



Wa-Nee Board Has Re-Organizational Meeting

The school board of the Wa-Nee Community Schools held its re-organizational meeting last Tuesday, July 6. The present officers were carried over for another year. They objected to this but were out voted 4 to 3 by the other members. The officers felt the work load should be passed around. The other members felt that they were doing a good job and should hold their offices another year to see some of the work now started to completion. W. Dale Christner is president of the board.

School co-ordinator Ferguson proposed that the board meet on Friday evening to interview architects for construction being considered. They met with Charles W. Coble and Son of South Bend and Boyd Phelps, Inc. of Michigan City on Friday night, July 9. They also talked with Wiley and Miller of Elkhart on Monday of this week.

It was agreed to sign contracts for staff members who had been offered contracts to return next year. Also a motion to increase the salaries of all office personnel according to the increments for which they qualify on the adopted salary plan was approved.

Joe Kindig was retained as the school attorney for the next fiscal year. A motion was made and accepted that the school treasurer be bonded for \$50,000 for the coming year.

A motion was made to approve the following resolution:

"Be It Resolved that the Board of School Trustees of the Wa-Nee Community Schools combine the Tuition Fund Account and the Special School Fund Account as provided by Chapter 414 of the Acts of 1965, the effective date to be January 1, 1965."

It received unanimous approval from the board.

Present for the meeting in addition to the board president and the school co-ordinator were the superintendent, Haskell Osborn, and board members Richard E. Berger, Dr. Forrest Kendall, Kenneth Smith, Lyle Yoder, Dr. Robert Abel and Russell Wenger.
