Small Tornadoes Hit In State

Damaging storms, two of them described as small tornadoes, roared across twister-conscious areas of Northern Indiana Sunday afternoon during a six-hour period of severe thunderstorm forecasts.

Winds inflicted property damage but caused no injuries near Alexandria and on the southwest edge of Elkhart. Both points were in the general area of the vicious Palm Sunday tornadoes that killed 139 persons last April 11.

Lightning killed a Richmond fisherman in a lake near Angola and set off numerous house fires over parts of a 35-county area in the northeast portion of the state which was under a weather bureau alert for awhile.

John S. Childs, 35, Richmond, was fishing on a motorized pontoon-type raft in Jimmerson Lake northwest of Angola when a severe thunderstorm swept across the lake. He was found dead after the storm passed, apparently the victim of electrocution from a bolt of lightning.

Funnel clouds were sighted aloft near Alexandria and Elkhart within a period of about an hour in the early afternoon. Winds near Alexandria damaged three houses and some parked automobiles. The damage occurred along Indiana 9 south of the city.

At Elkhart, wind also damaged several homes, destroyed a tool shed at the home of William Stringer, damaged the home of Falko Fix, caused minor damage at the home of Gene Musick, and leveled a cornfield on the Granville Adams farm.

27,800 Pounds Of Beef Missing

PLYMOUTH, UPI—State Police and the FBI were searching for a missing semi-trailer early today which was stolen Sunday about 7 miles north of here on the intersection of U. S. 6 and U. S. 31.

The truck contained 27,800 pounds of fresh beef.

Authorities said Roger Kelly, 33, R. R. 2, Walkerton, had left the truck at a filling station early Sunday while he went home to sleep. He left the engine running to operate the refrigeration unit.

Later Sunday authorities called him to say they found his tractor abandoned in Chicago, but found no trace of the trailer.

Kelly was enroute from Chicago to Pittsburgh with the meat.

Attorneys Convene

MIAMI BEACH UPI—The American Bar Association ABA opened its 88th annual convention today prepared to hear reports on a wide array of topics, including new trends in the legal profession.

Outgoing ABA President Lewis F. Powell Jr., was scheduled to deliver the first major address. It was expected to touch on the federal poverty program's new role in legal aid and the controversial issue of group legal services by private organizations.

Director Friend brought to the Board's attention the fact that residents on the Manhattan Road are planning a survey to test the feasibility of acquiring water from Reelsville. The Board voted to contribute its share for this survey.

Mrs. J. W. Gough, secretary, reported that Fern Cliff had been recently used by a Senior Girl Scout troop and a church group from Brazil.

The Friend of Youth is a local county corporation, organized in 1951, which owns and maintains Camp Friend and Fern Cliff. It depends upon the generosity of local citizens for support. Services will be held at the Davies-Tudor Funeral Home in Marshall at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday with burial in the Bloomington Cemetery.

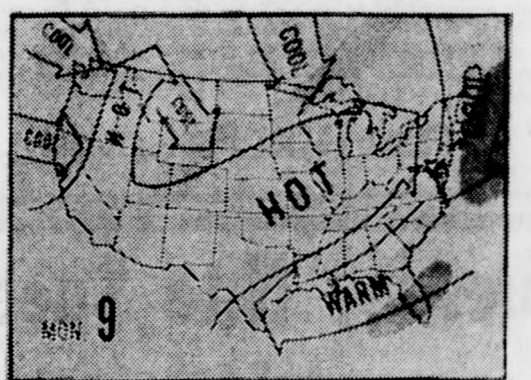

14 More Killed In State Traffic

One death early today and 13 over the weekend raised Indiana's 1965 highway toll to at least 835 compared with 724 a year ago.

Mrs. Alice Wells, 64, Lafayette, was killed early today when a car driven by her husband, Sidney, 68, struck a utility pole at the intersection of Indiana 25 and Indiana 28 in Tippecanoe County.

Larry Betz, 21, R.R. 1, Grabbill, was killed Sunday night when the car in which he was riding ran a stop sign and collided with two other vehicles at the intersection of Indiana 37 and Indiana 101 in Allen County. Five other persons were injured in the crash.

Emelie Weber, 65, a citizen of Germany visiting the U.S. and staying at Frankfurt, was killed Sunday on U.S. 41 in Lake County.

Authorities said an auto driven by Margaret E. Tracy, 49, Crown Point, swerved to avoid a vehicle pulling onto the highway and drove across the center line, into the path of the car in which the victim was riding.

Mrs. Tracy and her husband, Robert, 47, were both hospitalized at Hammond in critical condition.

Two Indianapolis teenagers identified as James E. Gibbs,

17, and Ronnie Lee Wimmenauer, 19, were killed Sunday when their car went out of control on Ind. 44.

Authorities said the auto struck a tree about 1 1/2 miles west of Bud in Johnson County.

Harlan Kaylor, 36, Lafayette, died Sunday when his truck went off U.S. 231 about 5 miles

She was transferred to Los Angeles County General Hospital in "serious condition."

More than half a hundred Greencastle and Putnam county residents are concerning themselves with the third and final summer theatre production, "Inherit The Wind."

Scheduled for August 27, 28 and September 3, 4, this entertaining production is based on the spectacular Scopes trial. Forty years ago this trial marked a crisis in American thought. The teaching of evolution alarmed Christian fundamentalists—yet there was objection to legislation which prevented teaching the theory.

Directing the play is James Elrod, professor of speech at DePauw University. He will be assisted by Mrs. Robert Gilliland as technical director. The production questions what is the responsibility of our society toward freedom of thought in our schools.

Particularly interesting parts are to be played by Jack Cook as Matthew Harrison Brady, and Jerry Thomas as Henry Drummond. Thomas, a speech teacher in the California schools, is a Greencastle boy and is here during the summer visiting his parents. These two characters stage a debate based on the famous William Jennings Bryan and Clarence Darrow forensic contest.

On The U.S. Farm Front

WASHINGTON UPI — The policy-making officials at the Agriculture Department currently regard the pending farm bill as a package. It will go through the legislative mill as a whole, or it will fail as a whole.

Undersecretary of Agriculture John A. Schnittker told reporters at a news briefing Monday there was no thought of breaking the pending omnibus bill into segments for individual passage. He was asked if the administration would agree to a peeling off of the wheat or cotton segments in case the going got tough for either.

"It will all go through, or all go down," Schnittker said.

Schnittker substituted for Secretary Orville L. Freeman at the briefing. Freeman was busy mounting an intensive and far-ranging drive for congressional approval of the pending bill. He was so burdened with three speeches—two in Washington and one in Columbia, Mo.—that he had to call on Schnittker for help.

Schnittker said the credit picture for agriculture looks fine, and he expects it to look better in the next 12 months.

He said department officials continue to be amazed and pleased at the way farm exports are running. He noted that from the 1960 level of \$4.5 billion they have gone to a value of more than \$6 billion two that consumers need a continued abundance of food and fiber "at continued fair prices." He told them to remind the city solons that "we want farmers to have maximum opportunity to produce, to sell at prices that give national income, and to export without the handicaps of subsidies."

He advised them to stress the point that the great society farm bill is a "producer-consumers in a row. He said the farm export situation will be event better "when we get cotton exports back on the track."

In the Freeman speeches Monday—to a Nebraska group, to representatives of the National Farmers Organization, and to the Missouri Farmers Association—he reminded farmers they don't have much political muscle any more. He advised them to contact the city congressmen and tell them about the sale of American wheat to the Soviet Union as long as the requirement remains in effect that half of such sales be shipped in American bottoms.

Sheinwold On Bridge

Non-Expert Player Must Bid Modestly

By Alfred Sheinwold

A simple but very practical philosophy of bidding was expressed some years ago by a group of English experts: Bid what you think you can make. When a non-expert adopts this principle he must bid more modestly because he cannot as many tricks as an expert.

Four spades is the expert bid with the South hand. South is sure to make contract if east has the ace of diamonds; and has a fine chance if East has the king of spades. A non-expert's chance is not quite so fine.

The actual declarer took the first trick in dummy with the ace of hearts and tried a finesse with the queen of spades. When this worked he led a club to dummy and tried another finesse. The jack of spades held, but east showed out.

South next led a diamond to dummy's king, but East won with the ace. "Down one," South announced, as he conceded a trump, a heart, and two diamonds. "No score; I had honors."

And South smiled smugly. A weaker player might have forgotten to claim the honors, but South was much too good for that.

TOO SOON

South gave up too soon. There was no need to lose a trump trick even though dummy had no more trumps to lead through East.

After winning the second spade finesse, South should lead a club to dummy and ruff a club. Only then should he lead a diamond.

East takes the ace of diamonds and returns the jack of diamonds to dummy's queen. South ruffs dummy's last club and gets out of his hand with a heart or a diamond.

By this time South has taken eight tricks and still has the ace-ten of trumps left. Sooner or later South will make both of his trumps, scoring the game and rubber.

An expert can afford to jump to game with hands of this kind. A weaker player should issue an invitation to game without actually bidding it.

DAILY QUESTION

Dealer, at your right, bids one heart. You are next, holding: S-7 5 H-A 6 3 D-K Q 3 2 C-A K 9 4. hat do you say?

Answer: Bid one notrump. Thus shows about the same

strength as an opening bid of one notrump, including at least one sure stopper in the opponent's suit.

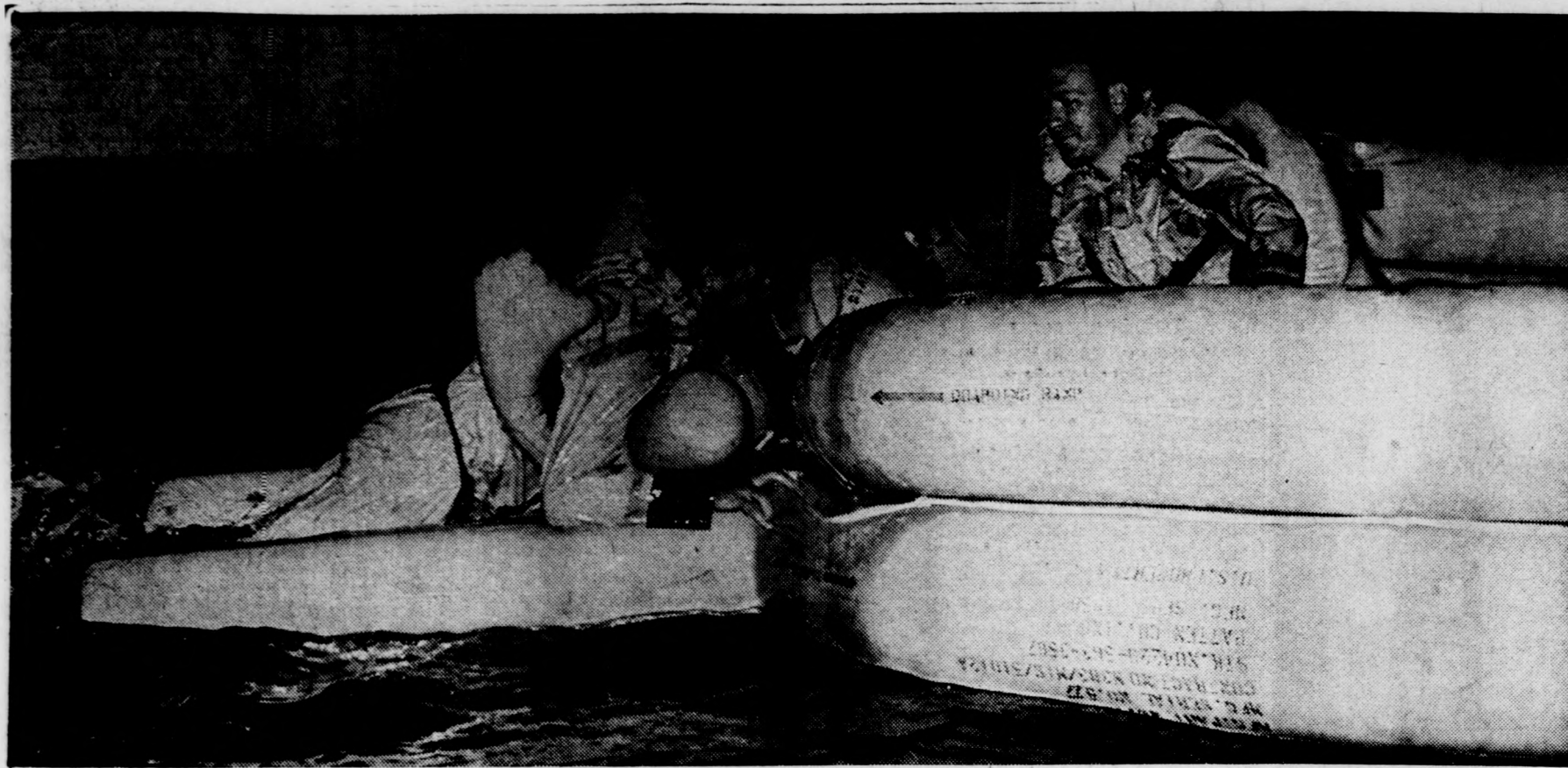

Foreign News Commentary

PARIS UPI — The junket through Communist China by French Culture Minister Andre Malraux is producing a lot of diplomatic fall out.

Diplomats have been asking: Was he or wasn't he sent on a Viet Nam peace mission for President Charles de Gaulle? The 63 year old Malraux, a former Communist turned ar-

dent Gaullist and now one of the French president's most trusted confidants, has been given red carpet treatment by Chinese Communist authorities. He has hobnobbed with top officials in Peking. He has been making a pilgrimage to shrines of the Communist revolution in remote areas of the country.

Inevitably the impression has gotten around that his mission is a top drawer one and that it can only concern the Viet Nam conflict, in which it is known De Gaulle sees himself ultimately in the role of mediator. First official French explanations were less than convincing. It was said Malraux was on a private cruise for his health, that his ship broke down at Hong Kong and that he took the opportunity to do some private touring in the footsteps of Marco Polo in the interior of China.

Later, French officials conceded there was more to it than this diplomatic cover up story.

Basically, it seems, De Gaulle has been deeply disappointed by the results so far of his attempts to cultivate the Chinese Communists.

It was in January of last year that the French leader shook his allies by recognizing the Peking regime.

A little over a year ago the two countries exchanged ambassadors.

But that's about as far as it has gone. There have been visits by trade and cultural missions in the normal pattern of relations

between the West and Communist countries, and the French are preparing to hold a trade exhibition in Peking.

But there is no warmth in the relationship. France's ambassador to Peking, Lucien Paye, rarely gets to see top Chinese leaders and when he does see them they tell him little he does not know from reading the official Communist press.

It seems almost certain that the main purpose of Malraux's trip is to see whether some real warmth cannot be injected into the relationship between the two countries. Malraux, as a former Communist who helped the Chinese Communists in the early days of their struggle for power 40 years ago, and who knows many of the present day leaders personally, seemed an ideal choice for such a mission.

It is doubtful he was instructed to do any specific negotiating on Viet Nam. But it obviously could not have failed to come up in his talks in Peking.

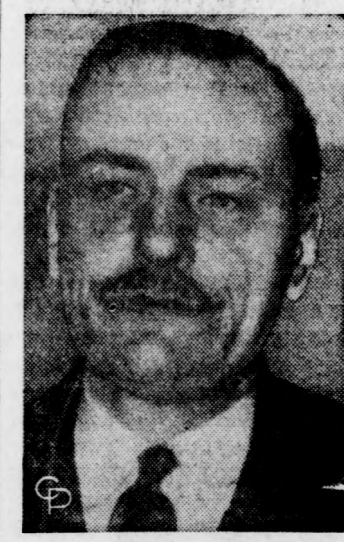

National Window Opinion

The Republican leadership of the U. S. Senate has an opportunity to score on the great society in the forthcoming debate of compulsory unionism.

Up for action will be repeal of section 14-B of the Taft-Hartley Act. Section 14-B provides that the states shall not be deprived of their right to outlaw compulsory unionism if they are so minded. This right was not conferred on the states by Taft-Hartley, which was enacted in 1947. The right of each state to forbid compulsory unionism within its borders is implicit in the U. S. Constitution.

Labor Demands Repeal
The House voted last week to repeal 14-B in response to demands of organized labor. The Democratic leadership of the House surrendered unconditionally to the labor demand. Labor bosses insisted that repeal be accomplished without trimmings of any kind, such as amendments to protect workers against outrageous violations of minority rights. And that is how it was done.

Chairman Adam Clayton Pow-

ell, D-N. Y. of the House Labor Committee brought the repealer to the House floor under what became known as the Powell gag rule. This meant the repealer was not subject to amendment of any kind. Therein lies the opportunity for the Senate Republican leadership to get up off the floor and make a fight of it. The Democratic majority in Powell's committee rejected six amendments offered by the Republicans to protect minority rights of members of compulsory unionism. The nature of these amendments is not generally known.

They are as follows:
GOP Amendments Offered
—Forbid a union to deny of limit membership or apprenticeship on account of race, color, religion or national origin.

—Prohibit the use of union dues or assessments for political purposes not directly connected with the union's statutory function as a bargaining agent.

—Forbid a union to fine or otherwise to penalize a member for exercising any right guaranteed to all citizens by the U. S. Constitution

Speaking of YOUR HEALTH...

Readers Are Asking . . .

WHAT is the cause of the stomach noises and rumblings that seem so embarrassingly loud? What can be done to avoid them?

The technical name is itself a rumbling sound, borborygmus.

The noises like distant thunder always seem to occur while in a pleasant, quiet atmosphere. It can be embarrassing.

The noises are caused by air that is trapped in the intestine. A small amount of air is normally swallowed while eating or drinking.

Sometimes an excessive amount of air is unconsciously swallowed if eating, talking and drinking are carried on at a fast pace at the same time.

Some people swallow large amounts of air if they force themselves to belch or take deep sighing breaths.

Also, there are some intestinal disorders that can cause the noises. In these cases other symptoms accompany the borborygmus.

Simple eating rules can usually prevent air swallowing. Eat slowly. Pause occasionally. Avoid the unacceptable habit of talking while chewing.

Eat smaller amounts at more frequent intervals. Inhaling the smoke of cigarettes, pipes and cigars while drinking after dinner coffee further induces the swallowing of air.

There are some mild charcoal medications that relieve the discomfort of gas bubbles. Many

safe home remedies are in vogue in all parts of the country.

The stereophonic sounds of borborygmus is usually of social rather than medical significance. Yet, a sustained period of such annoyances should be thoroughly studied for the possibility of some important underlying cause.

Is heart disease hereditary? The question perhaps needs clarification before an answer can be given to relieve anxiety rather than magnify it.

There are some heart conditions which are present at birth. These are congenital defects produced by some malformation during the pregnancy.

Heart disease is rarely a familial tendency.

Too often children of parents who have had heart attacks, spend their lives in unnecessary fear that they, too, will inevitably have the same affliction.

The unhappy consequence of such fears is that people live their lives expecting a disease that probably will never occur.

All people must necessarily have parents and family who have had some kind of major illness during their lifetime. The most disastrous aftermath of such illnesses can be the imprint of fear it leaves on the sensitive minds of younger members of the family.

Heart disease is rarely ever hereditary.

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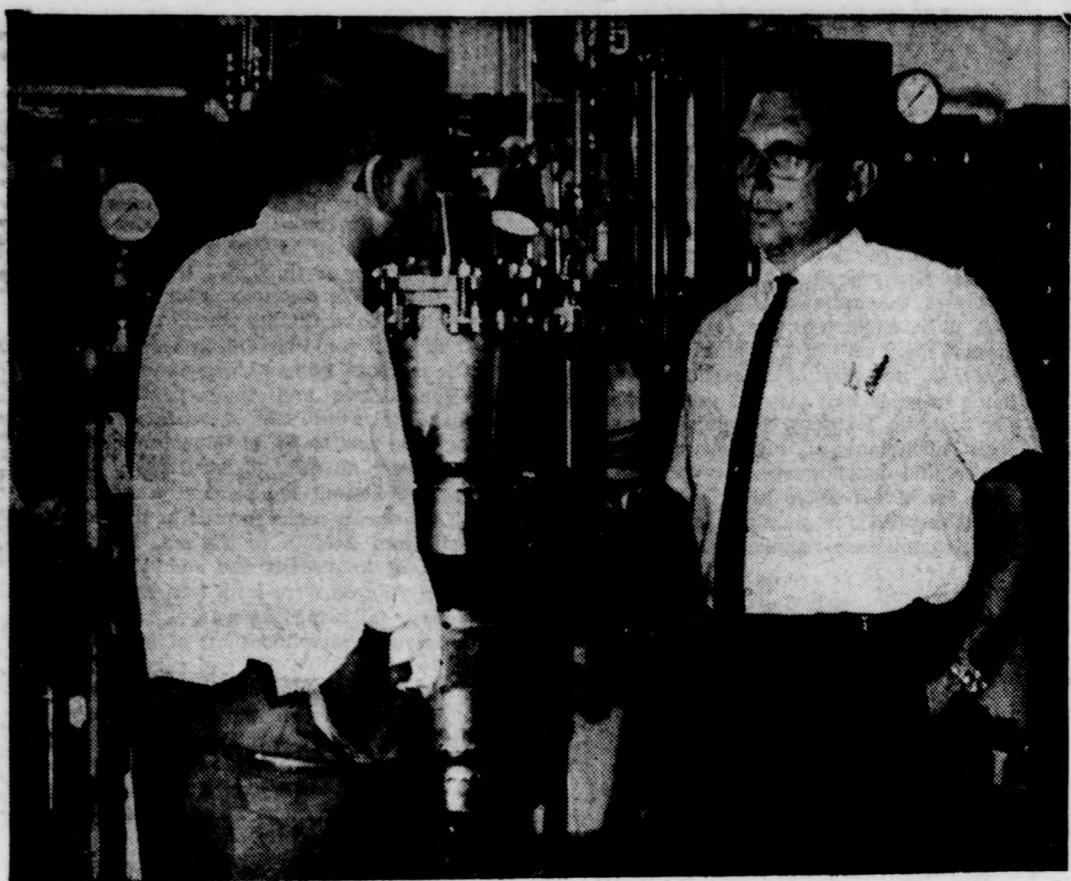

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

NEW HEADQUARTERS FOR WORLD HEALTH CAPITAL LANDMARK IS MODELLED AFTER U.N.

By HENRY CATHCART Central Press Washington Writer

WASHINGTON — If a beautiful and inspiring international headquarters influences success, then health should improve throughout the Western Hemisphere! Nearing completion here within a block of the Department of State is the new joint headquarters of the Pan American Health Organization and the regional office for the Americas of the World Health Organization. Both groups are devoted to improving health in the Americas. Moving of their library into the new headquarters has already started. Both groups expect to move their offices into this new home of inter-American health before the end of August. Dedication is scheduled for September, just in time for the 1965 conference of member nations.

The two-unit headquarters is modeled after the United Nations Building in New York. It stands on a triangular acre bounded by 23rd Street, N.W., Virginia Avenue, and the newly opened E Street Freeway to Roosevelt Bridge over the Potomac. Foggy Bottom has never seen anything like this! The three-story circular portion of the building is the council chamber, and its lower floor provides the headquarters' main entrance. Concrete latticework covers the exterior of the council chamber. The crescent-shaped secretariat, measuring 44 feet wide, 120 feet high, and 278 feet long, provides some 170,000 square feet of office floor space in its more than 11 stories.

The basement contains a 110-car parking garage. The building has four outdoor fountains, two second-floor conference rooms seating 110 and 75 persons, an executive suite conference room seating 30, and a display area for member nation flags.

DESIGNED BY SOUTH AMERICAN—Roman Fresnedo Siri, a Uruguayan architect, presented the design in 1961 that won the award in a hemisphere-wide competition. The American Construction Company of Washington in August 1963 received the \$4.5 million construction contract.

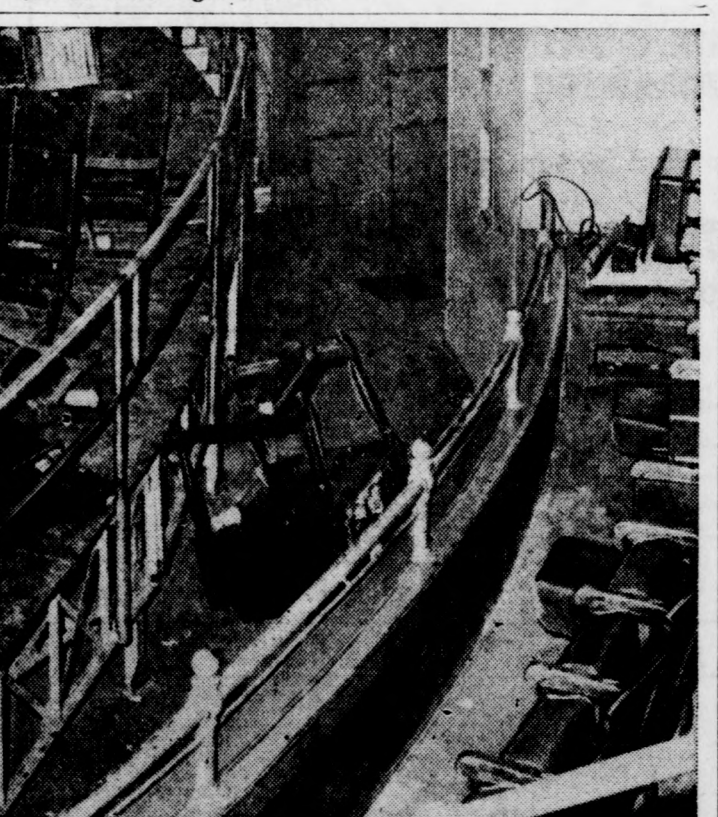
Member governments have been invited to contribute gift furnishings and art to create a distinct inter-American atmosphere in the headquarters. Representatives of Brazil, Costa Rica, Jamaica, Mexico, Panama, the United States, and Venezuela comprise a seven-nation executive group.

Art and craftwork sought include paintings, ceramics, sculpture, tapestries, and paneling for beautifying the lobby, conference rooms, and executive offices in ways that will depict the culture and heritage of the Americas.

The United States gave land for the headquarters, a gift valued at more than \$1 million. President Eisenhower signed the bill in March 1960. Senators who strongly supported the bill included Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas and Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota.

BUILT BY KELLOGG—The W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich., made a \$5 million grant that has paid most construction costs. Twenty-three member nations are to repay this grant, but the Kellogg Foundation stipulated that repayments over 20 years be spent "on education and training, nutrition and water programs."

The Pan American Health Organization is the intergovernmental health agency for the Americas. The Pan American Sanitary Bureau is the Organization's secretariat, and also is the official WHO regional office.

Johncock finished third and was followed home by Mario Andretti in fourth. Bobby Unser finished fifth and Don Branson sixth.

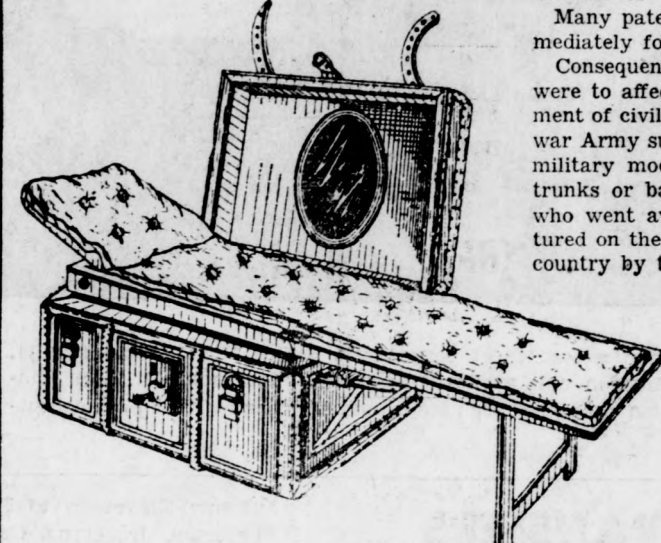
to take care of. For example, when Burgoyne invaded the Lake Champlain-Hudson basin in 1777 in what could have been a decisive blow to the patriots, he had along almost as many non-combatants and their possessions as soldiers and necessities of warfare. This circumstance was to be an important factor in the disaster he met at Saratoga.

Taking action independently of Grant, W. T. Sherman required men in the decisive march from Atlanta to the sea, 1864-65, to live out of knapsacks and saddlebags.

Many patents were issued on luggage immediately following the war.

Consequent simplifications of impediments were to affect all travel and camping equipment of civilians. Greeks Back Ousted Premier

ATHENS, Greece UPI — A screaming, chanting crowd of 10,000 gathered in downtown Athens today to back ousted Premier George Papandreou in his fight to regain control of the government.

The pro-Papandreou demonstration erupted as prospective Premier Stefanopoulos appealed to the ruling Center Union party to support a new government he hopes will end Greece's 25-day political crisis.

King Constantine, ignoring threats of renewed rioting from supporters of Papandreou, asked Stefanopoulos Sunday night to try to form a government.

The 67-year-old politician said he accepted "an exploratory mandate" but made it clear he wanted to be certain of support from the Center Union party before presenting a new government to parliament.

But the pro-Papandreou demonstration today outside the meeting hall of the Center Union party was seen as another blow to Stefanopoulos' changes.

It appeared unlikely that the Center Union will support Stefanopoulos. Papandreou, who heads the party, told Constantine Sunday night he must either reinstate him as premier or call elections for a new parliament.

In addition, 123 of the 171 Center Union members of the present parliament have announced already they will support no premier other than Papandreou.

City Secedes From Federation

KUALA LUMPUR UPI — Singapore today seceded from the two-year old Federation of Malaysia and announced it would like to settle any differences with Indonesia if the agreement would "not endanger us."

In Jakarta, Indonesia leaders hailed the breakup of the federation as a victory for Indonesia's campaign against Malaysia. Foreign Minister Subandrio said Indonesia probably would recognize Singapore and continue to seek the complete destruction of Malaysia.

Singapore Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew said after announcing his government's secession: "We want to be friends with Indonesia. We would like to settle any differences with Indonesia, but we must survive. We must be sure that we cannot be overrun or invaded by an army or rockets or missiles. It is important that we want to be friends in spite of all that had happened."

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Plane Sights Solo Voyager

FALMOUTH, England UPI — A Royal Air Force plane today sighted Cleveland newsman-sailor Robert Manry about 275 miles off the English coast on his 3,200-mile solo voyage across the Atlantic.

A Shackleton reconnaissance plane made the sighting. Its crew said Manry was off the extreme southwest tip of England, called Land's End, and about 300 miles from Falmouth, his destination.

If a map reference given Sunday was correct, the new position meant he had moved about 40 miles in a northeasterly direction in his 13 1/2 foot sailboat Tinkerbell.

The RAF crew reported Manry looked well and waved heartily.

SAIGON UPI — U. S. jet bombers carried out round-the-clock bombardment of Communist North Viet Nam today.

The air attacks on North Viet striking army barracks, storage areas, gun emplacements and transportation facilities through out the country.

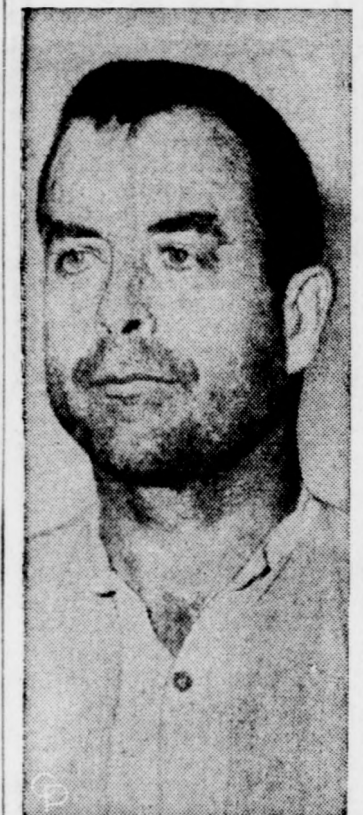
