednesday night that an inspector for Fire Marshal Ira Anderson visited Memorial Coli-

seum Tuesday and ordered the seating capacity cut from 6,500 to 4,700.

The inspector said that if changes planned by an architect last year were put into effect the seating could be increased to 5,100. The changes involve widening some exits and adding more exits.

However, the changes will cost about \$8,000 and the school board took no immediate action on the proposal.

### Former Mental Patient Hunted

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. UPI — Police hunted an ex-mental patient today, hoping his capture would end a series of arrests and raids set off by reports of a plot to kill President Johnson when he visits here Sunday.

The raids uncovered an arsenal of heavy weapons — including machine guns, hand grenades and a bazooka-like rocket launcher — amidst a collection of swastika banners and other Nazi gear.

Two ex-convicts were already jailed, charged Wednesday with violating the federal Firearms Act. But authorities emphasized they were not themselves suspected of plotting to kill the President — only of being possible suppliers of the weapons to be used.

There was no suggestion that the President would cancel his scheduled visit to Corpus

Both the union and company maintained a peaceful settlement could be reached, but Douglas Fraser, director of the union's American Motors Department, and Edward L. Cushman, AMC vice president, appeared gloomy Wednesday night when they met with reporters.

Fraser said the UAW American Motors Bargaining Committee voted by a two-to-one majority to make profit sharing a strikeable issue.

### Plea Made To Coin Hoarders

WASHINGTON UPI — The U.S. Mint and American bankers appealed to the public to shatter its piggy banks and empty its cookie jars to help relieve a serious coin shortage.

Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon said the mint is stamping out 20 million coins a day, but the shortage will continue to be serious through the Christmas buying season. He said the shortage was temporary and "We can look forward to the end of the coin shortage next year."

He told a news conference there were several reasons for it, but the main one is that speculators are busy in the coin market.

Dillon called a news conference to help the American Bankers Association (ABA) open a nationwide campaign designed to ease the shortage this fall.

Mint Director Eva B. Adams said coin production reached 590 million in September. The mint is shooting for well over 600 million coins in October and 700 million in November.

## Top LBJ Aide Resigns Due To Morals Counts

WASHINGTON UPI — A top aide to President Johnson has resigned following disclosure of his arrest on morals charges on two occasions.

The resignation of Walter W. Jenkins as special assistant to the President was announced Wednesday night by White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy in New York City where Johnson is campaigning. Reedy told a hastily called news conference in a hallway of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel that the President had named Bill D. Moyers, another White House aide, to succeed Jenkins.

Jenkins, 46, who figured prominently in the Bobby Baker case, was in seclusion in George Washington University Hospital where his physician said he was suffering from "nervous exhaustion and high blood pressure."

Dr. Charles Thompson said that Jenkins, an aide to Johnson for more than 20 years, had "just worn himself out" and probably would remain in the hospital for four or five days.

Washington police records

MIAMI UPI — Hurricane Isbell, the season's most fierce storm, changed its course today and zeroed in on the Carolinas coast with 100 mile an hour winds.

Hurricane Isbell stormed out to sea today after battering its way across the Florida Peninsula with winds up to 125 miles an hour.

Three small storm-spawned tornadoes chewed through three counties, unroofing a church at Eau Gallie, near Cape Kennedy and injuring several persons. Other twisters touched down near Fort Lauderdale and Coral Gables, south of Miami.

Officials reported more than a score of persons injured as Isbell slashed across Florida from the Fort Myers area to Palm Beach on the east coast. Winds of 82 miles-an-hour were reported at Palm Beach.

The weather bureau said Isbell was revitalized as it moved over warm Gulf stream waters off the Florida coast.

Heavy rains fanned out from the storm center, dumping more than five inches of rain on Tallahassee and one inch and a quarter at Brunswick, Ga.

### Ex-veep Visits In Fort Wayne

FORT WAYNE, UPI — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who carried Indiana by 222,000 votes in his unsuccessful presidential bid against John F. Kennedy in 1960, returned to the state today to campaign for the Republican ticket.

Nixon came here from Cleveland where he wound up a one-day campaign swing through Ohio Wednesday night with a speech in which he said election of the Democratic ticket Nov. 3 will mean a "government of the birds, by the birds and for the birds."

A prominent Negro federal judge, James B. Parsons, will examine approaches to successful human relations in a convocation address tomorrow at 10 a. m. in DePauw University's Meehan Hall.

Parsons was appointed by President Kennedy as judge of the U. S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois in 1961.

The Missouri born jurist had been serving as an elected judge of the Superior Court of Cook County (Ill.) prior to his residential appointment to the federal bench.

### Miller Stumps In Windy City

CHICAGO UPI — Rep. William E. Miller, the Republican vice presidential candidate, came where the voters are today in this state which Sen. Barry M. Goldwater considers a key to a GOP victory in November.

Miller, fresh from a campaign swing through Indiana, had formal speeches, receptions and an open air rally on his schedule in the Chicago area.

More than half the population of Illinois is in Chicago and its suburbs.

Miller's visit here preceded by a day that of Goldwater, who has set his sights on swinging Illinois into the Republican column with its 27 electoral votes. The late John F. Kennedy carried the state by the slim margin of a few thousand votes in 1960.

The GOP vice presidential candidate's swing through Indiana took him across the state from Richmond to Terre Haute.

At the Indiana State College Sports Arena in Terre Haute, Miller told a crowd of about 4,000 persons that the American people "want the truth" about Bobby Baker straight from President Johnson.

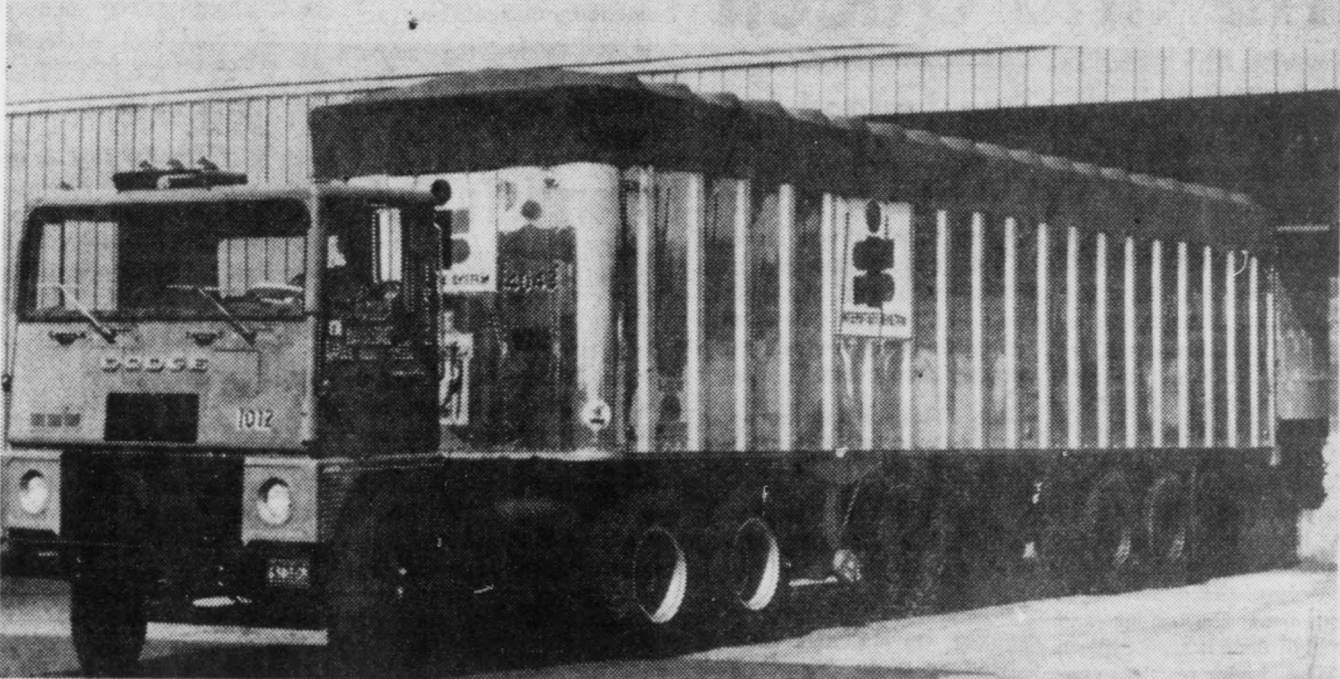

### Nikita Sets Up Top Red Session

MOSCOW UPI—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's invitation for a preliminary show-down meeting in Moscow Dec. 15 on the Sino-Soviet split has been accepted by about two-thirds of the Communist parties invited, informed sources said today.

These 25 parties were asked Aug. 10 to start work in mid-December on plans for a worldwide Communist congress which could result in the formal expulsion of Communist China from the world Communist bloc.

A similar group prepared Moscow congress of 81 Communist parties in 1960—the last occasion on which the Soviet Union and Red China were able to present a facade of unity. Now Communist China has turned down the Soviet invitation.

tion and has warned Krushchev, "the minute you call your meeting you will step into your grave."

Communist North Korea has rejected the invitation and Communist Albania is certain to.

Rejections are likely from Communist Romania, Communist North Vietnam and the Communist parties of Japan and Indonesia.

This would still leave the Kremlin with a comfortable two-thirds majority of the invited parties, more than enough to proceed with the organizational meeting.

### LBJ Campaigns In New York

NEW YORK UPI—President Johnson, stung by the revelation that one of his top aides was arrested on a morals charge goes to update New York today to campaign in normally Republican territory.

The swing through Rochester and Buffalo, originally designed to bolster the U. S. Senate hopes of former Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, took on added significance after the arrest of White House aide Walter Jenkins was revealed Wednesday night.

The news of Jenkins arrest came as a shock to the White and was regarded as a setback to the landslide victory that had been widely predicted for Johnson.

Johnson made no direct reference to the matter in the prepared texts of his speeches at Buffalo and Rochester. But in the Rochester speech he said no one was going to win "by slinging mud at each other, or by tearing down our cherished institution."

"Let's focus on these values

which can unite us, not the petty things that divide us," he said. "Today the number one issue in this campaign is responsibility."

### Sen. Goldwater Speaks In Texas

HARLINGEN, Tex., UPI — Sen. Barry M. Goldwater accused President Johnson today of "using every power of his great office . . . to cover up one of the sorriest rumors we have ever had in the nation's capital."

Goldwater's remarks were in a speech prepared for delivery at a campaign rally here today in his first of three stops in Texas. He also was scheduled to go to Beaumont and Houston.

The Arizona senator told reporters his mention of rumors and scandal referred to the Bobby Baker case. He said he had no comment on the resignation Wednesday of Walter W. Jenkins as a Johnson aide after disclosure Jenkins had been arrested on morale charges. Making his fourth campaign foray into Johnson's home state of Texas, Goldwater hammered hard on the Bobby Baker issue and gave almost equal billing to the President's fellow Texan, Billie Sol Estes.

Goldwater said: "All across this land there is a rising tide of doubt and dismay concerning the presidency of the United States."

"On the one hand, there is a President who asks for the most extreme devotion, even love, asking the people to go all the way with him, to turn their taxes, their future, their schools, their problems, their every wish over to him."

"On the other hand, there is a President whose great and good friend, Bobby Baker, has been exposed as a manipulator of high office. There is a President whose name and office is linked with that of a convicted criminal, Billie Sol Estes."

"And there is a President who must be using every power of his great office, right now, yesterday and tomorrow, to cover up one of the sorriest rumors we have ever had in the nation's capital."

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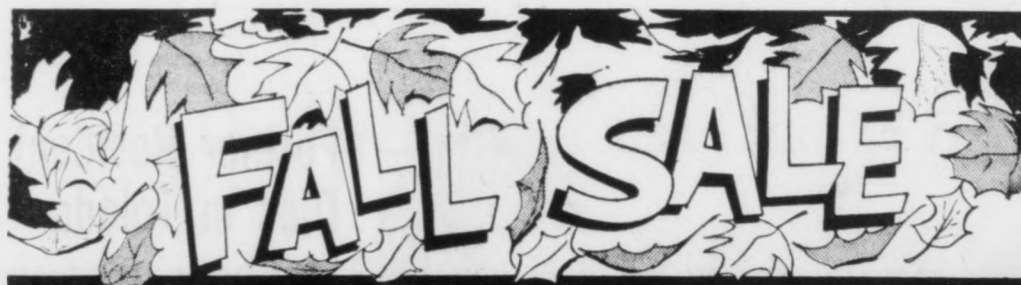

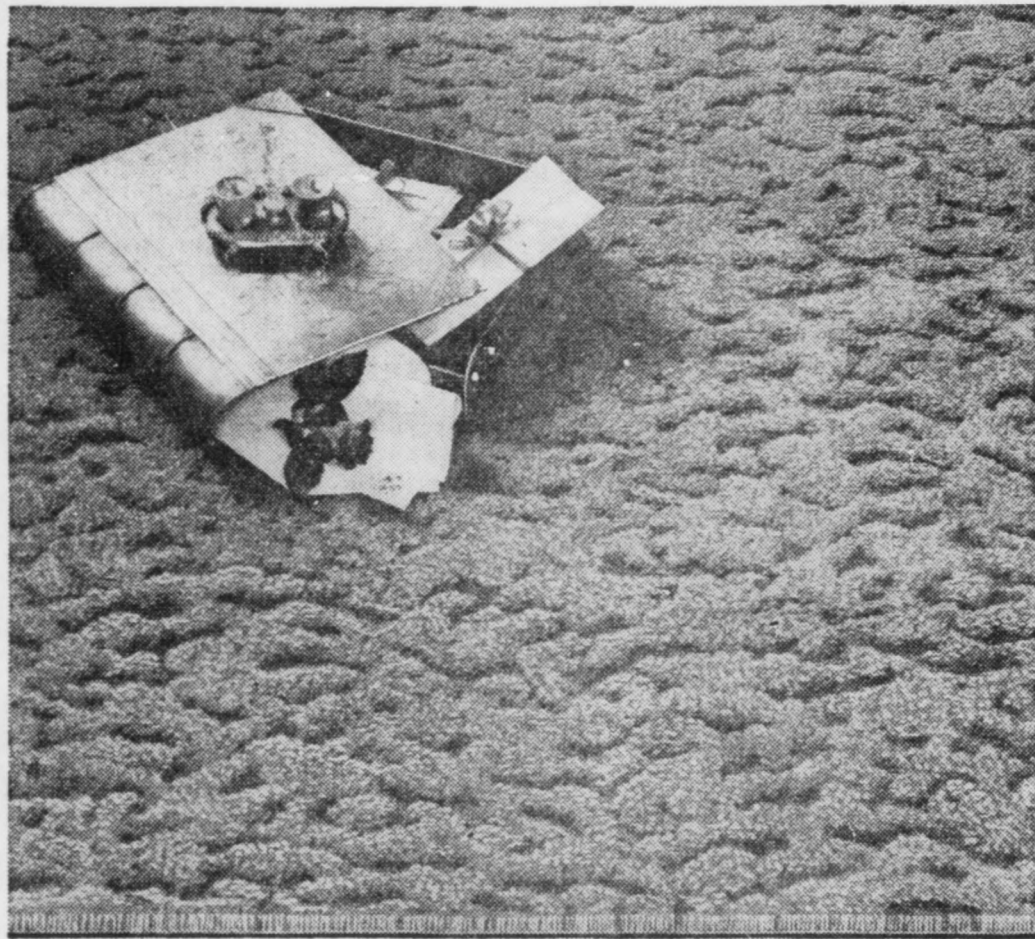

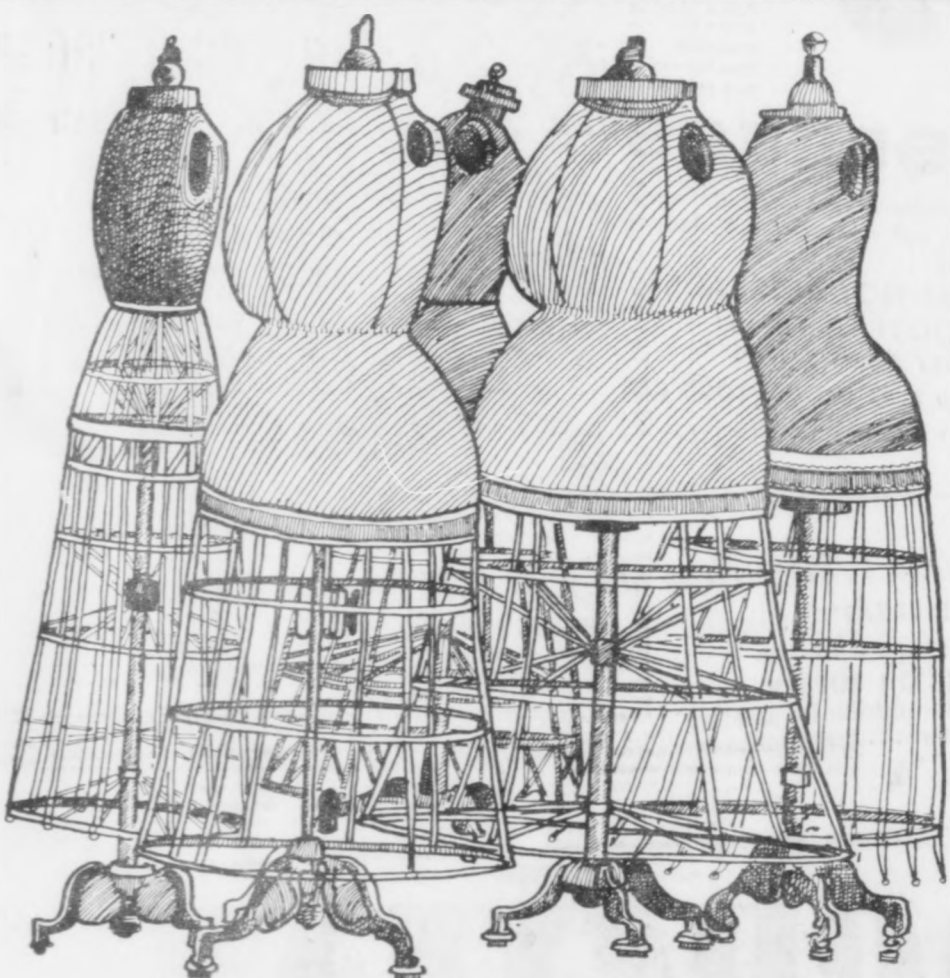

## Batting Power Of Yankees Ties World Series At 3 - All

ST. LOUIS UPI —Raw power was the story of the sixth game of the 1964 World Series as the New York Yankees stretched it to its seven-game limit with a 8-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

That old Yankee home run trade mark — missing in earlier games of this series — was in evidence as Roger Maris, Mickey Mantle and Joe Pepitone connected to pave the way for Jim Bouton to win his second game of the series and square the classic at three victories each after six games.

The homers by Maris and Mantle — only the fourth time in series history that batters have hit consecutive homers — came with one out in the sixth inning while 35-year-old Curt Simmons was battling young Bouton pitch for pitch.

Maris' homer broke a 1-1 tie and then Mantle followed on the next pitch to make the score 3-1.

The Yankees gave 25-year-old Bouton more than enough cushion when they bombarded Barney Schultz and Gordon Richardson for five runs in the eighth — four of them scoring when Pepitone hit the 10th grand slam homer in World Series history.

Those extra runs turned out to be important because fidgety Bouton had just about pitched himself out in seven innings. Manager Yogi Berra let him work his way out of a jam when the Cardinals scored a run in the eighth but yanked the deficit to 8-2 but quickly put him in favor of Steve Hamilton when the Redbirds started another rally in the ninth.

Hamilton pitched a run-scoring single to pinchhitter Charlie James but then got Curt Flood to hit into a game-ending double play.

It was the second victory of this series for Bouton, who won 18 games for the Yankees during the American League season. The loss went to Simmons.

18-game winner, who pitched beautifully against the Yankees until the M & M bomb went off in the sixth.

The Cardinals staked Simmons to a run in the first inning on singles by Flood and Lou Brock and Bill White's infield double play. Simmons shut out the Yankees until the fifth when Tom Tresh doubled and scored the tying run on Bouton's line single to left center field.

Phil Linz led off the eighth with a single for the Yankees, moved to second on a sacrifice and to third on an infield out.

Mantle was purposely singled but Elston Howard passed for one run and Tom Tresh walked to load 'em up again. That ended Schultz' tour on the mound and brought in Richardson, who had a 2-2 count when Pepitone hit his grand slam.

Bouton retired the first batter in the ninth but Yogi yanked him after singles by Mike Shannon and Jerry Buchek. Pinch-hitter Bob Skinner greeted Hamilton with a run-scoring single but then Flood hit to Linz, who started the game-ending double play.

Palmer, fresh from winning the world match play crown in England, has been installed as a co-favorite, with defending champion Nicklaus to take home top money of \$12,000.

If either man is able to accomplish the feat, then he will nail down another championship—top money winner of the 1964 tour.

Palmer is leading the official money-winning race with \$110,743 to his credit. But Nicklaus is right on his heels, with \$107,717.83. The others aren't far back but they couldn't catch the leaders, even by winning.

ROCHESTER, N.Y. UPI —The Quebec Aces of the American Hockey League opened defense of their Eastern Division title last week with a flourish, winning three games and completely dominating the individual and team offensive departments.

The Aces were paced by Keke Morteon who scored three goals and added four assists for a total of seven points to take an early lead in the scoring race.

Once-beaten Washington University of St. Louis provides the football fare Saturday at Blackstock Stadium where DePauw's Tigers hope to salvage the season's first victory.

Game time for the third renewal of the series has been set for 2:30 p. m., one hour after than previously scheduled.

Working guests at the battle will be eight high school bands comprising over 500 students. Tootling for DePauw's Central Indiana Band Day, the musicians will supply pre-game and half time shows.

The Bears enter the game with a 2-1-1 record. They hold victories over Missouri Mines (27-7), Valparaiso (21-0), a tie with Wabash (10-10), and a loss to Parsons College (26-7).

The Tigers' recent history in-

cludes losses to Illinois Wesleyan (41-15), Evansville (35-6), Ball State (23-20) and Butler (9-6).

Though DePauw's record is only 0-4, its first three conquerors are still undefeated after four weeks of play and Evansville and Ball State stand atop the Indiana Collegiate Conference.

According to DePauw coach Tom Mont, the Tigers' big problems this week are understandably sagging spirits and a flock of injuries that have riddled a once-substantial backfield.

A cartilage tear has sidelined starting halfback Bronson Davis, the team's third leading pass receiver and fourth leading rusher. Davis may be out for the rest of the year.

Only sure starters in the backfield for DePauw will be quarterback Bruce Mackey and fullback Bill Alcott who shoved his four-game rushing net to 256 yards with a 98 yard, 29-carry performance at Butler.

At least three previously injured players will be suited up again for Mont, but all of them have been out two weeks or more.

Halfback Tom Bollinger, the team's second leading rusher even though he has missed 2½ games, returns after a two-week absence, and halfbacks Jeff Lortz and Mike Burns resume action after early season injuries.

With the gears of its offensive attack coming and going, DePauw has had to spend a lot of its time acquainting new

players with strange positions. "We are going to have to limit ourselves to what we can do against Washington," says Mont. "We are retraining people every week to do jobs that are new to them."

Mont said Tod Eberle, who has been relieving Alcott and has 14 carries for 54 yards this season, may be switched to halfback to beef up the offensive punch.

DePauw hasn't had a great deal of trouble moving the ball in recent weeks, nor has it been undiminished in the number of plays it's run.

The Tigers have out-downed

four opponents, 238-208, and have a 17-yard edge in rushing offense. Their problem says Mont, is getting the occasional b-y play that will add zing and points to their grinding, ball control game that allow them to monopolize the ball to the point of wearing themselves out.

Washington brings to the battle a team Mont describes "as much better than Butler—a team with great overall speed, lots of depth, particularly in the backfield, and a trio of almost equally talented quarterbacks who have completed 34 of 68 passes."

The War for the Union 1861-65 in Pictures

**No. 466** A popular camp meeting revival hymn in the North after the war was "Hold the Fort," inspired by a headline story from Allatoona Pass, Ga., Oct. 5, 1864.

With the occupation of Atlanta, Allatoona Pass had become an important Federal supply depot. In anticipation of a raid by hungry Rebels, it was guarded by 860 men of the 14th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry, under command of Lt. Col. J. F. Tourtelotte.

The garrison made a valiant stand when, at dawn, that Tuesday morning in October, Maj. Gen. Samuel French's small division

of Hood's army struck toward Allatoona after cutting telegraph wires to prevent reinforcements being called by Tourtelotte. But the resourceful defender sent a message "overhead," via signal flag relay, to Sherman.

Back came the message, "Sherman is coming. Hold out." This was made "Hold the fort" in the dispatch of a newspaper correspondent which gave Northern readers the news of the Rebel repulse.

**Terrorist Killed By Firing Squad**

SAIGON, South Viet Nam UPI — A Communist Viet Cong terrorist, whose life was nearly traded for that of U. S. Air Force officer kidnaped in Venezuela, was executed here today by a firing squad for trying to kill U. S. Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara.

Nguyen Van Troi, 24, went to his death shouting "long live Ho Chi Minh" and "down with Nguyen Khanh." Seconds before the bullets ripped through his body, he damned the United States.

Troi was executed for the attempted assassination of McNamara during his visit to Saigon in May. He was caught trying to plant a bomb on a Saigon bridge over which McNamara was expected to pass.

Troi's execution was scheduled to take place last week. It was postponed when Cuban terrorists kidnaped Lt. Col Michael Smolens in Venezuela and it was rumored they would release Smolens only after Troi was freed.

Word was received here Tuesday of Smolens' safe release.

**British Voters Go To Polls**

LONDON UPI — Great Britain voted today in one of the tightest parliamentary elections in its history.

There was no certainty as to whether the winning party would be the Conservatives of Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home or the Labor party of opposition leader Harold Wilson.

There was fairly general agreement that it would be close — so close that the tiny liberal party might gain the balance of power between the two giants.

**Report Is Made On Corn Crop**

WASHINGTON UPI — Harvest of the 1964 corn crop of 3.6 billion bushels was about 18 per cent complete on Oct. 12, according to the government's weekly weather and crop bulletin.

The Weather Bureau said corn picking was 35 per cent complete in Missouri, 30 per cent in Illinois, 15 per cent in South Dakota, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio, 10 per cent in Iowa, and about 5 per cent in Minnesota. Picking was reported well under way in Nebraska. About 30 per cent of the Kansas crop had been cribbed. Corn harvest made favorable progress in Kentucky and Tennessee, but the going was slow in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina where rainfall was heavy.

Soybean harvest advanced rapidly throughout the corn belt, except in Minnesota where drying was slowed by continued cool, damp weather. More than half the soybean crop had been harvested in Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Ohio, and Minnesota.

The Weather Bureau said harvest of the cotton crop was not as rapid as in 1963 because of weather difficulties.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden UPI — Prof. Konard Bloch, a biochemist at Harvard University, and Prof. Feodor Lynen of the Max Planck Institute in Munich, Germany, today won the 1964 Nobel Prize for medicine for physiology.

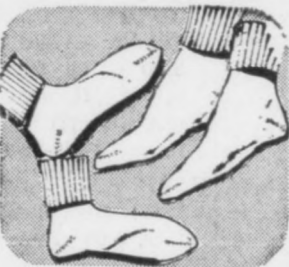

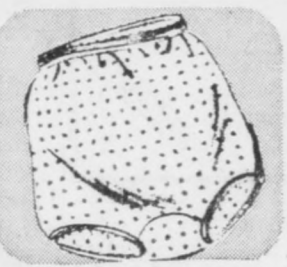

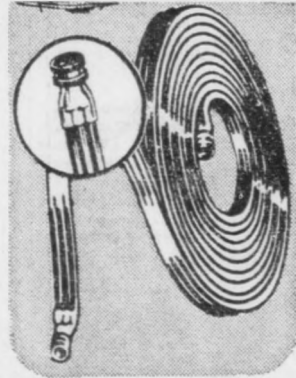
