Town Board Meets Monday Night

The town board and town clerk met Monday night at the town hall with all members present. A clean out of the interconnecting drains at the intersection of Pearl and Prairie streets was discussed. The marshal is to try to auger it out in order that water from the west can drain into the east basin. A motion was made and passed for the board to give the marshal permission to purchase the necessary materials for three cistern covers.

A motion was made to contact Merl Blosser to do necessary repairs on catch basins and curbs. The motion passed. It was decided to deputize Robert Shively at a salary of \$1 a year. Yield right of way signs were discussed for street intersections of the town and the prices discussed. The board will investigate further into the matter.

A motion was made and passed that the town marshal patrol highway 15 at Prairie street during opening and closing of school each day while school is in session and permitting him to stop traffic when necessary to permit children to pass across the highway to and from school.

A motion was made and passed to have four no parking signs installed along the south side of the street extending from the east side of the school yard to the west side of the school yard. The junk car situation was discussed and it was decided that action can be taken as soon as 30 days had elapsed after post-

ing of the ordinance.

Bills were approved for payment. The town marshal gave his police report. The next meeting will be August 25 for adoption of the budget as published.

Taxpayers appearing shall have a right to be heard thereon. After the tax levies have been determined, and presented to the county auditor not later than two days prior to the second Monday in September, and the levy fixed by the county tax adjustment board, or on their failure to do so, by the county auditor, ten or more taxpayers feeling themselves aggrieved by such levies, may appeal to the state board of tax commissioners for further and final hearing thereon by filing a petition with the county auditor on or before the fourth Monday of September or on or before the tenth day after publication by the county auditor of tax rates charged, whichever date is later, and the state board of tax commissioners will fix a date for hearing in this county.
