

## Community Shocked By Garland Gebert Death

A truck accident five miles west of Helena, O., took the life of a lifetime resident of Pierceton on Friday morning, July 9. Garland Homer Gebert, 54, was killed when the tractor-trailer he was driving collided with an empty cattle truck at 7:20 a.m.

The Gebert truck hit the side of the other vehicle, driven by Clarence Otis McNicol, 57, of Adrian, Mich., causing the cab to disintegrate and the cattle truck and trailer to turn on its side. Gebert was thrown clear of the wreckage but slumped inside a ring of fire causing some burns to his back and head. He died of a crushed chest, skull fracture and internal injuries. William Shepherd of Clyde, O., pulled him from the burning wreckage and used a blanket from his auto to snuff out the flames. He was dead on arrival at the Fremont Memorial hospital, and was dismissed to the Keller funeral home in that city. Later he was returned to Pierceton by the Spangle ambulance. McNicol was treated for minor injuries and released from the hospital.

Mr. Gebert had worked most of his life as a truck driver. From 1942 to 1955 he drove a truck and trailer for Motor Cargo. Since that time he has been employed by the Fruehoff Corp., delivering empty trailers to various places all over the states. He was associated with the Triple Service Station at one time and also worked as a mechanic for Munson's Motor Sales in Warsaw. He and his wife have driven a school bus for the Pierceton school since 1959.

His wife, the former Ruth Koozntz, and Mrs. Harry Harris, both of Pierceton, were on a motor trip to Sebring, Fla., when the accident occurred. They returned to Pierceton on Saturday by air, accompanied by Mrs. Gebert's sister, Mrs. Norris Miller, who they had planned to visit in Sebring. They arrived home at midnight Saturday.

Other survivors include a son, Donald, and his wife Betty and grandsons, David and Brian.

Garland Homer Gebert, 54, of Pierceton, was born on March 14, 1911, to John and Clara (Devaux) Gebert in Whitley county. He was a lifetime resident of the Pierceton area with the exceptions of short residences in Gary and Texas. He married Ruth Koozntz on March 21, 1931, at Huntington.

Mr. Gebert was affiliated with the Pierceton Lodge No. 377 F. & A.M., Fort Wayne Valley of Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Mizpah Temple Shrine of Fort Wayne, Kosciuszko county Shrine club, a lifetime member of Moose Lodge 1423 of Warsaw and the Washington Township Farm Bureau.

Survivors include his wife Ruth; one son, Donald; two grandsons; his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. John Gebert, all of Pierceton; four brothers, Orville and Bertis of Pierceton, Virgil and Robert of Fort Wayne; and one sister, Mrs. Mort (Myrtle) Spreuer of White Pigeon, Mich.; several nieces and nephews. His mother preceded him in death in 1950.

Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church on Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 with the Rev. J. E. Lawshe of North Webster and the Rev. Howard Warner of Monroe township officiating. Burial was in Hillcrest cemetery.

The Masons' lodge conducted graveside services. The Spangle funeral home was in charge of the service.

### UMW RATIFIES NEW CONTRACT WITH NIPSCO

Membership of local 12775, District 50, United Mine Workers of America ratified a new three year contract with the Northern Indiana Public Service Company Monday. The new pact ends two and a half months of negotiations between the utility and the union which represents 2,400 NIPSCO production, maintenance, construction and operating employees.

Dean H. Mitchell, NIPSCO chairman and president, said, "The new agreement assures our employees of excellent wages, benefits, and working conditions. In the negotiating sessions more than 40 points of issue were settled and incorporated into the new contract."

The union membership had rejected an earlier agreement June 21. The pact ratified today was reached in a marathon bargaining session Wednesday June 30.




