New Control Laws Effective Jan. 1

New and rigid federal control laws concerning the use of the feed additive, di-ethylstilbestrol, DES, went into effect January 1, according to Don Frantz, extension agent.

All cattle now going to market for slaughter must have been taken off any feed containing DES at least seven days prior to marketing. A certificate stating that the drug laws have been complied with must accompany the livestock.

Under the new regulations, penalties are severe for producers selling livestock and for sale barns and other markets handling livestock that is improperly certificated.

Receives 5-Day Jail Sentence
