

The New York Tribune advises us that Western Massachusetts is to have Grand Musical Jubiles on the 8th of September—not a colossus, but a common sense affair, with a chorus of three hundred, and other arrangements in proportion. In that connection, we would state a circumstance in regard to the shooting of Ellsworth not generally known. Mr. Brownell states that he saw Jackson just as he was preparing to fire the fatal shot at the breast of Ellsworth. Brownell immediately turned to see the effect of the shot and saw that the bullet had struck the sailor's right arm, and that the bullet prevented any further movement, as he was standing upon a staircase. As Brownell brought his musket to bear upon the assassin, the latter fired the fatal shot, and almost immediately fell dead. The assassin's musket, however, was not Brownell's musket, but was a sailor's. Brownell's musket had been without a sabot, his movements would have been unimpeded, and in all probability, Jackson would have been shot and Ellsworth's life spared.
