Wednesday, July 21, 1965, the fourth anniversary of Astronaut Gus Grissom's first orbital flight, is announced a Grissom Recognition Day throughout the state of Indiana by Dr. Albert P. Stewart, 1965 Hope Chest Chairman of the Multiple Sclerosis Society. In addition to his contribution to space progress, Major Grissom has sponsored the Hope Chest search of the MS Society for the cause and cure of this great scourge of young adults like himself.

While in Indianapolis to attend the 500 mile race this year, Major Grissom met with Indiana MS Chapter Chairman V. L. Tatlock of Terre Haute and Executive Director Mrs. Robert J. Shultz of Indianapolis where he accepted the invitation of Dr. Stewart to be Honorary Chairman of the Special Gifts Committee of the Society for 1965.

Because Astronaut Grissom is Indiana's most famous space pilot and the only American to have completed two orbital flights, the MS Society seeks to give all Hoosiers the opportunity to observe July 21 in his honor. The Gus Grissom Special Gifts for MS will be launched that day and all contributions will be used to speed the conquest of Multiple Sclerosis and service to MS patients.
