Railroad Sold.

Hon. John L. Robinson, Marshall of Indiana, upon a decree issued by the Federal Court, sold the franchise, rolling stock depots, and all the personal and real property of the Toledo, Wabash and Western Railroad yesterday, at Lafayette, to Hon. A. Boddy. A large number of the stockholders of the road, comprising among the number some of the most eminent New York financiers, attended the sale. Lafayette was crowded with visitors upon the occasion. The whole concern was bid off at \$1,000, subject to liens. The decrees against the road amounted to between two and three millions of dollars. —*State Sentinel*, 6th.
